DR. CHALLONER TAPPED FOR TOP POST AT ST. LOUIS MEDICAL SCHOOL

Dr. David R. Challoner, assistant chairman of the Department of Medicine who has been on the Indiana University School of Medicine faculty since 1967, has been appointed dean of the St. Louis University School of Medicine.

The announcement was made last week by the Rev. Daniel C. O'Connell, university president.

Dr. Challoner, whose deanship becomes effective March 1, will hold the faculty rank of professor of internal medicine. He succeeds Dr. Robert Hanna Felix who held the post from 1962 until last June when he was named dean emeritus.

President-elect of the 8,000-member American Federation of Clinical Research, Dr. Challoner also is nationally known for his work with the Association of American Medical Colleges on the Health Services Advisory Committee and as a member of the Subcommittee on Quality of Care.

Last year he spent a sabbatical as a visiting scholar at the Institute of Medicine, National Academcy of Sciences, in Washington, D.C., where he was engaged in research and writing on public policy and the funding of medical education and research.

His many professional memberships include the American Diabetes Association, American Physiological Society and Central Society for Clinical Research.

He is a fellow of the American College of Physicians and a fellow of the Council on Atherosclerosis of the American Heart Association. His editorial appointments include reviewer for the Journal of Clinical Investigation, Journal of Laboratory Clinical Medicine, Diabetes, and American Journal of Physiology and Science.

A 1961 graduate of the Harvard University medical school, the 39-year-old Dr. Challoner is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Alpha Omega Alpha honor medical society and Sigma Xi science honor society.

DAVE BAKER IS NEXT SHOWCASE ATTRACTION

Composer, bassist, cellist, trombonist and conductor David Baker will bring his award-winning Jazz Ensemble from the I.U. School of Music for the Showcase of Music series at IUPUI next week.

The concert will be presented at 8:15 p.m. Jan. 21 in the Lecture Hall auditorium.

Baker, winner of many jazz polls and citations, is chairman of the department of jazz at the I.U. School of Music and associate director of the black music center there.

A prolific composer and writer, Baker has been nominated for the 1975 Pulitzer Prize in music for his 1973 composition, "Levels."

His performing credits include work with Stan Kenton, Maynard Ferguson, Lionel Hampton, Slide Hampton, Buddy Johnson, the George Russell sextet and the Wes Montgomery sextet. He toured Europe with the Quincy Jones band in 1961. As performer and composer, Baker is represented on many recordings.

The \$2 single admission tickets for the concert are available through the Alumni Office in the Union Building and at the door the night of the concert. IUPUI students with an I.D. card are admitted free to all Showcase of Music performances.
