CALIFORNIA'S BURKE TO KEYNOTE KING DINNER AT THE ROOF

Lawyer and civic leader Yvonne Braithwaite Burke, who was California's first black woman to be elected to the U.S. House of Representatives, will be the dinner speaker. Also on Jan. 19, staff, faculty and students are also welcome to join the Indianapolis community for a campus celebration on the birthday anniversary celebration of the slain civil rights leader. Two daytime sessions are planned.

The morning session from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. is in the gym at the natatorium and features U.S. Congressman Walter E. Fauntroy (D-D.C.), whose career in politics, civil rights and religion got under way in the 1960s with a major appointment by Martin Luther King Jr. to the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. Also on the

morning agenda will be music, a slide presentation and brief comments from campus and city leaders.

The afternoon session entitled "Realities and Illusions in Higher Education: A Dilemma for Minority Students" is from 2:30-5 p.m. in the cafeteria at the Union Building. Featured speaker is Dr. J.P. Lisack, engineer, Purdue University faculty member and retired Air Force colonel. As director of the Office of Manpower Studies at Purdue, Lisack's research has led him to make some dire predictions for minorities in the work force and society. A panel discussion follows his remarks. Also on the afternoon agenda are others from the university, including faculty, administrators and students.

All are welcome to the daytime sessions. There is no charge and no registration required. Sponsor of the Martin Luther King Jr. commemorative celebration is the IUPUI Forum on Campus Interrelations (FOCI), Lincoln V. Lewis chairman.



In his recent memorandum on the subject, he also charges us with the responsibility of carrying out the policy in a "positive" manner. All the rules and regulations on the subject, as set forth by IU and the federal government, are in the office of Affirmative Action, directed by Lincoln V. Lewis, and are available upon request.

PROF. JEGEN'S TAX TIPS: NUMBER YOUR KIDS

You will want to take time out before next year to get social security numbers for all your dependents under five years old whom you claim on your tax forms. This, of course, is only one of the many new tidbits found in the Tax Reform Act of 1986, which Lawrence A. Jegen, III, professor of law, will be telling us about. That first item becomes law in 1988. Aside from all the new rules, the act requires that "six months after Oct. 22, 1986," the IRS is required to submit a report that describes the methods and resources which could be used in order to implement a system in which there would be no paper tax returns used by a significant segment of taxpayers—making us a "formless tax return society."


Other small items: Unemployment benefits will now be taxed, effective this year. Scholarship and fellowship grants are excludable from gross income only for a degree candidate and only for tuition, course fees, books, supplies and equipment--effective for grants made after last Aug. 6.
