When I came here October 2, 1944 there were 16 members of the Assisting Staff and 42 Faculty members. Everybody knew everybody and since at that time we had only the front part of the building it was easy to get everywhere in no time! Now we have at least 135 members of the Assisting Staff and our Faculty numbers over 200. Quite a change in 27 years!

The first class I helped to select numbered 21 -- we have just selected 120 students for the 1971 Freshman Class. So time and tide change a lot of things.

It has been a wonderful 27 years and I am particularly grateful to all the members of the Faculty, Assisting Staff and Housekeeping Staff for the wonderful cooperation they have given me during these years. We have had many problems and many hurdles as we built additions, increased students and staff but through it all everyone has been most gracious and kind to me and believe me I shall never forget you all. It is a pleasure to know that I can quit, feeling that it has been good to have been here and to have contributed something to the lives of so many people. We have graduated 1859 students since I joined the staff so many moons ago, and they are all my "boys" and thankfully a few "girls". As I have laughingly told people, Dr. Van Huysen has often referred to the dental school as "Mrs. Harvey's school for boys" and I think he has of late been adding the word "wayward"! but he doesn't mean that.

"I hope all of you will give Mrs. Becka Snider, who is taking my place as Recorder, the same fine cooperation I have received. May God bless all of you and I shall be seeing you from time to time as I know I will have to come back now and then to be a sidewalk superintendent or something for the new part of the building; but most of all I shall want to see all of you."

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MRS. BEA GORDON IS A GUEST CORRESPONDENT this month, and has provided the following reminiscences:

"Forty years ago I walked in the College Inn to work and liked it so well, I just stayed on.

So many changes in all these years. There was no Dental School in 1931. Just an empty lot used for dumping. Just about the only buildings were Long, Coleman, the old Medical School, and the two stucco buildings between Long and Coleman. Ball Residence was there, but a large addition was built on later. There was a large hill east of Riley Hospital and when it rained water would collect in a valley next to the hospital. Every time it rained the medical students put up signs saying "Lakeside Lots for Sale." Government WPA workers leveled the hill later.

"Streetcars were in style and the fare was a nickel. The tracks later were dug up on Michigan Street and the streetcars were replaced by trackless trolleys. Traffic was not the problem we have today.

We really had a lot of fun years ago. The doctors and nurses came over to the Inn and brought their banjos and accordions and pushed back the tables and danced and sang till 11:00 p.m. Back then the curfew for nurses was 10:00 p.m. except on weekends.

The Dental School Building was started in 1933 and occupied in 1934. The first year we also had some mortician students using part of the Dental Building. Two of them still come back and stop in and say hello.

Where the Union Building stands was one of the Indianapolis city dumps. All refuse was taken by horse and wagon and dumped. Then gradually other buildings and hospitals were built and the campus really started looking beautiful.

When I look back over the years I wouldn't trade all the memories and all the wonderful people I have met. I can go on vacation in a lot of states and can always call or visit a dentist I've met in forty years. I also couldn't have run the Inn without my co-worker, Katie Yancey, who has been with me 29 years. I hope to be around for forty more so I can watch the campus grow.

The first time that I realized just how long I'd been at the Inn was when students graduated and then sent their sons through and then they graduated and said, "Stick around, we'll send our sons next."

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
