\$2 million gift to fund endowed chair in geriatric medicine at IUSM-Evansville

A \$2 million gift from the Sol and Arlene Bronstein Foundation will allow the IU School of Medicine-Evansville to recruit an expert in geriatric medicine. The Sol and Arlene Bronstein Chair in Geriatric Medicine will work with others at IUSM and in the community to improve health care, develop new therapies, and rethink the way care is delivered to the elderly in Indiana and beyond.

The position also will play a leading role in educating medical students, community physicians, and other health care providers and trainees about how to meet the unique medical needs of the aging population.

"We know that many elderly patients face complex medical issues and frequently experience difficulty navigating the health care system," said Jay L. Hess, M.D., Ph.D., IU School of Medicine dean and vice president for university clinical affairs. "Thanks to the generosity of the Sol and Arlene Bronstein Foundation, we will develop more effective ways to care for them, and we'll train others to do the same. This is critically important not just in Evansville, but throughout the country, because the number of Americans age 65 and older is expected to double by the year 2060."

Sol and Arlene Bronstein were successful business leaders and philanthropists in the Evansville area. The foundation in their names was established upon their deaths.

Among many other causes, the Bronsteins cared deeply about the aging population and set in motion plans for what would later become The Communities of Solarbron for senior citizens. This gift, which will establish the endowed Sol and Arlene Bronstein Chair in Geriatric Medicine, will build upon that legacy.

"Arlene Bronstein had a soft spot for senior citizens," said Wayne Trockman, who serves as co-trustee of the Bronstein Foundation along with Old National Wealth Management. "She left specific language directing foundation gifts to benefit seniors in our community. With the creation of this cornerstone chair, as head of geriatrics at the Indiana University School of Medicine—Evansville, this gift will fulfill her wishes for many years to come."

The timing of the gift, as part of "For All: The Indiana University Bicentennial Campaign," also will allow the school to multiply the impact. The university is offering a historic gift-matching program for newly established faculty endowments and certain other endowed funds. As a result, income from the Bronstein Chair will be matched annually in perpetuity, greatly increasing the amount available to support geriatric research and education.

The goal is for the Bronstein Chair to be the first step toward the development of a robust research and education program focused on geriatrics at the Evansville campus.

"Our ultimate vision is to be home to several faculty focused on the senior population," said Dr. Steven Becker, director of the IU School of Medicine-Evansville. "We envision these individuals will be practicing physicians in the Evansville area who dedicate a significant portion of their time to research and education. This gift from the Bronstein Foundation will lay the foundation we need to build upon in the years ahead."

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Mirmira joins Indiana Biosciences Research Institute

Raghu Mirmira, M.D., Ph.D., Eli Lilly and Company Professor of Pediatric Diabetes, IU School of Medicine, has been appointed as the first Indiana Research Fellow and interim scientific director for the Indiana Biosciences Research Institute.

Dr. Mirmira, an internationally recognized diabetes and metabolic disease research scientist, will serve as the core laboratories director for IBRI. In these leadership roles, he will work closely with David Broecker, president and CEO of IBRI, to recruit additional research scientists to the institute, establish research operations, and commence project work.

"We are very excited to have Dr. Mirmira join IBRI's leadership team at this critical stage of establishing research operations for the institute," said Broecker. "Raghu is a unique and talented researcher with a track record of building nationally recognized research centers."

"Under Dr. Mirmira's leadership, the IU School of Medicine received NIH funding to support the IU Center for Diabetes and Metabolic Diseases," said Jay Hess, M.D., Ph.D., dean of the IU School of Medicine and vice president for university clinical affairs. "We look forward to working with IBRI to establish a highly collaborative environment across our institutions to conduct research that is high impact and ultimately will improve people's lives."

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Information about 2016 HSA contributions

IU employees enrolled in a Health Savings Account (HSA) for 2016 should take note of a few dates:

- IU's contribution will be deposited into HSA accounts with the second paycheck in January. This is Jan. 29 for employees paid either bi-weekly or monthly.
- The minimum annual employee contribution of \$300 is required for enrollment, and the first deduction will be taken from the first paycheck in January. That was Jan. 4 for employees paid monthly and Jan. 15 for employees paid bi-weekly.

Feb. 6 is first student loan exit interview session for fourth year students

Fourth year medical student federal student loan borrowers are required by the U.S. Department of Education to participate in an in-person exit interview prior to graduation. This applies to fourth year medical students borrowing under the following federal loan programs:

- Direct Loan (DL) Federal Stafford (Subsidized or Unsubsidized) Loan
- Direct Loan (DL) Federal Grad PLUS Loan
- Federal Perkins Loan
- Federal Primary Care Loan
- Federal Loans to Disadvantaged Students (LDS)

The Office of Medical Student Education will conduct three exit interview sessions in February as part of National Financial Aid Awareness Month. The two-hour sessions are scheduled based on the first letter of the participant's last name:

- A through G Saturday, Feb. 6; 10 am; Medical Science Building, Room B-26
- H through P Saturday, Feb. 13; 10 am; Medical Science Building, Room B-26
- Q through Z Saturday, Feb. 20; 10 am; Medical Science Building, Room B-26


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Indy – Attend Feb. 10 presentation on bioengineering and global health
