WHY HAVE AN FFA ALUMNI?

Why have an FFA Alumni Association? Why have a National FFA Alumni Association?

These are questions raised on occasion. As Alumni members, we should be prepared to answer when confronted by well-meaning people who, like yourself, are supportive of vocational agriculture and the FFA.

The purposes of the Alumni Association are stated clearly in our National Charter-basically, "to unite support for vocational agricultural education, strengthen the FFA, and promote a greater knowledge of the agricultural industry at all levels."

Why have a National FFA Alumni Association? I am convinced that the FFA, now celebrating 50 glorious, golden years, would never have grown to a membership exceeding 500,000 members nationally, if solid national and state organizations had not been established. Instead we would have seen a variety of individual agricultural clubs scattered over the country with no singleness of purpose—no coordinated programs.

I would have that same fear if the Alumni did not establish a strong state and national organization. For this reason, I believe we need to support the development of our National Alumni Association.

With thirteen years' experience as a Vo-Ag instructor myself, I am keenly aware of the desire to "Keep the money at home." I am the first to agree that the strength of the Alumni is based on strong, innovative, local programs of support. But more than that, youth organizations of every type need broad-based, adult and financial support. Had it not been for the establishment of the National FFA Foundation in 1944, the FFA "Blue Jackets" would not be where they are today. It would be an unusual FFA Chapter that has had no members on the receiving end of awards and honors provided through National Foundation funds.

That is why a coalition between the Foundation and the Alumni is so vital. By joining hands in supporting the Executive Sponsor program, we can compliment our local support efforts.

One-third of 1978 is gone. We still have a long way to go to meet our budgeted goal of 275 sponsors. (My own personal goal is at least one per Alumni Affiliate.) Won't you join with me in helping to promote this program? A \$100 investment in Agricultural Youth should not be a commodity that is difficult to sell.

FFA ALUMNI LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

The first meeting of the FFA Alumni Legislative Committee met in Washington, D. C., on March 16. Mr. David C. Thomas served as chairman with the other past National FFA Alumni presidents as members. A system is being developed to make the FFA Alumni a stronger voice in our support for Vocational Agriculture in the government affairs area.

The American Vocational Association Agriculture Advisory Committee has invited the FFA Alumni to become an active member. Mr. David C. The National FFA Alumni Association, through its state and local affiliate structure, can be a strong force across this nation in assisting with the development and strengthening of Agriculture Education and FFA in all areas.

Every agriculture instructor on the local level needs assistance in conducting his local program. Some areas where local assistance can be effective is with development of judging teams, selection of award winners and public speaking candidates. Advising the local Vocational Agriculture Teacher on curriculum changes which will expand local

course offerings in Agriculture in order that more students have the opportunity of enrolling and becoming involved in FFA activities is another area.

Many times an effective local alumni affiliate can be of valuable assistance to the local Board of Education and school administrators in the support of local program needs of the school and community. J These governing bodies need to solicit these alumni groups into the 64 support of board and administration educational goals.

The State FFA Alumni Association can be of invaluable assistance to the State Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association through close working relationships and support of adequate allocation of funds for Vocational Agriculture Education and the FFA. The assistance in the judging of state FFA winners and the help in organizing state FFA Conventions and Leadership Schools are other areas where alumni groups need to become involved.

Joint monthly meetings with the State Agriculture Teachers Executive Board, state supervisors, teacher educators and the alumni officers will produce effective activities for the good of all concerned.

The NVATA has an effective working relationship with the National FFA Alumni through newsletters and close informational exchange between the officers and Program Specialist Woody Cox. With the planned movement of the NVATA office into the Washington, D. C., area in early 1979, we expect to develop closer relationships on the national level. Hopefully, this will encourage the development of effective working relationships at state and local levels to enhance Vocational Agriculture Education and the FFA nationally.

If we jointly work together in as many areas as possible, we can be an effective force for the FFA and Vocational Agricultural Education. Let us begin now to develop those strong bonds of common concern and become that effective force.

WEA SEEKS FARM HOSTS

The International Department would like to remind you of our Work Experience Abroad (WEA) Exchange Program. As you may already know, the program is designed to give young agriculturalists a chance to gain cultural, educational and practical experience in the agriculture of a foreign country. While living and working with a host family for three, six or twelve months, he/she is expected to put in a 44-hour week and, in return, receive a minimum of \$145 per month plus room and board.

The "Inbound WEA'ers" (as they are called), are selected persons between the ages of 18 and 24. For the most part, agriculture is their chosen profession and most have attended some sort of agricultural school. This year we estimate over 100 exchanges, from 25 countries, will participate on the program.

The opportunity to serve Vocational Agriculture and the National FFA Foundation as Chairman of the Foundation Sponsoring Committee is proving to be most gratifying.

I consider FFA as one of the most outstanding contemporary youth organizations in America. The opportunity of working closely with such elite business-professional personnel which make up the Foundation's Professional Staff, the Sponsoring Committee, the Campaign Action Committee and the FFA Alumni Association is indeed a privilege.

One of the most encouraging trends for the Foundation, and the FFA, is the close, amicable relationship developing

between the Foundation and the Alumni Association. This coalition of mutual interest will give the Foundation tremendous thrust which is needed in order to meet the demands of an ever expanding incentive program for Vocational Agriculture students.

The Foundation with its unique but not uncommon role, was organized by businessmen in 1944 to coordinate efforts to raise money for FFA incentive programs and to provide needed liaison between FFA and business. This has resulted in a greatly expanded and improved FFA program with funds reaching over \$900,000 dollars in 1977, almost four times the amount raised just ten years ago.

One of the most significant steps taken by the Foundation during this period of phenominal growth was the creation of the Special Projects Program. This has stimulated financial support from the private industry sector. This accommodates those concerns with interest in specific identity with a specific program. There are roughly 50 such individuals and/or joint special project sponsors involving some 37 special projects. We now have about 12 special projects available for sponsorship.

The agricultural industry is a good barometer of the economic status of any country. We all acknowledge and respect the contribution agriculture has made to America's prosperity. Unquestionally, the educational and leadership opportunities afforded students of Vocational Agriculture through FFA programs these past 50 years has been a major factor in this country's unequaled agricultural growth and advancement. Herein lies full justification and remuneration for this strong effort in support of the National FFA Foundation.

We of the Sponsoring Committee are fortunate to have this most helpful partnership with the FFA Alumni Association. With such total commitment on the part of us all, we can guarantee the future of the Foundation and its purpose.

Executive Sponsors are a growing and elite group of individuals who in their own name annually invest \$100 in the future of America.
