NOTED DIRECTOR/ACTOR HEADLINING KING CELEBRATION




Director/actor Bill Duke will headline the program at the 22nd annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. dinner Jan. 18, sponsored by the IUPUI Black Student Union. The dinner is one of three major events on campus that day to commemorate the life of King, including the annual Celebration Breakfast and the first Chancellor's Symposium.

The Celebration Breakfast will kick off the activities at 7:30 a.m. at the Madame Walker Urban Life Center, hosted by Chancellor Gerald L. Bepko. The event will feature a dramatization by the Black Theatre Workshop of the University of California at Berkeley, directed by Margaret Wilkerson and titled "Dreams, the End or the Beginning."

The Chancellor's Symposium, which will be an annual part of the Martin Luther King Day tradition at IUPUI, will run from 1-3 p.m. at the University Place Conference Center and Hotel. It will focus on the life and thoughts of the civil rights leader with the theme "Reconstructing the King Legacy," led by Clayborne Carson, executive editor of the Martin Luther King Papers.

The dinner will begin at 7 p.m. at The Westin Hotel and honors the legacy of King as well as promoting brotherhood at IUPUI and in the Indianapolis community. This year's theme is "A Dream Deferred...Does It Explode?" Duke, an award-winning TV, motion picture and theater director, has directed such films as "A Rage In Harlem" and "Deep Cover" and numerous episodes of TV series such as "Miami Vice," "Cagney & Lacey" and "Hill Street Blues." As an actor, he has co-starred opposite Arnold Schwarzenegger in the hit movies as "Predator" and "Commando."

LIBRARIES RECEIVE INDIANAPOLIS FOUNDATION SUPPORT




Grants from the Indianapolis Foundation have been awarded to the IUPUI University Libraries, along with libraries for the School of Dentistry, the School of Law-Indianapolis and the School of Medicine. The libraries are joint recipients of a pair of Foundation grants totaling more than \$226,000. One grant, for \$194,500, will be devoted to cooperative collection building and will help the libraries offset the rising cost of books. The other grant, worth \$32,400, is for computer workstations and software which will allow printed information to be distributed to other libraries using existing phone lines. Articles can be scanned into a computer, then sent to other libraries like faxes, only with higher print quality.

MALCOIM X FEATURED IN BOOKMARKS PROGRAM


