PHILLIPS, Associate Dean for Research, has been appointed as a member of an 8-man Commission which is charged by the Massachusetts Dental Society to evaluate the efficiency, and in particular the conclusions, of the Forsyth Dental Center Study on New Duties for Dental Hygienists. The future of this somewhat controversial program will be determined by this Commission.

The Elements of Dental Materials, by Dr. Phillips, has just been translated into Italian, the sixth language in which the book is now available.

TIMOTHY J. CARLSON, second year dental student, has been named as recipient of the first \$500 Frank R. and Jessie B. Johnson Dental Scholarship. In announcing the award, Dean Ralph E. McDonald noted that the scholarship was established by Dr. Donald R. Johnson, a 1956 graduate of IUSD who is with the Division of Health Manpower of the U.S. Public Health Service in Washington, D.C. The scholarship was named in honor of Dr. Johnson's parents and it is expected that there will be two scholarship awards each year. Dr. Johnson has expressed the hope that qualified recipients can be found who are interested in public health careers.

Mr. Carlson has not only expressed interest in a Public Health Service career, but also has made an outstanding academic record. His interest in public health dates back to the time when he spent several months doing volunteer work in Alaska, under the sponsorship of the Mission Program of North Park College. During his assignment in Alaska, he became aware of the health needs of the people, particularly in the underdeveloped areas. Mr. Carlson's wife is a nurse and she has also expressed an interest in making a contribution to public health following her husband's graduation from Dental School.

THE BELLS OF MICHIGAN STREET ... Last spring Hal Jaynes, Producer-Director in the Audio-visual Facility, asked Dean McDonald if he would like to have bells on the top floor of the School that would chime every 15 minutes, like the ones in Germany. The go-ahead was given and Hal's son, who was with the U.S. Army in Germany at the time, then recorded the bells of a historic church in Machenbach. Hal later "edited" the chimes that we hear every 15 minutes.

Besides the chimes, the School's new "Bell System" of recordings plays carillon concerts at 8 a.m., noon, 4 p.m., and 8 p.m. At Christmas time carols were played.

Dwight MacPherson, Associate Director of the Facility, Chuck Anderson, and Hal developed the system in their spare time with available equipment from Bowers Building storage. They put a "retired" amplifier back into operation, and designed a timer from a motor given to them by Dr. Grant Van Huysen.

The carillon music is from an ancient set of bells in Utrecht, Holland (some of the bells reportedly having been cast in the 14th Century), and was recorded by Dr. Martin Land, Graduate Student in Fixed and Removable Partial Prosthodontics, during a Christmas visit to his home in Holland.

Hal and his colleagues are now working on a recording of the carillon on the Bloomington campus. And he says that we shouldn't be too surprised if we hear Big Ben in the future. They're working on it.
