FFA ACCEPTS THE PRESIDENT'S CHALLENGE

"I set before you this extraordinary challenge, asking every FFA chapter in this country to get involved in this basic question of energy conservation . . ." That was President Carter's

"unique call" to FFA chapters all across the country.

Carter, a former FFA secretary at Plains, Georgia, was speaking to the 1979 State FFA President's Conference held this July. He stated, "I will give recognition . . . to the one FFA chapter in the nation . . . who does the most outstanding job in carrying out a response to the energy crisis. I'm going to depend upon the FFA to take the lead in energy conservation . . . I know you will do this, and it's a solemn commitment between me and you."

The program will run from August, 1979, through June 15, 1980. Individual FFA chapters and Alumni affiliates are encouraged to accept the President's challenge, and include energy conservation projects in all their ongoing programs such as Building Our American Communities (BOAC), and local

blic Speaking Contests. In addition, it is hoped that FFA apters will aim new thrusts directly at what President Carter

called "our war for energy security."

This program will benefit you, the FFA, our nation, and future generations. FFA Alumni involvement is important and will be appreciated.

WISCONSIN FFA ALUMNI

The Wisconsin FFA Alumni returned to the National FFA Alumni their reimbursement check for Life Members' state dues. This year this check was for \$215. They have challenged other states to consider doing the same.

The Wisconsin FFA Alumni also contributed \$2,000 to the FFA Hall of Achievement project. To date, five FFA Alumni groups have contributed to this project. A special thanks to the Wisconsin and other State FFA Alumni for their outstanding support.

COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENT

Howard Morrison, past National FFA Secretary from Arizona, has just completed the first FFA Alumni internship. The purpose of this intern program in the area of governmental affairs was to assist the FFA Alumni in developing a better understanding of the legislative process. It also provided additional visibility for vocational agriculture—FFA to those individuals and agencies that influence the status of vocational agriculture at the federal level. Some of the accomplishments included developing a flowchart depicting the process for vocational education legislation, collecting materials on the history of vocational education legislation, compiling studies on teacher shortage and its effect on local agriculture programs, and compiling lists of key state and national leaders who were former students of vocational agriculture-FFA. Major emphasis was placed on making personal contacts with those who write or prepare legislation and those who compile information or conduct research that affects the outcome of legislation for vocational agriculture education.

A detailed report of the accomplishments of our first intern program will be mailed to state FFA Alumni presidents and State Committee on Government chairmen early this Fall.



Dr. Daniel Dunham, Deputy Commissioner of the Bureau of Occupational and Adult Education, former President of FFA, was presented an Alumni plaque by FFA Alumni President Odell Miller. The plaque, presented on the lawn of the White House following a special meeting in the Rose Garden between President Carter and the State FFA Presidents, was in recognition of Dr. Dunham's recent joining of the FFA Alumni as a Life Member.
