

Thelander award deadline nears

Entries are now being accepted for consideration for the history department's Thelander Memorial Award to be announced at the Honors Day convocation in late April. The deadline for submitting entries is Wednesday, March 31, 1982

The \$200.00 award is in memory of Professor Theodore Thelander, Jr., who taught history in Indianapolis for Purdue and IUPUI from 1947 to 1971.

The contest is open to all students in any undergraduate program or major. The essay's subject, however, must be of historical interest and should display qualities of good historical analysis and narrative.

According to Donald L. Kinser, chairman of the Thelander Memorial Prize Committee, committees in previous years have not

received many entries from students in schools other than Liberal Arts or Science and encourages students majoring in business, technology and others to consider entering their work. Last year's winner was Mrs. Jan Rubin writing on "Ultranationalism in Japan.

Essays may be written especially for the contest but they may also be papers written in response to class assignments but which have since benefited from instructor comments before submission to this contest. If any student has questions as to a topic's suitability, Kinser says that student should talk to a faculty member in the history department for counsel.

A set of written instructions as to judging criteria and proper form to be used has been prepared. Copies are available in the history office on the fifth floor of Cavanaugh

amount of finishing work such as trim here and there, that must be concluded," He added that the only way to avoid loose ends is to wait and that would take a very long time.

The School of Education's move to the main campus is significant in two ways. Not only will it be the first time in the school's history that it will be a part of the central campus, but the move will also decrease the number of offcampus sites

'Obviously the move will bring faculty, staff and students into the main stream of buildings and campus life," said Dr. Wolf.

"After the School of Physical Education moves to the Natatorium facilities and the School of Education is established in the ES building. the campus will be located three sites in the city as opposed to five," Henshaw commented. "We are really thankful for the new unity.

Unity is an important aspect of the recent construction on campus. With the completion of the Natatorium it will be possible to walk from the park ing garage on the north side of


Michigan to the Natatorium on the south side of New York Street.

The design of the new buildings is ultra-modern and efficient. The building features many unique and innovative concepts which will aid and enhance the capabilities of the teaching facilities of the School of Education.

There are four special purpose laboratories that are especially equipped for teaching how a subject is taught:

The math education lab includes a row of electrical outlets for mini-computers or calculators. In the science education lab there will be moveable lab tables.

The music education lab is equipped with specially constucted acoustics and blackboards. A new and exciting addition to the school is a special education lab. The lab is flanked by small adjoining rooms for private conferences and a children's restroom on one side and a classroom separated by a large two-way mirror. "This will enable our students to observe handicapped students while

they learn and play," Dr. Wolf commented.

In addition to the special purpose laboratories there will be a Curriculum Resource Center.

"The resource center is five times as large as our previous library in the Marott building. Dr. Wolf continued. "The resource center will be different from the main library. It will include sample textbooks, kits, educational games and other literature and resources unique to education.

Nine micro computers have been purchased to equip a lab within the resource center and a Plato terminal will also be available

Because the art of lecturing is essential for prospective teachers, the ES Building has several micro teaching labs. Micro teaching labs enable students to individually practice lecturing while instructors critique the students' lecture style. All sessions can be video taped. Food Service adds Cavanaugh Hall

In an effort to meet the needs of the student population on the Michigan Street campus, the Student Union **Building Food Service has** expanded its food service operations.

Along with its other satellite operations at the Dental School and in the basement of the Business/SPEA Building, the Student Union Building Food Service opened a new snack bar in the basement of Cavanaugh Hall. The snack bar features homemade soup or chili, sandwiches, fresh spinach or lettuce salads, fried chicken and cookies.

There will also be a new food bar opening next week in the Hide-Away under the University Library called "For the Health of It." Serving only natural foods, the big item at this snack bar will be the Stuffed Potato. This treat is a whole baked potato filled with chicken a la king or another specialty.

Other items at this bar include granola bars, dried fruit and vegetables, and natural fruit juices.

The Hide-Away will also receive a major facelift this year. Smaller tables will be brought in to increase the seating capacity in the cafeteria.

"The original tables were oversized," explained Paul Davis, director of Student. Union Building Food Service. The new tables will still allow a roomy 10 to 12 square feet per person.


Besides the new tables, the cafeteria will reclaim the west side of the Hide-Away. To be

completed by April, this space will allow for an additional 100 people. The total seating compacity will increase from 325 to 500.



Vell, that's the 'hole'

Sagamore, Jan. 13 issue within the article, "What is that hole?!!" "The Sagamore will publish any 'suggestions' in the Jan. 27 issue." So, if this paper holds to its word, then here is a publishable "suggestion".

Please read all directions, then procede step by step.

First Step: Install a one-piece glass on the exterior of the hole (that is, the outer-most part facing north).

Second Step: a) Install an inner glass with a two inch hole that has been previously cut into the glass (Note: this hole was cut 3" from the circumference). b) Be sure, when installing the glass, that the two-inch hole is centered at the uppermost point.

Third Step: Seal the glass all the way around both circumferences (that is, the glass to concrete areas on both sides). Please use a good quality clear type silicone sealer.

Note: this makes a watertight reservoir except for the two-inch hole. Please allow the silicone to dry from 740 10

waiting period is bound to cause a little curiosity and a few controversies within the city.

Fourth Step: Find a large garden hose, say one to twoinch in diameter, then locate the nearest water supply. Connect the correct end to it. Then drop the other end down the two-inch hole very carefully, making sure not to scratch the glass. Then return to the supply end, (careful, watch those steps on the ladder and scaffolding and turn on the supply full force.

Fifth Step: There are now a couple of hours to kill and what better way to spend it than visiting a pet shop. While at the pet shop buy two guppies (one of each sex) and an ample supply of food.

Sixth Step: Return to construction site and wait for proper water level. Turn off supply when water is pouring from the two-inch hole.

Seventh Step: Place the two guppies into the reservoir through the 2" hole. Add a little food and seal with a cork.

Eighth Step: After about a week, open the cork, then place some more food inside. This should be done at weekly intervals. The amount of food given should be increased every week according to the population of the guppies.

Ninth Step: After the 14 to 15 weeks, feeding will no longer be necessary for the experiment to complete its cycle. (Discontinue step number eight at this time.)

Tenth Step: Somewhere between 16 to 18 weeks, the glass on one side or the other will have blown loose due to the extreme pressures from within. Now all that has to be done is the counting of the guppies. After one has a total send it, along with a stamped selfaddressed envelope to:

Womens coach resigns, Metros win tournament

IUPUI's womens basketball coach Kathy Tucker resigned Saturday for personal reasons after the Metros won their first tournament championship in Anderson. Assistant coach Tom Drew acted as head coach for the last three games but Jeff Vessely was announced as interim coach to finish out the season beginning with Monday's game at IUPU-Ft. Wayne.

The Metros won their three games coached by Drew 77-57 against Taylor, 59-48 against Oakland City and 59-42 against Anderson. The Taylor game was played Thursday at Pike while the Oakland City and Anderson games were played Saturday at Anderson in the Raven Classic.

Judy Cummings hit for her season high against Taylor with 27 points. She also pulled down 18 rebounds, passed out three assists and stole the ball five times.

IUPUI placed three other players in double figures. Sue Baas scored 14 points, Sheila Smith 11 and Barb Spears 10. Nancy Plummer added nine points.

The Raven Classic was the first tournament won by an IUPUI womens basketball team. Baas was named the tournament's Most Valuable

Player and Cummings joined her on the five-player All Tournament Team.

In the opening game victory over Oakland City, IUPUI placed three players in double figures led by Baas with 15. Smith scored 12 points and Cummings added 10 to pace the Metro attack. Chyrell Saunders passed out six assists to lead the squad while Cummings led the team with nine rebounds.

In the overly physical championship game Cummings hit 11 points in the first half on her way to taking game scoring honors with 19 points. Smith missed most of the first half after receiving an elbow to the mouth going for a rebound. Baas was the only other Metro to reach double figures with 10 points.

Coach Vessely inherits a team with a 6-6 record. Through 12 games the Metros are hitting 40 percent from the floor and 64 percent from the line. IUPUI is averaging 61.5 points per game led by Cummings with a 17.1 average.

Baas is averaging 13.5 points

per game and Spears is also averaging in double figures at 11.6. Cummings is the Metros leading rebounder averaging 12 per game. Smith is averaging six points and six rebounds. IUPUI will host Indiana State University tomorrow night at Pike High School at 7 p.m. Monday afternoon, the Metros will host Butler at Park Tudor. Tipoff will be at 2 p.m.

IUPUI visits Defense Information Center

The Department of Communication of IUPUI was invited to tour the U.S. Army's Defense Information School (DINFOS) located at Fort Benjamin Harrison on Puriage, Jan. 23. The tour was assumed by Rich Riley, junior and graduate of DINFOS, and Navy Lt. Netty Johnson from DINFOS.

"I thought the people in communication would like to see how DINFOS is operated. Also, I thought they would be interested in how the military deals with communications," Riley explained.





sion studio for taping original educational productions.

In addition to administrative, secretarial and faculty offices, there will be areas for federally funded projects such as Teachers Corps.

"We have had great success in securing grants and money for a variety of projects and research. These projects, such as Teachers Corps are subject to change," Dr. Wolf explained.

One aspect of the new building that Dr. Wolf is also excited about features special furniture and space for about 30 work stations for community, part-time and Bloomington campus instructors.

"We've never before had space for part-time faculty to hang their hats. Now they will have a place to meet with students, grade papers or drink a cup of coffee," Dr. Wolf commented.

The School of Education will now be located in one of the country's newest academic facilities. Although Dr. Wolf and his associates do not regret their move from the Marott Building, they will miss their old home. "We will miss the Marott Building. It is a great historical landmark, but it was not truly suited to our purposes."

The Marott Building, owned by the university, will be closed and the heat reduced. However, the baseball team will be using the gymnasium for indoor practice until March.

The Board of Trustees will be considering what to do with the building and will probably not make any decisions until June or July.

"There are no plans for the building yet. It will be up to the Board of Trustees to nail down our best option," Henshaw concluded.


