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COME SATURDAY MORNINGS, KIDS CAN TURN OFF CARTOONS, COME TO IUPUI

Two programs at IUPUI — one a venerable institution reaching back to the century's start, the other a veritable four-year-old "upstart" — attract youngsters to explore their creativity in the visual and performing arts. The Saturday School of the Herron School of Art, established in 1902 when Herron was a private art school, attracts junior high and senior high school students for 10 Saturdays from 9 a.m. to noon. The Saturday School in Theatre, now in its fourth year, aims its sights on children in grades 2-9 (and older).

The Herron program, which runs concurrently with the IUPUI academic year, includes classes in ceramics, basic drawing, and in perspective, portrait and figure drawing, jewelry, painting, photography, portfolio review, printmaking, etching, silkscreen, sculpture, watercolor and papermaking for students in grades 7-12. Registration for the spring semester will be Feb. 3 from 9-10:30 a.m. in the Museum Building auditorium. A general tuition of \$80 allows students to register for one course each semester. Attendees with scholarships from their schools can enroll for \$60. Program director is Lance Baber, associate professor of art education. For information, call 923-3651.

Meanwhile, back at the main campus, adults and children can clown around together as other young people get on with some serious and not-so-serious acting when the <u>Saturday School in Theatre at IUPUI also starts Feb. 3.</u> Creative drama or acting is offered to young people in grades 2-9 while the clowning class is open to people in grades 3 through adult and is especially fun for parents and children, as well as for grandparents and grandchildren. The School offers five separate classes taught by professional men and women in theater and drama, under the direction of headmistress Marita Scherer. She will teach Acting I for students in grades 6-7. Acting II for students in grades 8-9 will be taught by Tim Leonard. Professional clown Barry (Bingo) Hardy will teach the clowning class, including mime, make-up and movement. Children in grades 4-5 need no previous acting experience to enjoy the improvisational setting in the creative drama class taught by Nancy Eddy. Last, there's creative drama for youngsters in grades 2-3 who are taught by Sandra Hartlieb. All classes begin in the morning on Saturdays and run for 10 weeks. The cost is \$62 for each class. RECEPTION TO CELEBRATE BOOK PUBLICATION

A book about pre-revolutionary Russia by Scott J. Seregny, associate professor of history, has been published by the Indiana University Press. Russian Teachers and Peasant Revolution, The Politics of Education in 1905 is, according to William G. Rosenberg, "the first study in any language of the crucial social 'link' in rural Russia between broader society...and the people..." According to the IU Press, the book "chronicles the remarkable emergence in Russia, within the decade after 1895, of a modern professional movement uniting rural teachers...The events of 1905 thrust rural teachers into the vortex of peasant revolution which, paradoxically, threatened the teachers' status while holding out the promise of furthering democratization and political reform." To mark the book's publication, the history department has planned a reception for Jan. 26 at 4 p.m. in Cavanaugh, room 507. Friends, colleagues and interested persons are invited.

INFANT MORTALITY UPDATE ON CHANNEL 8 TUESDAY

WISH-TV will re-examine the infant mortality issue at 8 p.m. Jan. 23 in an hour-long news special built around the station's first initiative, "A Loss of Innocents," which was broadcast nearly a year ago. The update will cover new clinics in Marion County, the importance of early and regular prenatal care, as well as new information on the impact of drug abuse by pregnant women. A live panel discussion, including several campus experts, will focus on the current availability of public prenatal and early childhood care, as well as the status of the Indianapolis Campaign for Healthy Babies. "Familiar faces" will include Dr. Patricia A. Keener, professor of pediatrics, director of pediatric services at Wishard and medical director of the Campaign; Dr. Alan M. Golichowsky, associate professor of obstetrics and gynecology; Joanne B. Martin, assistant professor of nursing and member of the Campaign's advisory board, and Dr. Eric A. Yancy, Indianapolis pediatrician and clinical instructor in pediatrics. A major purpose of the program is to kick off publicity for the Marion County Health Department's Mother/Baby Healthline, the public link to health care and social issues.

WELCOME TO THE WRITING CENTER

The University Writing Center provides tutoring for all kinds of writing needs. Whether you have an essay, report, research paper, poem, short story, or resume, the Writing Center can help. Our staff consists of writing faculty and English major tutors. All of us are good writers and friendly critics, and we are ready to help you find ways to improve your writing at any stage of the writing process.

The services of the Writing Center are available to the entire IUPUI community. Faculty and staff, graduate students, and students of all disciplines are invited to bring any writing project to the Writing Center for help with finding a topic, focusing, organizing, writing, revising, improving mechanical skills, and overcoming writer's block.

While we don't provide a proofreading service, we will work with students who want to improve their own editing and proofreading abilities. Our instructors are trained to work with students who have special needs, including non-native English speakers. We also can help students format and document research papers. Our expansive library provides guidelines and models for all kinds of writing.

If you would like to improve your writing with a visit to the Writing Center, these simple guidelines will help:

-Call and make an appointment. Drop-ins will be accommodated if possible, but by mid-semester most appointment slots are filled a day or more in advance. Please call to cancel if you cannot come to the appointment.

-Come in while we can still help you. If you bring a final draft, we won't be able to work on improving the paper.

-Bring your assignment sheet, notes, or any instructions for the project.

-Be ready to work with your tutor. A Writing Center instructor will work one-on-one with you, so your contribution is essential.

The University Writing Center offers several services for students, faculty, and staff. We welcome your participation in any of these activities.

- 1. Tutorial appointments. Students can call ahead for one-half hour tutorial sessions. A writing sample should be brought to the first meeting with an instructor.
- 2. Drop-in help. Immediate help is available if appointments do not occupy all instructors. Students may stop by for answers to quick questions.
- 3. Reference library. The Writing Center has reference books, format and style manuals, dictionaries, thesauruses, composition texts, and dozens of other books on writing. Students may use the books in the Writing Center or check them out for two-week periods.
- 4. Handouts. The Writing Center has developed handouts on many subjects from punctuation to argumentation. Students may take the handouts as part of their session or as supplementary material to read on their own.
- 5. Workshops. During the semester the Writing Center offers workshops on various topics for students, faculty, and staff of all disciplines.

Two additional services available to instructors and the community:

- 1. Traveling teacher. Any IUPUI instructor may request our traveling teacher to assist in a classroom session. Possible topics are essay test preparation, methods for structuring research projects, or specific grammatical or composition problems.
