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#### Cox pens U.S. News article with advice for talking to children about terrorism

Elaine Cox, M.D., professor of clinical pediatrics, IU School of Medicine, authored a Nov. 30 article in U.S. News & World Report offering advice for parents when talking to their children about acts of terrorism. "Coping With Tragedy: Talking About Acts of Terrorism" was published in the wake of the recent terrorist attack in Paris.

"Parenting experts have debated the 'right' approach to helping children cope with world tragedies, such as acts of terrorism," Dr. Cox wrote. "While there are no magic answers, the general tenets of parenting are likely the most appropriate approach. Wired-in time should be limited, making sure that there are not hours of exposure to upsetting video or news stories. This may mean turning off the television--even for the adults in the household."

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# Mindfulness-based stress reduction improves chemo brain

Participation in a mindfulness-based stress reduction program yields robust and sustained improvement in cancer-related cognitive impairment, a prevalent and potentially debilitating condition that affects attention, memory and executive function in survivors, according to a new study from the Regenstrief Institute and IU School of Medicine.

Although cancer-related cognitive impairment, sometimes referred to as chemo brain or post-cancer cognitive fuzziness, is common among survivors -- disrupting social relationships, work ability, self-confidence, and quality of life -- clinicians have few treatment options to offer. Cognitive deficits have been seen to persist for more than a decade following cancer treatment for many survivors.

"Randomized Controlled Pilot Trial of Mindfulness-based Stress Reduction for Breast and Colorectal Cancer Survivors: Effects on Cancer-related Cognitive Impairment," published online in advance of print in the Journal of Cancer Survivorship, is the first randomized clinical trial to evaluate the effects of mindfulnessbased stress reduction, known as MBSR, on fatigued breast and colorectal cancer survivors, the majority of whom had been treated with chemotherapy.

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# Apply by Feb. 1 for postdoctoral training awards in translational reserach

The Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute (CTSI) seeks applicants for postdoctoral training awards in translational research. Translation may involve applying discoveries made during research (in the lab, through animal studies, etc.) to the development of clinical trials and studies in humans, or carrying out research aimed at enhancing the adoption of best practices, or both.

Funding is for two years (with the second year of funding contingent upon review and demonstration of satisfactory progress). Benefits include salary support as well as health insurance. Trainees will be required to attend a National CTSA meeting and present at several Indiana CTSI gatherings during the academic year.

Applications must be submitted by Feb. 1, 2016, and awards will start on April 1, 2016. Interested candidates needing help identifying an appropriate co-mentor should contact the Indiana CTSI at their institution.

### Agho stepping down as School of Health and Rehab Sciences dean

Austin Agho, dean of the School of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences, has announced he is stepping down May 31 to assume the role of provost and vice president of academic affairs at Old Dominion University.

Agho became dean of the school in 2008. Under his leadership, three new degree programs were established: Bachelor of Science in Health Sciences, Master of Science in Health Sciences, and Master of Physician Assistant Studies; three undergraduate and two graduate certificate programs were created; U.S. News & World Report ranked the occupational therapy and physical therapy programs among the best in the country; minority student enrollment nearly tripled; and total student enrollment increased more than 200 percent. Additionally, Agho led efforts to establish the school's Distinguished Alumni Award and its Interdisciplinary Research and Continuing Education Conference.

"Austin has done a terrific job leading the school, including raising its academic profile, gaining national recognition, and both increasing and diversifying its student enrollment," Chancellor Nasser H. Paydar said.

Details on the search process for a new dean will be announced in the coming weeks after Paydar consults with various stakeholders.

### Indy - Blackford Street set for partial closing tomorrow
