I.U. DENTAL HYGIENE PROGRAM HAS GROWN

Whether you graduated last year, ten years, or twenty years ago, you would note changes in the Dental Hygiene Program today. There are new clinical facilities for the programs at Ft. Wayne and Indianapolis. Of course Evansville's program, which will graduate students for the first time this year, also has a new clinic. These three schools and the one at South Bend have a total of 65 clinical units available for instruction and patient care.

Thousands of persons receive the services of first and second year students during each school year at the four locations.

Class sizes, too, have changed. From the first enrollment in 1950 of nine students, the 1973 state-wide enrollment has risen to an all-time high of 176 in the first and second-year classes. At each school, Indiana State University at

Evansville, Indiana University at Ft. Wayne, Indiana University at South Bend, and Indiana University-Purdue University at Indianapolis, one year of college is required for all applicants for admission. There will be 86 students graduating from Indiana's schools in May, 1973, and joining the ranks of the Dental Hygiene profession. In addition, 15 students are enrolled in the fourth or senior year leading toward a bachelor of science degree.

Last year the University adopted a new school calendar. This new calendar sees students beginning the first semester in August. The first semester then ends in December allowing the students to better enjoy the holiday break, because they have already completed their exams. The second semester runs from January to May.

A school's curriculum must always change to keep pace with the times. Course changes reflect changes in dental and dental hygiene practice such as amalgam polishing, plaque control, and diet counseling. Lectures, laboratories and clinical sessions are used. Closed circuit television is being utilized to teach some courses to the campuses and students who are spread from the northern to the southern parts of our state.

Some things, however, have not changed:

1) the thrill of receiving the letter saying you were accepted into the Dental
Hygiene class, 2) the recognition that the first tooth you carved does resemble a tooth, 3) the anticipation of working on your first "real" patient, 4) spotting bacteria in microbiology class, 5) the pride of your parents on the day of capping, 6) the anxiety of preparing for boards (now the national board as well as state board), 7) and the pride you had for your classmates who received honors on Honor Day, plus your personal pride upon graduating as a Dental Hygienist!
