RYAN CITED BY IUPUI, GETS KEY TO CITY

Indiana University President John W. Ryan has received praise from the IUPUI campus and a key to the city of Indianapolis for a decade of service to I.U. The surprise presentations were made at a reception hosted by President and Mrs. Ryan, January 30, in Indianapolis.

I.U. Vice President (Indianapolis) Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., read a resolution approved by the Council of Deans, the Board of Advisors, and the Executive Committee of the Faculty Council at IUPUI observing that Ryan completed his tenth year of service as chief executive officer of the university January 26. The resolution praised him for his service to I.U., the state of Indiana, and to higher education.

Indianapolis Mayor William H. Hudnut III presented Ryan with a key to the city while thanking him and Mrs. Ryan for their leadership that has benefited the city and the state.

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SPOTLIGHT ON IUPUI

When the much-coveted 1982 National Sports Festival gets under way in Indianapolis a year from July, IUPUI will be the site of many events. The eight-day athletic extravaganza promises to draw some 2,500 athletes, many of whom will be stars in the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles. If current plans hold, most of all of the swimming and diving events will be scheduled for the natatorium (which will have made its debut the previous month with the 1982 Senior National Long Course Swimming Championships). Track and field stars will do their thing on the proposed 29-acre athletic fields area west of the natatorium. (Current plans call for seeking a \$1.9-million allocation from the General Assembly to build a track and playing fields. Contingent upon that funding, private-sector donors are supporting contribution of gifts of \$1.9-million more to build a 10,000-seat stadium.) The selection of Indianapolis as the site for these prestigious games is a feather in the community cap, and a giant step forward for IUPUI recognition—locally and nationally.




