

Featuring Dr. Yogesh Joglekar

All great students have had at least one great mentor. Dr. Yogesh Joglekar, an assistant professor of physics in the IUPUI School of Science has served in this role for dozens of undergraduate and high-school students. His success can be measured by the number of scientific articles he has jointly authored with his students (six at last count) or by the research awards his students achieve (last year's Chancellor Research Scholar) or perhaps more directly by the wide diversity of students he has taken under his wing. A visit to Dr. Joglekar's group is likely to reveal highschool students, first-year undergraduates, senior capstone students, and graduate students involved in theoretical research, with advanced students mentoring their less experienced compatriots, all caught up in the self-discovery associated with experience-based learning. Indeed, Dr. Joglekar understands the importance of learning by doing and applies this approach in his classroom as well as his research group. He challenges his students to engage with science in the everyday world around them, from cell phones and computers to car mirrors. The Center for Research and Learning relies on dedicated mentors such as Dr. Joglekar to spread the mission of engaged learning represented by IUPUI's RISE to the Challenge initiative. Dr. Joglekar has worked with students in a number of CRL programs, including the Undergraduate Research Opportunities Program and he continues to mentor students in the Louis Stokes Alliances for Minority Participation, and Ronald E. McNair Program. Our students and academic community at IUPUI have benefited greatly from Dr. Joglekar's commitment to converting student potential to student attainment.
