The Office of International Programs and Services at IUPUI is the statewide coordinator for the 1980 Great Decisions program sponsored by the Foreign Policy Association.

Each year this program presents to its members impartial analyses of eight important international issues on the nation's agenda. Although the program is a national one, it is sponsored in communities by local affiliates of national organizations, local groups, colleges and universities, and by individuals. A variety of programs is offered, including discussions, forums, lecture series and accredited courses -- depending on the level of activity in each community.

Besides participating in local discussion groups, individuals can take part in the nationwide media discussion on National Public Radio (WIAN radio) beginning in March and on public television (Channel 20) in April.

Topics for the 1980 Great Decisions program are:

"The World in 1980: America's Basic Options" "The Mideast and the Gulf: U.S. Policy in Ferment" "The United Nations at 35: Illusions and Realities" "Eastern Europe: Emerging from Moscow's Shadow?" "Humanity on the Move: How Migration Affects Us" "Brazil's Rising Power: What Weight in the World Scale?" "Vietnam and Its Neighbors: Big Powers and Little Wars" "The World Energy Crunch: America's Choices--At Home and Abroad"

These topics are presented in a book prepared by the editors of the nonpartisan Foreign Policy Association. Members record their opinions on ballots and return them for tabulation. The Foreign Policy Association sees that the results reach members of the United States Congress, the executive branch of government and the national media.
