The FFA National Chapter Award program recognizes chapters for their efforts in planning and meeting the objectives they set in their POAs. The POA and the award program have three divisions-Student Development, Chapter Development and Community Development. Each year at the national FFA convention, the ten highest-scoring chapters in each division receive the Model of Innovation Award.

The 2002 Model of Innovation award winners' activities are presented in this book. Through them, you'll see a sample of the many ways FFA chapters identify needs, set goals, create plans, implement plans and evaluate results. Many of the projects may sound similar to activities your chapter has undertaken. What makes them innovative is the way they were developed and

implemented. The award judges were impressed with these chapters' abilities to identify goals and objectives, create a workable plan of action, and not only get results, but also analyze those results, identify lessons learned and determine ways to improve future activities.

Use the ideas in this book to spark innovative ideas for your FFA chapter. When your new officer team is elected, they should review this book as a group and use it as a resource when developing their POA. The book also contains insights from students and advisors, a summary of the award program, tips for National Chapter Award success and ideas for recruiting more members into your FFA chapter.

common trait—they understand that success is the result of planning and implementing those plans. The FFA National Chapter Award program encourages chapters to develop and use a written Program of Activities (POA) and recognizes chapters' achievements through the following awards.

State Superior Chapter

Any chapter in good standing that completes at least one activity related to each of the National Chapter Award program's 15 quality standards (see left column) may apply for this award. State Superior Chapters receive a recognition certificate.

State Gold, Silver and Bronze Awards

Chapters that qualify for the State Superior Chapter award may supply additional information about three activities in each division. State judges score these activities to determine State Gold, Silver and Bronze awards. Winning chapters receive a multi-year plaque, and as awards are earned in subsequent years, they receive plaque inserts that specify the level achieved.

National Three-Star, Two-Star and One-Star Gold Awards

Chapters that receive the State Gold award may compete for national awards. The number of applications a state may submit is restricted to no more than 10 percent of its total number of chapters. National award judges score the applications. Each chapter receives a multi-year plaque with an engraved plate that indicates its achievement of the Three-Star, Two-Star or One-Star award. The "star" designation signifies overall achievement in the National Chapter Award program.

Model of Innovation Awards

The Model of Innovation awards are presented to the most innovative Three-Star chapters in each division. These chapters each receive a special recognition plaque at the national FFA convention. Special recognition is also given at the national convention to the top-rated middle school FFA chapter.

he Laurel-Concord FFA Chapter is fortunate to have a great group of students who are really in touch with community needs, according to Paul Timm, chapter advisor. "I think the key to student involvement is making the activities enjoyable. Our members come up with some very creative ideas and, as the advisor, I see it as my job to help them turn their ideas into reality. To do that, the ideas must be student driven. The students must have ownership if they are to take the ball and run with it."

And run with it they did!

To develop student leadership, the chapter had 10 members participate in the national FFA convention. One student was involved in the National FFA Chorus, while another was a national proficiency finalist. All the students who went to the convention attended two leadership workshops along with convention sessions and toured the FFA National Agricultural Career Show.

To develop healthy lifestyles among its members, the chapter hosts a "kick-off" each August to celebrate the start of a

new school year. Held in conjunction with their alumni, the kick-off includes a barbecue and many games. After dark, the members light a bonfire and toast marshmallows.

Students at Laurel-Concord assisted in conducting research at the Haskell Agricultural Laboratory to develop skills for their supervised agricultural experience programs. After the research was complete, they analyzed the data and prepared a PowerPoint presentation. The presentation was

delivered to students in Mead, Neb., via the distance education program.


Working with their local alumni, the chapter sponsors a \$200 scholarship annually. The scholarship is awarded to a graduating FFA member who is continuing his or her education in agriculture. The scholarship is given to the student after he or she has completed a semester of post-secondary education with a grade point average of "C" or above.

Students enrolled in the plant science

class broadened their agricultural career skills by working with the owner of a local floral shop. The students grew a variety of vegetables, including tomatoes, peppers, squash and green beans. The floral shop provided the use of its greenhouse and the owners assisted the students in developing their greenhouse management and marketing skills.

All of these activities started as chapter member ideas. Through the Program of Activities development process, each idea was fleshed out and implementation plans were developed. Throughout the year, the chapter officer team diligently encouraged members to become involved in each different activity.

Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE)

Supervised agricultural experience activities promote student involvement and growth through agriculture-related experience and/or entrepreneurship.



Chapter Test Plot

The chapter secured a 35-acre land lab to promote student involvement, growth and development in agricultural career skills. The members wanted to learn how to effectively plant and harvest no-till soybeans. They planted 26 different varieties of seed from eight different companies. The members developed skills in planning, planting and harvesting. The chapter profited \$7,200 while the members benefited from the experience.

Land Lab Management

To encourage more SAE experiences, the high school has a 117-acre farm that includes ponds, forest, gardens and a nursery. The members secure equipment, seed, chemicals and fertilizer for the farm. They also maintain records for the farm, evaluate performance and brainstorm ways to improve production.

Educational Tours

The chapter takes summer, fall and spring tours of agricultural interest. These tours are based on an SAE interest survey the members complete. This year, members toured the University of Missouri-Columbia College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources, the Missouri Institute of Cooperatives; and the Tri-State Farm Progress Show. More than 75 percent of the members participated in these educational tours.

Artificial Insemination

Over the holiday break, 10 chapter members with beef SAEs participated in an artificial insemination workshop. The two-day training was spent half in a classroom and half in the barn working with cows. In addition to AI techniques,

members learned about proper herd nutrition, the value of higher quality genetics, effective hygiene, heat detection and other steps to ensure herd health. Area ranches and a local genetics company representative provided the cattle and the materials needed for the workshop.

Animal Lab

Providing hands-on experience for members was the goal of this chapter's animal lab project. The chapter contracted with a local construction company to build a metal pole barn. The members secured a loan from the school district to finance the project. As a result, the number of members exhibiting livestock greatly increased. A flock of sheep was purchased from a local producer, along with some show goats. These animals provided students with ample opportunities for hands-on experience in taking care of large animals.

SAEs That Take You Places

The chapter has had four national proficiency finalists, two of whom were selected to participate in the International Travel Seminar to Costa Rica. By highlighting these winners and the opportunities they received, younger members were encouraged to develop stronger SAEs. This effort led $9 \bullet$ to a 20 percent increase in the number of proficiency applications submitted at the chapter and state levels.

Heifer Coop

Members are given opportunities to work with a local farmer who provides them with a calf, feed and assistance. In return, the members are required to show the animals in competition and keep accurate records.

Scholarship

Scholarship activities develop a positive attitude toward lifelong learning experiences.

Scholarship Program

To help members finance their educations beyond high school, the chapter established a scholarship program incorporating an auction. Community members donate items to the auction and the proceeds are used to fund scholarships. In April, every senior planning to continue his or her education is given an application. Those seniors who have been FFA members for four years and have met the minimum scholarship and leadership qualifications, receive a \$500 scholarship. In addition, one four-year FFA member receives a \$2,000 scholarship that is awarded over a four-year period. Beyond these local scholarships, seniors are encouraged to apply for the National FFA Scholarship Program.

Scholarships for CDE winners

The chapter awards \$500 scholarships to each member of state-winning career development event teams. This encourages members to try new CDEs and increases the level of participation.

Agriculture in Your Life

As a way of helping children understand agriculture and its role in their lives, chapter members worked with FCCLA members and ecology students to host an educational event for area second- and third-grade students. More than 200 elementary children visited the high school and learned about agriculture. The children rotated through four stations. At the first station, they learned about corn, sovbeans and wheat. The next station focused on dairy products and the children made butter. Next, they learned about chickens and eggs. Finally, the children learned about pork and observed a baby pig. All the elementary students received coloring books provided by the corn and soybean associations.

River Assessment

To engage members and develop career skills, the officers developed a program in which students collected and analyzed local water samples. Working together, 54 members correctly collected and anlayzed samples and determined the amount of nitrates, chlorides, iron and dissolved oxygen present in each sample. The data collected was made available to the public.

Chapter members competed against students from other area schools in the local Home Builders' Association landscape design contest. The members used materials donated from area horticultural businesses to build their design, which was named best of show. They were presented with a cash award.

Research with Syngenta

A Syngenta representative approached the chapter and asked if members would assist in a corn flux research project. The members agreed and processed 758 samples measuring ear width, cob width, cob length, total kernel weight and 500-kernel weight for each sample. In addition, the students learned about agribusiness and research careers from the Syngenta employees.

Chapter Development Quality Standards

Chapter recruitment activities increase agricultural education enrollment and/or FFA membership and encourage greater participation.

Financial activities encourage thrift and sound financial management practices among members through earnings, savings and investments.

Public relations activities promote a positive image and inform students, parents, school officials and the community about chapter and member accomplishments.

Leadership activities develop teamwork and cooperative skills among chapter officers, committees and members.

Support group activities develop and maintain positive relations among FFA members, parents, community leaders and industry. "As officers, we try to appeal to members by relating FFA activities to their other interests. For example, if a student is into wrestling, we encourage him to use that interest in an FFA activity like public speaking. Wrestlers are always watching their weight and need to learn about good nutrition, which makes a great public speaking topic that is related to agriculture. It's all about focusing on what the members are interested in and making the activities fun and enjoyable for all."

hen the Comanche FFA chapter officers start working on their Program of Activities, they focus on identifying needs within the chapter and community in which their members share an interest. "Once you have a shared interest on which to focus your energies, you must create a plan of action and include activities and responsibilities for everyone in that plan," says Bruce Akins, one of the chapter's advisors.

"As an example, we started an elementary science fair as a way to reach out to

younger students and help them understand the connection between science and agriculture," Akins says. "This activity attracts some of our students that aren't interested in other activities, and it puts them in a teaching role with the elementary students. They have to step out of their comfort zones and spend time on the other side of the desk. The students take on a leadership role and develop their skills. Plus, they realize that they are not just representing themselves, but the chapter and the FFA organization. This experience empowers our students and helps them grow personally."

Akins and his teaching partner, Larry Reed, apply this concept across all the chapter's activities. Here's a sampling of some of their efforts in chapter development.

To enhance their recruitment efforts, the chapter officers invited several state officers to visit. The state officers discussed opportunities available to FFA members and encouraged prospective members to join.

Chapter members hosted a sale to increase their financial skills. They developed an advertising plan, clerked the sale, figured commissions and processed billing for a consignment auction.

To increase public awareness of FFA, the chapter produced a weekly television segment called, "FFA in Action," for KSWO-ABC, Channel 7, in Lawton, Okla. The program informed the viewing audience about FFA and chapter member activities.

The chapter officer team formed committees and engaged many chapter members in planning, organizing and conducting the annual parent-member banquet.

FFA members worked with chapter support groups to clean up the city park and conduct beautification projects. They produced bedding plants in the school's greenhouse and planted them in front of local businesses and at a senior citizen center.

Fun with a Hypnotist



Fall Harvest Cooperative

The chapter organized a cooperative to help members understand how they work. A board of directors was selected and made responsible for setting policy, creating a budget and publicizing the program to members. They sold 1,500 shares of stock at \$5 with a goal of increasing the stock value to \$7.35 per share. The cooperative produced and marketed 2,000 •16 bales of straw, 700 bundles of corn stalks and 5,000 pounds of "squirrel food" from the school farm. The value-added products that were sold created \$8,900 in profit for the members who participated (ending stock share value was \$9.15). In addition, the FFA chapter received \$4,000 in profits. The students learned a great deal about adding value and marketing agricultural products through this activity.



They received \$10,000 in grant funds to add an additional 12 feet to the greenhouse and purchase germination chambers, pneumatic seeders, drip irrigation, soil sterilizer and a liaht meter.

ith 22 years of teaching experience under his belt and a wall of plaques and trophies attesting to his skill, Kirk Hutchinson says it all starts with the students. "If you want an active chapter, you have to start with the chapter officer team," Hutchinson explains. "First the officers have to develop a plan, and then it is their job to sell it to the members. I'd like to say that we don't still struggle with motivating students, but that is just not the case. Getting students involved is incredibly difficult."

Hutchinson continues, "One thing I've found that helps get students engaged is establishing traditions. When you do an activity for a couple of years in a row, even though you modify it a bit every year, it becomes a tradition. It becomes something people – including younger students – look forward to. It becomes 'their' activity, not yours."

Looking at the list of activities Hutchinson's students implement each year, its obvious these words hold water. For example, Perrydale FFA members provided a helping hand during the

recent drought through their Food For All program. Members worked together to solicit donations of food and clothing from agricultural businesses, community members and other FFA chapters across Oregon. clothes and a good attitude to a local stream bank in danger of erosion. They planted 750 trees to preserve and protect the bank.





The FFA chapter solicits pumpkins from local farmers, then holds a pumpkin carving contest. Each student can enter two pumpkins – one carved, one painted. The 100 students who participated carved and painted 300 pumpkins. The members donate the pumpkins to the zoo for use as decorations during ZooBoo. The chapter received county-wide recognition. Many city and county leaders have commented on the FFA members' generosity.



Student Development

- Chapter members and officers evaluated the leadership activities offered and decided to focus on
 encouraging participation at the local, state and
 national levels. Two members attended FFA Day at
 the state capitol and served as pages for their representatives.
- Recreational activities were a strong focus for this chapter. The most popular activity was a scavenger hunt held after school for all FFA members.
- Members' supervised agricultural experience programs ranged from growing plants to showing livestock. Members exhibited livestock at eight fairs throughout the state, including the Georgia Junior Livestock Show.

Community Development

- Chapter members donated more than 1,000 cans of food to the community food bank. A local church operates the food bank and assistance is provided on an as-needed basis.
- The chapter hosted a hunter safety course for its members who are interested in wildlife and hunting. Students who successfully completed the activity received their hunter safety card.
- Electricians from Satilla Rural Electric Corporation were invited to visit the school and conduct an electrical safety demonstration.
- The chapter worked with the local chamber of commerce to plan, organize and implement Farm City Day for the county's second-grade students.
 FFA members serve as station leaders and conduct various demonstrations for the younger students.
- In cooperation with the local Farm Bureau, the chapter sponsored the local Agriculture Day essay contest. All seventh-grade students compete in this activity. Farm Bureau awards prizes to a male and female winner.

Program of Activities

that success is the result of solid planning and then effectively implementing their plans. They develop a written Program of Activities (POA) to establish and work toward goals for the year. A well-planned and well-executed POA helps students develop planning and leadership skills they need for career and personal success.

A well-planned POA will:

- ensure chapter activities meet members' needs;
- · lead to a workable budget;
- provide students with experience in planning;
- serve as a reference point throughout the year;
- provide direction from year to year.

POA Development Steps

The strongest POAs emerge from a committee structure and process that involves every member in setting chapter goals, then planning and carrying out activities. Many chapters use the following steps. Start by using the National Chapter Award video to introduce members to the process. For more details and helpful forms, refer to Chapter Planning and Recognition: A Student Handbook. Both items are available from the National FFA Organization. Call 1–888–332–2668 and request item #PCHP or item #NCAH, respectively.

 The chapter organizes standing, executive and special committees to address the areas of student, chapter and community develop-

- ment. Each member serves on at least one committee.
- Each committee identifies goals and activities related to its purpose or area.
- Committees present their selected activities, including estimated income and costs, to the entire chapter for approval.
- Approved activities and a combined chapter calendar of events are published in the written POA. It is distributed to all members.
- Committees and subcommittees develop detailed plans for each activity.
- Members implement the plans.
- Committees report results and evaluate the activities. They prepare written final reports for each activity, noting costs, income, accomplishments and recommendations.
- Chapter leaders refer to the POA and its results to prepare an application for the National Chapter Award program.

Applying for recognition through the National Chapter Award program is the "icing on the cake." Recognition from the state and national organizations rewards students for their hard work and brings added prestige to the chapter.

Goal Statement for FFA Chapter Activities

The National FFA Organization encourages chapter activities that provide:

- a balance of experiences inside and outside the classroom, with sensitivity for students who have part-time jobs or work after school;
- opportunities for developing self-confidence, responsibility, citizenship, cooperation and feelings of winning and self-esteem;
- hands-on activities;
- general leadership skills;
- accessibility for all student populations;
- flexibility that will allow students of all abilities to achieve:
- flexibility that will allow chapters from various environments and with various levels of resources to achieve:
- multiple levels of participation and experiences;
- appropriate recognition for all participants;
- relevant educational experiences that expose students to opportunities in the food, fiber and natural resources industries of agriculture.


Tips for Success

National Chapter Award application. They have been gleaned from those involved with the selection process, including judges, advisors, members and national FFA staff.

Follow the developmental process outlined in Chapter Planning and Recognition: A Student Handbook. Identify specific goals that are measurable and realistic; develop a plan that is educational and meets the goals the chapter has set; and evaluate the results achieved and the benefits members experienced. Be sure to include information on how the activity affected the members, chapter, school and community.

- In the application, every activity should have measurable objectives and the plan of action should be detailed and reference each objective.
- **Include specific facts** about percentages of membership involved and accomplishments.
- **Keep a file of activities** and notes on areas for improvement within each activity. Students can use this information when they begin planning the year's Program of Activities (POA).

- Many new ideas and ideas for improvement spring to mind when completing the application. Make a concerted effort to note these spontaneous ideas and capture them for use during the next POA planning session.
- Use each activity only once on Form
 If used more than once, your chapter will not qualify for National Gold recognition.
- Ask an English teacher to edit and proofread your application. They will learn more about the FFA and you are bound to submit a better application. Always use the spell-check function on your computer and the grammar-check function if you have it.
- Don't attach information or materials that are not requested. Points may be deducted or an application may be disqualified for including supplementary materials not specifically requested in the application.
- Review the application checklist before submitting your application.
 Follow instructions carefully. Please use the FFA award application folder, as pages may be lost if not secured.

- Photos tell your story and good photography is important. Plan ahead and have all events photographed well. Getting good photos means shooting ample frames. Your photographer should have some experience in composing the images and exposing the shot correctly. Photos that aren't well-exposed are generally too light, too dark or grainy.
- The National FFA Organization uses
 photos from the winning entries in
 printed materials and cannot use
 scanned or digital images from
 applications. If your chapter has
 moved from film to digital photog raphy, be sure to capture some
 images of each event at a resolution
 of at least 300 DPI, so that they
 may be submitted for publication.
 Lower resolution images cannot be
 reproduced well in printed materials.

Tips for Success

National FFA Chapter Program Expectations

The National FFA Chapter Award program guides students to achieve the SCANS foundation skills and competencies by:

- practicing student leadership and citizenship to solve community-based problems
- demonstrating the leadership and human relations skills necessary to become productive members of society;
- developing interpersonal skills by valuing diversity, practicing tolerance and acceptance of others and working cooperatively toward common goals;
- using information-based technologies to complete prescribed forms and documents.

Membership Recruitment Tips

strong FFA Program of Activities and FFA chapter membership work hand in hand. Strong programs attract more members, and full chapter membership makes it possible to undertake a wider variety of in-depth projects.

The FFA chapter also serves as a tool to recruit students into the agricultural education program. Here are some ideas for building your agricultural education program through FFA involvement.

- Ensure the FFA chapter "belongs" to students, that they plan and conduct its activities and receive related recognition.
- Make sure potential students are aware of the opportunities available in FFA. Students who are seeking ways to be involved in activities should look no further than this vibrant, dynamic organization.
- Make FFA an integral part of the agricultural education program. Provide all students with instruction in leadership development. Because career development events (CDEs) are an application of lessons learned in class, all students should likewise be expected to participate in CDEs.

- Encourage timid students to involved. Often, students are reluctant to participate in leadership activities unless personally encouraged to do so. Once involved, however, they quickly develop skills and competencies and often continue their involvement.
- Ask every student to be involved in at least one FFA activity each grading period. Chart their involvement.
- Carefully match experienced students with other students in mentoring relationships for conducting FFA activities. Invite potential members to travel with members to FFA activities.
- Let potential students see firsthand the close relationship that develops between agriculture students and their teacher(s).
- Plan fun FFA events-field trips, in-school barbecues, parties, recreation, etc.-for all students, and work to see that all students attend.
