PRESIDENT HARDENBROOK ADDRESSES DELEGATES--

At Monday morning's General Meeting, Mr. Donald Hardenbrook, National President of Junior Achievement, Inc., spoke to the delegates about an organization unequaled in caliber by any other organization in this country--Junior Achievement.

President Hardenbrook stated that throughout history, America has been moving along on great tides of thought. Now a perilous undercurrent of thought is moving America in a direction that could lead to our economic downfall. To find out about the events in today's world, one has to read more than the headlines to understand fully what is happening. One trend of thought which is little understood by the average citizen is that concerning the transfer of free private capitalistic enterprise to the control of the government. Can free enterprise survive under this type of situation? Can it satisfy the people and the rising revenue of the government? A change of this sort would not happen in an instant. It would happen over many, many years, through laws voted on and passed by the public and the elected officials. It would happen, perhaps, even without the awareness of the general public.

The future of this, or any nation, is no better than the character of its young people. Let us look for a moment at this character...Of the high school students questioned in a recent poll, 62% said that a worker should NOT produce all he can; 42% believed that large companies should be broken down into smaller companies; 63% supported government ownership of banks, railroads, and steel companies; 41% did not believe in freedom of the press; and 43% believed that price control did not affect man's freedom. These students were intelligent, but they did not have the opportunity to learn about free enterprise because sound economics and the values of (continued on p.2, col.1)
