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Did you know that...

More than 7,000 persons over 26 years ol are studying full-time at IUPUI, and more than 11,000 over 26 are studying part-time. The younger, employed people come part-time, but as people get older, they begin coming full-time. Age 55 seems to be the "magic line" where the older full-time students begin to out-number the part-timers. Last fall there were 809 full-time students aged 55 and 756 part-time. The most senior students last fall were seven 78-year-olds -- three full-time and four part-time.

NURSES PARTICIPATE IN NEW "SHARED-CARE CLINIC"

Robert Wood Johnson Faculty Fellow Norma S. Small at the School of Nursing has undertaken a project that will provide a <u>new health service to the Indianapolis community</u>. Called the <u>Shared-Care Clinic</u>, this program is housed at the Citizen's Ambulatory Health Care Center at 1650 North College Avenue.

"This clinic is <u>for those who have chronic illness or health problems</u>," says Miss Small. "It is specifically for people with diabetes, arthritis, obesity, high blood pressure, emphysema and heart disease."

The clinic opened in mid-January and will run for six months on a trial basis. Then the program will be evaluated by the Ambulatory Health Care Center and the School of Nursing.

"We will be providing a complete health care program," says Carlene M. Grim, a family nurse practitioner at the school. "This includes health screening and maintenance, taking medical histories, physical examinations, medical management, health teaching, counseling and referral."

"Maintaining the health of a chronically ill person has to be a joint effort by the health professional and the patient," says Dean Elizabeth Grossman. "In clinics such as this, we see the nurse as a vital force in the maintenance of the patient's health."

Miss Small is one of five fellows at the School of Nursing this year in the Specialist Degree Program. During this time, they are expected by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation to develop programs or projects with the school to further the development of primary care through service, education and research. They and the other nine students in the program will work at the clinic to get long-term experience in working with the chronically ill.

Besides the 14 students, the medical, nursing and paraprofessional staff of Citizen's Ambulatory Health Care Center will add their expertise to the new section.

"We are excited about this type of clinic and are happy to include the Shared-Care Clinic in our center," says Dr. Roscoe C. Henderson, medical director of the one of six health centers in Indianapolis established with funds from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.


