## IT'S IRS TIME, OR, HO-HO-HO REVISITED

The following tax tips come directly from an acknowledged expert, Lawrence A. Jegen, professor of law at the I.U. School of Law-Indianapolis. Read on and take note. . .

In preparing your 1980 income tax returns, remember to consider deducting the following items. Items 1 through 3 should be taken regardless whether you itemize your deductions or take the "zero bracket" amount. Items 4 through 12 generally should be deducted only if you itemize your deductions. Items 13 through 15 are credits (direct reductions) against the applicable income tax.

1. Cost of travel to professional conventions, including your meals, lodging, and transportation.
2. Automobile expenses. Use either actual cost or flat amount of 20 cents per mile for the first 15,000 miles and 11 cents a mile thereafter (plus parking) to Bloomington, Lafayette, professional meetings, student and faculty meetings, State House, etc.
3. Moving expenses to come to Indianapolis.
4. Cost of professional books (some of them may have to be capitalized and depreciated), magazines, newspapers, etc.
5. Professional association dues.
6. Cost of supplies, e.g., pens, pencils, paper stationery, and postage.
7. Office in home expenses, e.g., portion of depreciation of your house and personal property, fuel, water, electricity, insurance, taxes, interest, and telephone. However, there are several severe limitations on taking these deductions.
8. Teacher's liability insurance premiums. You can add this protection on your homeowner's policy for about 50 cents per year.
9. Cost of research, additional secretarial help, presents for your secretary (up to \$25), and to the maintenance staff.
10. Cost of cap and gown, e.g., for commencements and dedications.
11. Depreciation on personal property in your school office, e.g., rugs, lamps, pictures, frames, tape recorders, chairs, briefcases, and accessories.



12. Your I.U. medical insurance premiums. You may deduct one-half of the premiums paid (but not more than \$150), regardless of whether you may deduct other medical expenses.
13. Credit for purchases of tangible personal property which is used in your office.
14. Credit for political contributions.
15. Credit (on your Indiana income tax return) for charitable contributions made to certain Indiana educational institutions or to certain foundations (including Indiana University's).
16. A most informative free booklet is "Your Income Tax" published by the federal government, and which can be obtained from the Internal Revenue Service. An excellent book is: "1980 Tax Guide for College Teachers and Other College Personnel". Money -- A MoneyMover 24-Hour Teller, housed in a free-standing, climate-controlled building, is now open next to the Regenstrief Health Center. The unit is the first on campus and will be staffed by Indiana National Bank personnel during the first several weeks of operation. The staff will be available to demonstrate the use of the unit, to open new accounts and explain banking services.

Volleyball Anyone? -- Marilyn D. Reinhardt has resigned as coach of the IUPUI women's volleyball team to devote more time to working on her doctorate and to pursuing her interests in gymnastics and running. During her four years as coach, the teams compiled an 87-47 record. Her teams also placed third in Indiana competition in the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women, Division II, in 1978 and 1979. High Blood Pressure? -- The Hypertension Research Center has openings for people ages 18 to 65 who have high blood pressure and who are interested in participating in experimental, outpatient drug studies. Those eligible will receive free medication, lab tests, chest X-ray, electrocardiogram and outpatient visits for the duration of the study. One study also provides free blood pressure cuff, stethoscope and instruction on how to take your own blood pressure at home.
