Upon motion of Mr. Stempfel, seconded by Dr. Pantzer, the salary of Mr. Rath was raised to \$400 per month, and that of Mr. Steichmann to \$125 per month, beginning January 1.

Mr. Rath presented plans of the Wardsworth building at 13th and Broadway, for discussion with reference to dormitory possibility.

Mr. Lieber reported that his brother, Mr. Herman Lieber, has offered to erect a cottage at Camp Brosius to be used by him and his family during the summer as long as they wish to stay in it, and to be used by the College for other summer guests during the rest of the season; the cost of room and board for himself and family to be applied on the purchase of the cottage at cost. The offer was accepted.

Mr. Lieber reported that the work of putting the new dormitory in order was progressing satisfactorily. New furniture has been ordered, and Mr. Kurt Vonnegut has been asked to make a plan for changing the entrance to each apartment so as to provide privacy for the girls in the front rooms. Mr. Lieber's action was approved.

Mr. Scherer made a verbal report on Hotel Camp Brosius. Suggestions as to changed were laid over until a later meeting.

The Board ordered the varnishing of the floors in the large lecture room, the library, the hallway on the lower floor, and the secretary's office; provided, however, that the house committee be requested to pay for this improvement.

Several applications of students for refund because of leaving the camp before its close, were rejected.

September 22, 1923.

Present: Franklyn Vonnegut, Stempfel, Lieber, Rath, Richardson.

Mr. Rath reported that the class would consist of about one hundred and forty students and that seventy-nine women were registered for the dormitory.

The Administrative Board requested the use of the auditorium for classepurposes and the use of the ladies' rooms for study rooms for girls. Mr. Stempfel was authorized to see the Board of Directors of the Athenaeum regarding this matter.

The salary of Mr. Romeiser was increased to \$1500.00, payable in ten installments.

October 23, 1923.

Present: Franklin Vonnegut, George Vonnegut, Lieber, Rath, Pantzer. Richardson.

Mr. Rath reported that forty-three men and ninety-seven women had been admitted to the college. He recommended the awarding of a two-year scholarship to George Jacquin and a one-year scholarship to Harold Hahn, Harry Dippold and Arthur Hermann. The recommendation was concurred on, thus making an exception in the case of Arthur Hermann and Harold Hahn, both being members of the Wisconsin District.

The Women's Auxiliary of the Turnverein permitted the use of its rooms as study rooms for the women students. Mr Rath was instructed to write a letter of thanks to the organization.

Mr. Rath reported the following changes in the faculty: Dr. Mumford resigned and Dr. Hofmann was engaged to give a course in Physical Diagnosis and Anthropology while Miss Crozier will give a course in Corrective Work. Mr. Altschuller was engaged for the course in Music.

The salary of Mr. Baumgartner was increased to \$5.00 per period.

The board called a meeting with the non-resident members for Friday and Saturday, November 30th and December 1st.

All other recommendation contained in Mr. Stecher's report on the last summer session were referred to the Board of Trustees for consideration and formulation of plans.
