A meeting of the Executive Committee was held at noon EST on March 24, 1987, in the office of the International Secretary by conference telephone call. President Frank J. DiNoto presided.

A motion was made by Vice-President Lusche, supported by Vice-President Jackson, and unanimously carried, as follows:

WHEREAS, approximately 45 employees and retirees are provided with group health and life insurance through Metropolitan Life Insurance Company,

AND WHEREAS, coverage under that plan will increase significantly as of May 1, 1987,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That effective May 1, 1987, Kiwanis International will discontinue its health insurance program with Metropolitan Life Insurance Company and instead provide this coverage from Lincoln National Life Insurance Company,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That coverage provided by Health Maintenance Organizations (HMOs) be provided by Metro Health, Inc. and Health Plus, Inc., the latter replacing Maxi Care, Inc., also on May 1, 1987, AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That effective May 1, 1987, the employees' required contribution for coverage from Lincoln National be reduced from 30% of the premium to 10% and that the International Secretary be authorized to approve a one-time increase effective May 1, 1987, in an amount equal to the 10% cost of the insurance for employees in grades 1 through 12,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board reserves the right to review the program and, if required, adjust the employee contribution percentage in the future.

Upon motion made by President-elect Kaiser, supported by Vice-President Lusche, and duly carried, it was:

RESOLVED, That the mandatory criteria that must be met for a Governor to achieve a distinguished governor's award for 1987-88 be changed by adding a new section 2. The revised version would read as follows:

1987-88

DISTINGUISHED GOVERNOR'S

AWARD

The following mandatory criteria must be met for a governor to achieve a DISTINGUISHED GOVERNOR'S AWARD:

- 1. The district must achieve a point score of 1320 or more in the District Administrative Excellence Award Program.
- 2. The governor must have attended the Governors-elect Conference, the International Council, the International Convention and any one of the Regional Conferences for District Governors (if the convention and a regional conference is held on the continent on which the governor resides).
- 3. During the administrative year, the governor personally must sponsor at least three (3) new active members, including one in his own Kiwanis club.

The meeting adjourned at 1:25 p.m., its business having been completed.

MINUTES

OF THE MEETING OF

THE KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL BOARD OF TRUSTEES

MAY 12-17, 1987

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Kiwanis International was held at the International Office in Indianapolis, Indiana, May 12-17. Those present: Frank J. DiNoto, President; Anton J. Kaiser, President-elect; Donald E. Williams, Immediate Past President; J. Donovan Jackson and Noris A. Lusche, Vice-Presidents; Gene R. Overholt, Treasurer; Kevin W. Krepinevich, International Secretary; Morton O. Alper, D.D.S., Wilbur J. Blechman, M.D., C. A. Dillon, Jr., W. Donald Goodfellow, Q.C., Kurt K. Huber, M.D., William L. Lieber, Don Miles, John D. Morton, Sr., Kenneth W. Smith, D.C., Arthur D. Swanberg, Avelino V. "Beling" Tanjuakio, Robert A. Wagner, Trustees.

Also present were: Donald R. Collins, Assistant Secretary for Administration; Larry J. Horney, Assistant Secretary for Communications and Education; Speegle Berry, Assistant Secretary for Membership; Andrew C. Tinker, Assistant to the International Secretary. The meeting was called to order by President Frank J. DiNoto on May 14, 1987, at 7:30 a.m. The invocation was given by Vice-President Jackson.

The Report of the International Committee on Resolutions was presented by Ernest Sturch, Jr., its chairman. (See "Exhibit 1.") He reported that the Committee had adopted the following introduction:

INTRODUCTION

The following resolutions are submitted by the Committee on Resolutions for consideration by the House of Delegates on Wednesday morning, July 8, 1987, at the 72nd Annual Convention of Kiwanis International in Washington, D.C.

These resolutions emanate from a process which involves recommendations received from clubs, districts, and other of Kiwanis entities International. They represent the committee's perception of some issues of our times to which Kiwanis clubs and Kiwanians can respond effectively. We know that Kiwanis clubs and Kiwanians will continue to develop programs to address critical areas of concern included in the resolutions approved by this delegate body in the past years, such as the family, world hunger, special children--both the underprivileged and the gifted and talented, drug and alcohol education, the environment, the aging, and spiritual responsibility.

The committee is appreciative of those who submitted resolutions for consideration and encourages others to become involved in making recommendations for future consideration by Kiwanis International.

Chairman Sturch reported that the Committee had adopted the following preamble.

PREAMBLE

The number of critical challenges for contemporary society that Kiwanis clubs and Kiwanians can address with programs and projects is limited only by our resources, initiative, It is not possible to prescribe all the and creativity. which Kiwanis clubs should directions serve their in communities. The Resolutions process of Kiwanis International recommend service in selected areas. is one means to Resolutions propose a context in which individual clubs and Kiwanians can exercise leadership in their communities. These resolutions, past and present, express the unifying principles and values of Kiwanis. They clearly state what we believe. They are designed to emphasize and reaffirm the Objects of Kiwanis.

Our task is to accept the challenge of the opportunities inherent in these resolutions. Their ultimate objective is

to provide an agenda to build a better world for all people and to set a standard for Kiwanians in service to mankind.

Chairman Sturch reported that the following resolutions had been adopted by the Committee for presentation to the House of Delegates at the International Convention in Washington, D.C. These resolutions will be printed and circulated to the clubs as provided by the Bylaws:

RESOLUTION #1

Our Quest: Their Best

Kiwanis International reaffirmed a long-standing tradition in 1982 when it adopted underprivileged children as "a major and permanent Kiwanis concern." Since that time, many basic needs of underprivileged children have been addressed in Major Emphasis Programs. There is today a pressing need to focus on the social and emotional needs of underprivileged children.

Every young person needs a sense of self-worth. Without a belief that personal goals are attainable through one's own efforts, a young person has no reason to strive, and only the immediate experience is of value.

Young people face problems and challenges that affect their entire lives and often need help in developing the social and emotional skills necessary to make sound decisions. Decisions on using drugs or alcohol, premarital sex, career paths, and a myriad of other questions confront young people at increasingly early ages. Yet, for many children, the traditional sources of stability and preparation for such crises are not being provided.

Young persons need encouragement to be good citizens who will help others and take responsibility for their own actions. Good citizenship also includes understanding and responding to political and social issues.

Unfortunately, in a society as complex as ours, some of the children we seek to help become lost in the systems designed to protect them. Some young people simply need an advocate, someone to help voice their needs.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED That:

Kiwanians accept as a challenge, <u>Our Quest: Their Best</u>, and help young people achieve their potential.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED That:

Kiwanis clubs seek out in their communities those young people whose social and emotional needs are unmet and assist them through programs that: RESOLUTION #1 -- OUR QUEST: THEIR BEST 1. Help young people explore their abilities, such as mentoring;

2. Develop self-control and basic values, such as character eduction;

3. Encourage young people to participate in service activity, such as K-Family sponsored-youth groups;

4. Foster greater understanding of society, such as leadership development seminars; and

5. Protect deserving young people involved in the juvenile and family court system, such as court appointed special advocate programs.

RESOLUTION #2

Kiwanis Service -- A Worldwide Quest

The Objects of Kiwanis International provide a guideline of commitment for club members to perform community activities which direct, extend, and promote a challenge to serve. The need for community service exceeds the capability of the existing service clubs, and leaves an agenda of "unfinished business." The amount of service that can be performed by a club is limited only by the number and enthusiasm of its members and the quality of the projects undertaken.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED That:

Each Kiwanian and Kiwanis club strive to make the club the best it can be by:

1. Rediscovering the Objects of Kiwanis for guidance in selecting service projects by having a club meeting program on the Objects;

2. Increasing the number and quality of club projects to promote an awareness of Kiwanis in the community;

3. Designing club meetings to promote fellowship, education, and pride of membership; and

4. Actively contributing to growth of the K-Family, through member recruitment, retention, and new club building.

RESOLUTION #3

Human and Spiritual Values

The materialism of the eighties seems to be unlimited in this technological society. The current crisis of religious, ethical, and spiritual values is not one of technical procedures, but of our basic purpose. The Kiwanis Objects provide us with guidelines for living and ideals which can be an effective force for good in our communities. By action RESOLUTION #2 --KIWANIS SERVICE --A WORLDWIDE QUEST

RESOLUTION #3 -- HUMAN AND SPIRITUAL VALUES and example, Kiwanians and Kiwanis clubs must express their beliefs in the first Object of Kiwanis:

To give primacy to the human and spiritual, rather than to the material values of life.

We must accept the responsibilities of leadership and improve the quality of life in our communities by providing programs and activities which reflect these ideals.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That:

1. Each Kiwanian evaluate his life to determine if it exemplifies human and spiritual values rather than material values.

2. Each Kiwanis club evaluate its projects and programs to determine if they reflect the human and spiritual values of the community.

3. Each Kiwanis club promote club projects, activities, and programs designed to foster human and spiritual values.

RESOLUTION #4

Support for Sponsored-Youth Programs

The Kiwanis ideal of service to the community and leadership development are successfully taught to young people through our several sponsored-youth programs. Kiwanis is justly proud of the achievements of the younger members of the K-Family. By precept and example, we encouage the young men and women of Circle K, Key Club, Builders Club, KIWA Juniors, and similar youth groups, to experience the satisfaction that comes from devoting a part of one's life to serving others. In turn, the members of these youth organizations teach us that service is limited only by the desire to serve. Kiwanis is justly proud of the achievements of the younger members of the K-Family.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED That:

1. Sponsoring Kiwanis clubs acknowledge and accept their obligation to fulfill their responsibilities to Circle K, Key Club, Builders Club, KIWA Juniors, and other similar youth groups.

2. Every Kiwanis club be encouraged to support the K-Family by selecting, planning, and implementing joint service projects with sponsored-youth groups.

3. Kiwanis clubs give priority to the growth of K-Family sponsored-youth groups and similar youth groups by strengthening existing clubs and by sponsoring new clubs. RESOLUTION #4 --SUPPORT FOR SPONSORED-YOUTH PROGRAMS Chairman Sturch also reported two resolutions which will not be published.

IN MEMORIAM TO

PAST INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT MAURICE GLADMAN

Maurice Gladman, 1977-78 International President, exemplified the Kiwanis spirit. He was a builder in every sense of the word. He led the way in service, membership growth, and fellowship. A man of such great quality is rare.

A champion of service, Maury Gladman wrote, "You and I are happiest when we are involved, when we are doing something for someone else." He led Kiwanis through the "Safeguard Against Crime II" Major Emphasis Program, which developed in children and youth responsible attitudes and knowledge of basic crime deterrents.

The Kiwanis sponsored-youth organizations also benefited from his involvement and concern. As Maury Gladman explained, "Only when Kiwanians are dedicated to working with our sponsored-youth members do we achieve our full service potential."

Thanks to his determination and vision, Kiwanis built 438 new clubs during his presidency--the most clubs ever built in one year.

Later, the Kiwanis International Foundation, under his leadership as President, established the George F. Hixson Fellowship, expanded the Foundation's scope of service and support to the Kiwanis family, and for the first time in one year raised more than one million dollars.

While Maury Gladman loomed large as a leader who challenged us to reach record-breaking goals, he stood as a friend to the thousands of Kiwanians with whom he worked. He was simply "Maury" to all of us, from International Presidents to new members.

He was a friend to all of us, and we join with those who best knew this exceptional man to mourn his departure and remember all that Maury gave us.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED That:

The delegates at this 1987 Kiwanis International Convention, on behalf of all Kiwanians, express our sorrow to Rosabelle and the family at the loss of a great friend and compelling leader, Maurice Gladman. He was a man of unswerving ideals and dedication, balanced by compassion for all. IN MEMORIAM TO PAST INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT MAURICE GLADMAN

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED That:

A copy of this resolution be given to the family of Maurice Gladman, with deep and profound sympathy, from the many thousands of Kiwanians who gratefully accepted his leadership and knew him as a friend.

1. OUR QUEST: THEIR BEST

Kiwanis International reaffirmed a long-standing tradition in 1982 when it adopted underprivileged children as "a major and permanent Kiwanis concern." Since that time, many basic needs of underprivileged children have been addressed in Major Emphasis Programs. There is today a pressing need to focus on the social and emotional needs of underprivileged children.

Every young person needs a sense of self-worth. Without a belief that personal goals are attainable through one's own efforts, a young person has no reason to strive, and only the immediate experience is of value.

Young people face problems and challenges that affect their entire lives and often need help in developing the social and emotional skills necessary to make sound decisions. Decisions on using drugs or alcohol, premarital sex, career paths, and a myriad of other questions confront young people at increasingly early ages. Yet, for many children, the traditional sources of stability and preparation for such crises are not being provided.

Young persons need encouragement to be good citizens who will help others and take responsibility for their own actions. Good citizenship also includes understanding and responding to political and social issues.

Unfortunately, in a society as complex as ours, some of the children we seek to help become lost in the systems designed to protect them. Some young people simply need an advocate, someone to help voice their needs.

Therefore, be it resolved that:

Kiwanians accept as a challenge, <u>Our Quest: Their Best</u>, and help young people achieve their potential.

And be it further resolved that:

Kiwanis clubs seek out in their communities those young people whose social and emotional needs are unmet and assist them through programs that:

1. Help young people explore their abilities, such as mentoring;

- 2. Develop self-control and basic values, such as character education;
- Encourage young people to participate in service activity, such as K-Family sponsored-youth groups;
- 4. Foster greater understanding of society, such as leadership development seminars; and
- 5. Protect deserving young people involved in the juvenile and family court system, such as court appointed special advocate programs.

EXHIBIT B

2. KIWANIS SERVICE -- A WORLDWIDE QUEST

The Objects of Kiwanis International provide a guideline of commitment for club members to perform community activities which direct, extend, and promote a challenge to serve. The need for community service exceeds the capability of the existing service clubs, and leaves an agenda of "unfinished business." The amount of service that can be performed by a club is limited only by the number and enthusiasm of its members and the quality of the projects undertaken.

Therefore, be it resolved that:

Each Kiwanian and Kiwanis club strive to make the club the best it can be by:

- Rediscovering the Objects of Kiwanis for guidance in selecting service projects by having a club meeting program on the Objects;
- Increasing the number and quality of club projects to promote an awareness of Kiwanis in the community;
- Designing club meetings to promote fellowship, education, and pride of membership; and
- 4. Actively contributing to growth of the K-Family, through member recruitment, retention, and new club building.

3. HUMAN AND SPIRITUAL VALUES

The materialism of the eighties seems to be unlimited in this technological society. The current crisis of religious, ethical, and spiritual values is not one of technical procedures, but of our basic purpose. The Kiwanis Objects provide us with guidelines for living and ideals which can be an effective force for good in our communities. By action and example, Kiwanians and Kiwanis clubs must express their beliefs in the first Object of Kiwanis:

> To give primacy to the human and spiritual, rather than to the material values of life.

We must accept the responsibilities of leadership and improve the quality of life in our communities by providing programs and activities which reflect these ideals.

Therefore, be it resolved that:

- Each Kiwanian evaluate his life to determine if it exemplifies human and spiritual values rather than material values.
- 2. Each Kiwanis club evaluate its projects and programs to determine if they reflect the human and spiritual values of the community.
- Each Kiwanis club promote club projects, activities, and programs designed
 .
 to foster human and spiritual values.

4. SUPPORT FOR SPONSORED-YOUTH PROGRAMS

The Kiwanis ideal of service to the community and leadership development are successfully taught to young people through our several sponsored-youth programs. Kiwanis is justly proud of the achievements of the younger members of the K-Family. By precept and example, we encourage the young men and women of Circle K, Key Club, Builders Club, KIWA Juniors, and similar youth groups, to experience the satisfaction that comes from devoting a part of one's life to serving others. In turn, the members of these youth organizations teach us that service is limited only by the desire to serve. Kiwanis is justly proud of the achievements of the younger members of the K-Family.

Therefore, be it resolved that:

- Sponsoring Kiwanis clubs acknowledge and accept their obligation to fulfill their responsibilities to Circle K, Key Club, Builders Club, KIWA Juniors, and other similar youth groups.
- Every Kiwanis club be encouraged to support the K-Family by selecting, planning, and implementing joint service projects with sponsored-youth groups.
- 3. Kiwanis clubs give priority to the growth of K-Family sponsored-youth groups and similar youth groups by strengthening existing clubs and by sponsoring new clubs.

5. IN MEMORIAM TO PAST INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT MAURICE GLADMAN

Maurice Gladman, 1977-78 International President, exemplified the Kiwanis spirit. He was a builder in every sense of the word. He led the way in service, membership growth, and fellowship. A man of such great quality is rare.

A champion of service, Maury Gladman wrote, "You and I are happiest when we are involved, when we are doing something for someone else." He led Kiwanis through the "Safeguard Against Crime II" Major Emphasis Program, which developed in children and youth responsible attitudes and a knowledge of basic crime deterrents.

The Kiwanis sponsored-youth organizations also benefited from his involvement and concern. As Maury Gladman explained, "Only when Kiwanians are dedicated to working with our sponsored-youth members do we achieve our full service potential."

Thanks to his determination and vision, Kiwanis built 438 new clubs during his presidency--the most clubs ever built in one year.

Later, the Kiwanis International Foundation, under his leadership as President, established the George F. Hixson Fellowship, expanded the Foundation's scope of service and support to the Kiwanis family, and for the first time in one year raised more than one million dollars.

While Maury Gladman loomed large as a leader who challenged us to reach record-breaking goals, he stood as a friend to the thousands of Kiwanians with whom he worked. He was simply "Maury" to all of us, from International Presidents to new members.

He was a friend to all of us, and we join with those who best knew this exceptional man to mourn his departure and remember all that Maury gave us. Therefore, be it resolved that:

The delegates at this 1987 Kiwanis International Convention, on behalf of all Kiwanians, express our sorrow to Rosabelle and the family at the loss of a great friend and compelling leader, Maurice Gladman. He was a man of unswerving ideals and dedication, balanced by compassion for all.

And be it further resolved that:

A copy of this resolution be given to the family of Maurice Gladman, with deep and profound sympathy, from the many thousands of Kiwanians who gratefully accepted his leadership and knew him as a friend.

INTRODUCTION

The following resolutions are submitted by the Committee on Resolutions for consideration by the House of Delegates on Wednesday morning, July 8, 1987, at the 72nd Annual Convention of Kiwanis International in Washington, D.C.

These resolutions emanate from a process which involves recommendations received from clubs, districts, and other entities of Kiwanis International. They represent the committee's perception of some issues of our times to which Kiwanis clubs and Kiwanians can respond effectively. We know that Kiwanis clubs and Kiwanians will continue to develop programs to address critical areas of concern included in the resolutions approved by this delegate body in the past years, such as the family, world hunger, special children--both the underprivileged <u>and</u> the gifted and talented, drug and alcohol education, the environment, the aging, and spiritual responsibility.

The committee is appreciative of those who submitted resolutions for consideration and encourages others to become involved in making recommendations for future consideration by Kiwanis International.

PREAMBLE

The number of critical challenges for contemporary society that Kiwanis clubs and Kiwanians can address with programs and projects is limited only by our resources, initiative, and creativity. It is not possible to prescribe all the directions in which Kiwanis clubs should serve their communities. The Resolutions process of Kiwanis International is one means to recommend service in selected areas. Resolutions propose a context in which individual clubs and Kiwanians can exercise leadership in their communities. These resolutions, past and present, express the unifying principles and values of Kiwanis. They clearly state what we believe. They are designed to emphasize and reaffirm the Objects of Kiwanis.

RESOLUTION: LARGE UNREASONABLE COURT SETTLEMENTS ARE CREATING SERIOUS HARDSHIPS AT ALL LEVELS OF OUR SOCIETY

WHEREAS, insurance premiums have increased over the last decade to a point where coverage is no longer affordable at all economic levels of our society.

WHEREAS, a person or persons is entitled to a reasonable compensation for losses suffered because of negligence.

WHEREAS, the courts are providing settlement based on ability to pay rather than the magnitude of negligence.

WHEREAS, these large settlements have created an "Unscrupulous Contingency Fee Market", whereby large settlements are sought, knowing full well that it will be less expensive to settle than to fight.

WHEREAS, until the bubble breaks, the incentive is for insurance companies to continue growing, and enjoy an ever increasing supply of dollars flowing through their business.

WHEREAS, every person must assume some of their own risk by being here, and loss of life, limb or loved one only has certain economic value.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL encourages new standards in our courts, and a code of ethics within our legal profession, to the highest echelon of the United States Government, to reverse this trend, and to once again achieve reasonable remuneration for our losses. There are 12 to 15 of these clubs in Cameroon, and their establishment is developed by the permanence of their projects.

PROPOSITION:

French and English-speaking Black Africa Project oriented toward youth of 10 to 20 years of age, helping them to live "normally" in order to prepare them for adulthood. We can thus approach the problems of (character) education, instruction, health, and hygiene.

MESSAGE OF THE PRESIDENT

to the

International Board of Trustees

May 15, 1987

Shortly, two-thirds of this administrative year will be completed. Our organization continues to provide a variety of community services needed worldwide. Kevin Krepinevich has assumed full responsibilities as our International Secretary, and he is giving needed leadership and guidance at our International Office. Also, since our meeting last January, Mary Jane and I have completed all but two of our official visits to districts. These will be visited within the next month. We also attended the Asia-Pacific Conference. Each of our visits has been most gratifying. We have had the opportunity to exchange ideas with Kiwanis leaders and to see many of the worthwhile projects undertaken by our members. Our Major Emphasis Program, Make Miracles Happen, continues to be inspirational and motivational.

Last week, the United States Supreme Court rendered its decision in the Duarte Rotary Club case and has required Rotary to accept women membership in clubs located in states with certain public accommodation laws. Since Kiwanis is similar to Rotary, in a majority of states in the United States, identical legal requirements may apply.

Our members are looking to this Board for the leadership needed at this time of change in membership requirements. The facts and issues must be set forth clearly and concisely, so that our members can be informed as they vote for proposed amendments at our International Convention. Our members will accept the current challenge and make it into an opportunity for increased strength and service.

Some of the other priority items of concern which I am requesting the appropriate Board committee to consider include:

- 1. A possible limitation of personal liability of international, district, and club officers, trustees, or directors by bylaw amendments, legislation, or other appropriate means (Administration)
- 2. The appointment of an internal auditor (Finance)
- 3. The appointment of a special committee to review all paper work, printing, and mailings (Administration)
- 4. The appointment of a special committee on Kiwanis International-Kiwanis International-Europe finances (Finance)

- 5. The development of pilot programs to increase membership, including the expansion of Project 39, the rebuilding of flagship clubs, the proper organization of new clubs, the rebuilding of low-membership clubs to charter strength or more, the recruitment of retirees as club members, and the utilization of the Toastmasters' concepts to attract younger members (Member Services)
- 6. The appointment of a special committee for the seventy-fifth anniversary of Kiwanis (Executive)

The special Committee on Federations should complete its responsibilities to determine the changes necessary to authorize federations and define their duties and responsibilities.

I also recommend that the Conference for Governors-elect be held during the latter part of the first quarter of the administrative year. To effectively serve as a governor, the governor-elect must plan his years of service both as governor and governor-elect. By holding the conference earlier, responsibilities for both years should be covered, better planning will result, and the year of leadership as governor will become more effective. The Major Emphasis Program, if not complete at this time, can be provided by correspondence and at the International Convention.

I continue to be impressed by the efforts and dedication of our Board of Trustees and our current team of governors. Many of our governors will achieve the goals that they have set. Together you are taking time to care and are making miracles happen.

MESSAGE OF THE PRESIDENT-ELECT

to the

International Board of Trustees

May 1 , 1987

More of this year of the Miracle Makers has now passed than remains of it, a fact which has great significance to one who has reason to expect to be elected our next International President in some eight weeks.

Since our last Board meeting, Mim and I have, of course, lived in and met the obligations of the present, but virtually all our waking hours are focused on the future which, for us, in a sense, begins on the evening of July 8, 1987. Notwithstanding all our considerable efforts and progress, still more remains to be done to prepare for our 1987-88 administration.

For the benefit of future presidents-elect, I will again in this message first give a brief account of the highlights of our activities since our last Board meeting:

In January: Immediately following our meeting, President Frank, Assistant Secretary Larry, and I attended the year's second meeting of the Kiwanis International-Europe (KI-E) Board and Council in Zurich.

In February: Most of the month, fortunately, allowed time for local Kiwanis commitments, paper work, thinking, and personal matters, including the none-too-soon at-least-temporary closing of my office. At month's end we attended our own district's mid-winter conference.

In March: We experienced and survived a three-day visit from Assistant Secretary Larry for interviews and local site inspections preparatory to his writing the customary article on the new president and his family for the October issue of the <u>Kiwanis</u> magazine. Then a trip to the International Office for meetings with staff and the annual meeting of district secretaries. And finally back "home" to be the honoree at the silver anniversary convention of the New York Circle K District.

In April: Still home for the official visit of our District Governor to our Long Island North Division and for the organizational meeting of a new, and perhaps new kind, of Kiwanis club, in a large industrial plant. Then to the New England District for a lengthly visit to the Pediatric Trauma Center and two evening functions, all at the invitation of the Governor and Governor-elect. Next a formal Hugh O'Brian Youth Foundation affair at New York City's Waldorf Astoria, then, the next day, off to Indianapolis for the all-important Governors-elect Conference, followed by a day with the Chairman of the Seattle convention's host committee and staff. The month ended with our departure for Aachen, Germany, to attend, as 1986-87 counselor, the convention of our Austria-Germany District.

In May: Return from Europe on the 6th, after a three-day vacation; paper work, then leave for Indianapolis on the 11th for meetings with staff and the Resolutions Committee and this Board meeting.

Next, permit me a few comments triggered by some of the experiences mentioned above:

- o Having now attended two meetings of the KI-E Board, I agree with those on both sides of the Atlantic who believe that the functioning of that Federation's Board, and perhaps even its structure, leave something to be desired. Also, it appears that there remain differences of opinion among KI-E leaders and districts regarding several significant aspects of the proposed Model Federation Bylaws, which may or may not be resolved before or at the KI-E convention in Bordeaux in June 1987; and, as President Frank has recently again pointed out, the financial arrangements between KI and KI-E are still very much in need of clarification and adjustment.
- o After discussions with President Frank and staff, I informed the District Secretaries at their March meeting that the International Committee of District Secretaries initiated by Frank would be continued next year. Without intending to set any procedural precedent, I have reappointed the current chairman and two members of the present committee, for continuity, and replaced the other two excellent present members, for new insights. Also, with some trepidation because the Secretaries were meeting <u>before</u> my meeting with next year's Governors, I used the opportunity of the meeting of these very important members of the 1987-88 team to share with them many of our ideas and approaches for next year.
- o In my opinion, the Hugh O'Brian Youth Foundation and the concept of Kiwanis district involvement with pediatric trauma centers, as well as a limited number of other programs, can and should receive all the support which Kiwanis International and the Kiwanis International Foundation (KIF) can reasonably give them each year, regardless of whether they "fit" under a given year's MEP, especially if they are under the "umbrella" of "Underprivileged Children -- A Kiwanis Concern."
- o Regarding last month's Governors-elect Conference, at this writing I have not yet received the staff's summary and analysis of the participants' critiques. However,

based upon oral and written comments of some Governors-elect, a cursory review of the critique forms by staff, and the post-conference meeting of faculty and staff, the conference was a real success. While perfection was not attained, we may well have reached the point this year where only fine-tuning will be necessary for future years. My sincere thanks and appreciation go to the Board Committee on Education and Leadership Development under Chairman Don Jackson and members Mort Alper, C. A. Dillon, and John Morton, to all other faculty members, and to staff. who gave of themselves so unstintingly and effectively to bring us to this high level of achievement in this most important leadership-training and team-building conference of the year. The enthusiastic participation and response of the Governors-elect, virtually to a man, bode well for next year.

o Our trip to Austria-Germany left me with many positive and uplifting emotions about our European Kiwanians, more than I can include in this message. I'm sorry to say that I also, again, came away from this overseas visit with the gnawing feeling that we here in the United States, the wellspring of the internationalization of our movement since 1961, have somehow over the years -- wittingly or not, avoidably or not, necessarily or not -- let our non-North American areas down. For now, just one question: Why and whose responsibility is it that after almost 25 years we still have far fewer Kiwanians in all of Europe than Lions and Rotary each have in just West Germany?

I'm pleased to report that thanks to the great efforts and cooperation of staff, our excellent 1987-88 MEP Project Guide and supporting materials have now been completed and printed. Also thanks to staff, the first-ever Club President's Guidebook to be published by International was completed before the Governors-elect Conference in April, and copies were distributed to all participants; likewise the excellent and new New Club Building and Development Manual which embodies our 1987-88 new club building approach and the revisions to the KIAR program. I urge all Board members to plan to become very familiar with all of these before embarking on this summer's district convention assignments.

Regarding agenda items for this meeting, I will ask for your approval of several additional International Committee appointments, mostly necessitated by declinations of earlier appointments received since our last meeting. And, on this Board's stance on the women's issue in the light of the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in the Rotary case, at this writing and pending our meeting with our attorneys, I will only comment that the delegates to our coming convention once again have the right to expect their elected leaders to give them, clearly and forthrightly, the results of our combined best judgment as to the best interests of our organization, all things considered. It is in the nature of things that most of what is decided and done at the Spring Board Meeting will not have or show its effects or results until the following year. Let us nevertheless remember that we are all pledged to work towards the achievement of President Frank's high goals and objectives for 1986-87, and that more than five months of this year remain.

REPORT OF THE INTERNATIONAL SECRETARY

to the

International Board of Trustees

May 15, 1987

As Don Williams mentioned in the January 23, 1987, report to the Board of Trustees, I am pleased to be making my first report as International Secretary. However, unlike Mr. Williams I hope this will not be my last as well.

The move from Tulsa and the transition of responsibilities from the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce to Kiwanis International has been as smooth as one can expect. My time since March 2, 1987, has been crowded with many opportunities for learning the purpose and direction not only of Kiwanis International but also the International Office. I am pleased to report that all indications are that both are moving in the same direction with the same purpose.

During my short tenure, I have also had the opportunity to begin to take steps to discuss new frontiers that can be addressed and have found the staff to be very cooperative and receptive to discuss these possibilities.

The priority during the first two months has been employee practices and morale. Steps have been taken to conduct a monthly employees meeting with communication a11 employees to improve and openness within the International Office. employee recognition program, based on An performance, has been initiated and to date has been well received. An appraisal system has been designed and will be implemented shortly to improve on the current system and give employees regular constructive critiques of their abilities and skills while identifying areas for needed improvement.

A management by objectives and results management system is being discussed with the senior staff; instruction and implementation for managers will begin shortly after the Washington D.C. Convention. This time table should allow for improved planning of responsibilities of all departments and enhance the budgeting process during the 1987-88 administrative year.

I am pleased to announce the retirement of the Assistant Secretary for Membership, Speegle Berry, effective May 31, 1987. Speegle has served Kiwanis in many capacities and has always been a strong advocate for the organization's growth. However, the reason I am pleased about his retirement is that he has agreed not to completely retire, but rather semiretire and continue as a part-time Field Service Representative for Kiwanis International serving in a consulting capacity. Due to Speegle's retirement, we are currently searching for a replacement and hope to fill the position in the very near future. I would also like to announce the retirement of Ray Jeanes effective May 31, 1987. However, due to accumulated vacation, Ray actually left the employment of Kiwanis International earlier.

As you know, the Supreme court found by a 7-0 decision against Rotary International. This has created a flurry of activity in associations across America, including Kiwanis. The Public Relations Department has been extremely helpful in disseminating information not only to the media but also to Kiwanis. A plan of action was developed in advance of the decision and information to all levels of Kiwanis from Past International Presidents to Lieutenant Governors began to flow immediately.

The Ridgewood, New Jersey, Kiwanis Club has taken action asking the Supreme Court to hear their case. Our legal counsel has informed us that it is unlikely that the Supreme Court will hear the case, but it may be as late as October before anything is official.

A great deal of time has also been spent in the area of finance. This includes the preparation of the budget proposal for the 1987-88 administrative year and the determination of the financial impact of the long range plan. Both have been prepared and distributed. The financial narratives with President DiNoto's assistance have been streamlined and have become more informative.

Since January, two very successful events were conducted--The District Secretaries' Meeting in March and the Governor-elect's Training Conference in April. We have received several positive comments on both programs and feel that their impact will be seen as a positive influence on the future of Kiwanis.

Another exciting aspect of my short tenure with the International office was the encouragement I received to join a Kiwanis Club. However, as each of you will learn, I believe in action and impact. Thanks to the assistance of Past International President Aubrey Irby I am pleased to announce that I have joined a Kiwanis Club. However, it is important to note that six short weeks ago the club was only a glimmer in Aubrey's eye. The fruits of our efforts will be evidenced this Thursday evening as we charter the Kiwanis Club of Keystone at the Crossing with approximately 50 The by-products of this club's organization have been a hands-on members. understanding of the new club building process and an opportunity to witness first hand the support of a division, a district and materials provided by Kiwanis International. This exercise will hopefully help increase my knowledge and understanding of the Kiwanis organization.

Please do not construe the brevity of my report to indicate that a limited amount of activity is occuring at the headquarters. As a rookie, I felt I should follow the old rule my father taught me and that was to do a lot of listening and keep my mouth shut. I am excited about the opportunities that lie ahead not only for me but also for Kiwanis International. From what I have seen, this is a vital and strong organization, and its potential for growth is incredible. I look forward to the opportunity to see the positive impact of the staff and the Board of Trustees as we work hand in hand to bring Kiwanis to its place of prominence it so richly deserves.

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE SPECIAL MEETING

Indianapolis, Indiana

Tuesday, March 24, 1987

A meeting of the Executive Committee was held at noon EST on March 24, 1987, in the office of the International Secretary by conference telephone call. President Frank J. DiNoto presided.

A motion was made by Vice-President Lusche, supported by Vice-President Jackson, and unanimously carried, as follows:

WHEREAS, approximately 45 employees and retirees are provided with group health and life insurance through Metropolitan Life Insurance Company,

AND WHEREAS, cost of coverage under that plan will increase significantly as of May 1, 1987,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That effective May 1, 1987, Kiwanis International will discontinue its health insurance program with Metropolitan Life Insurance Company and instead provide this coverage from Lincoln National Life Insurance Company,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That coverage provided by Health Maintenance Organizations (HMOs) be provided by Metro Health, Inc. and Health Plus, Inc., the latter replacing Maxi Care, Inc., also on May 1, 1987, AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That effective May 1, 1987, the employees' required contribution for coverage from Lincoln National be reduced from 30% of the premium to 10% and that the International Secretary be authorized to approve a one-time increase effective May 1, 1987, in an amount equal to the 10% cost of the insurance for employees in grades 1 through 12,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board reserves the right to review the program and, if required, adjust the employee contribution percentage in the future.

Upon motion made by President-elect Kaiser, supported by Vice-President Lusche, and duly carried, it was:

RESOLVED, That the mandatory criteria that must be met for a Governor to achieve a distinguished governor's award for 1987-88 be changed by adding a new section 2. The revised version would read as follows:

1987-88

DISTINGUISHED GOVERNOR'S

AWARD

The following mandatory criteria must be met for a governor to achieve a DISTINGUISHED GOVERNOR'S AWARD:

- 1. The district must achieve a point score of 1320 or more in the District Administrative Excellence Award Program.
- 2. The governor must have attended the Governors-elect Conference, the International Council, the International Convention and any one of the Regional Conferences for District Governors (if the convention and a regional conference is held on the continent on which the governor resides).
- 3. During the administrative year, the governor personally must sponsor at least three (3) new active members, including one in his own Kiwanis club.

The meeting adjourned at 1:25 p.m., its business having been completed.

EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

1987 Governors-elect Conference

The Committee reviewed and discussed the evaluations of 42 governors-elect, letters of congratulations received from various governors-elect, a letter of evaluation and report to Rotary International by the Rotary International Director of Education, and a staff analysis and recommendations for 1988. Copies of the "General Comments" section of the participant evaluation and the "Education Department Analysis" are provided as Exhibit A of this report.

During the discussion, staff noted that perhaps the most telling question on the evaluation form concerned the meeting of participant expectations. Among 1987 Conference participants, only two percent (one participant) did not feel the Conference met his expectations. This compares to 18 percent in 1986. The need for some specific improvements has been noted by the Committee. It has requested staff address these areas. Based on participant, faculty, and staff evaluations, some adjustments for 1988 are noted in the "Education Department Analysis" section of Exhibit A.

The primary focus of Conference faculty was to concentrate on the roles and responsiblities of district governors. According to the evaluation, this objective was achieved. Conference participants left the Conference on April 26th with a feeling of unity and a strong sense of accomplishment. Faculty and staff were commended for their efforts.

1988 Governors-elect Conference

The Committee reviewed the results of a survey of 1985-86 U.S. district governors designed to ascertain if the Governors-elect Conference should be moved to an earlier date. Of 17 district governors responding to the survey, 13 (76 percent) felt that the Conference should be held on an earlier date. Of the 13 who recommended an earlier date, 9 recommended late February or March. Two of the respondents recommended a November or December date, and the remaining two respondents felt January was more appropriate.

Based on the above results and considering scheduled meetings of the Board of Trustees, holiday periods, midyear conferences, and the development and production of manuals and other information pieces, the Committee recommends that the Governors-elect Program be held in early March, preceding the District Secretaries Meeting.

EDUCATION DEPARTMENT ACTIVITIES REPORT (January 28 - May 12, 1987)

The Committee reviewed Education Department activities since the January 1987 meeting of the Board of Trustees. Activities included completion of Leadership Training Programs in four districts; the new <u>Club President's Guidebook</u> was published and all Club Officer's and Lieutenant Governor's Manuals and other materials were prepared for distribution by May 15th (two months earlier than in 1986); budget development for 1987-88 and 1988-89; organization of the content elements for the 1987 Governors-elect Conference, participation in the Conference, and completion of participant evaluation and staff analysis reports; survey of 1985-86 district governors; meeting of district secretaries; and preparation of plans for the selection/training of trainers in 42 Kiwanis districts.

Education Department Plans (May through July, 1987)

The Committee reviewed the Education Department's plans through July 1987. These plans include conducting eight Leadership Training Programs; coordinating development/panelists for all forums, seminars, orientations and open discussion sessions for the 1987 International Convention; and development/marketing/solicitation of the trainer selection process and trainer selection.

Leadership Training Program for Club Presidents-elect

The Committee reviewed participant and observer evaluations of the first four Leadership Training Programs conducted in 1987. Further discussion was held, and the Committee is comfortable and satisfied that qualified staff is prepared to act as substitute trainers in the event that the Director of Education was unable to fulfill his duties (see Exhibit B, p. 1). The preparation of emergency staff trainer substitutes, and the selection process, timing, and minimum criteria for the selecting/training of Certified Kiwanis Trainers were also reviewed.

The Committee formally expressed its appreciation to staff for its program and achievements in education. We think it fair that in light of the positive results and solid plans for the future, that the Board should support what is becoming a total and consistent education program. From the base of the Governors-elect Conference, we plan to coordinate further education and training at the International Convention, International Council, and the Regional Conferences for Governors with the International President.

1987 GOVERNORS-ELECT CONFERENCE

EDUCATION DEPARTMENT ANALYSIS

The governors-elect, like any large group, possess different levels of knowledge, skills, and experience. They also differ in their learning styles and specific needs. The fact that 39 of 42 governors-elect who returned evaluation forms (93 percent) stated that the Conference "met their expectations," indicates that at least some portions of the Conference will be of value to most of these incoming district leaders. It should be noted that only one district governor-elect actually felt the Conference did not meet his expectations. Two other respondents did not respond to that particular query. In 1986 only 72 percent of the governors-elect felt that the Conference met their expectations.

Although the major elements of the Conference Agenda should remain in place for next year, adjustments must be made in the timing of certain elements, and a survey of governors-elect next October may reveal a need to add new topics and de-emphasize others. Specific faculty will change and the content of certain topics must be altered to focus more clearly on the roles/responsibilities of the governor.

Although fewer in number than in previous years, a number of governors-elect continue to request more time to interact and learn from their peers. Several took note of the fact that time allotted for small group interaction on Saturday morning was elminated and that table discussions which did occur during this time frame became unfocused and dissolved into one-on-one conversations not helpful to others at the tables. Clearly some staff responsible for leading table discussions failed to maintain control.

The Europeans generally were pleased with most of the Conference. We must engage them in a topic relevant to their needs during the discussion of sponsored youth.

Several technical flaws (microphones, not using the video projection system, etc.) need to be overcome. Also, while the Union Station activity was well-received, more time needs to be given to this activity.

Both the tour of our facility and free time with staff need to be more effectively organized. Although unnecesary for some topics, it is important to schedule time following certain presentations for questions and answers.

Late February or early March would perhaps be a more appropriate time for this training. Of 17 1985-86 district governors responding to a recent survey, 13 agreed that an early date was desirable. The majority of those favored an earlier date like late February or early March. We would need to obtain a schedule of district midyear conferences to avoid potential conflicts.

Communications

The Long Range Planning Committee commends the Magazine Department for the articles about different countries of the Kiwanis world. This committee suggests that Kiwanis activity within these countries be included, if possible, in future articles.

Missing Strategies for Certain Operating Objectives

It is requested that the Executive Committee advise the Long Range Planning Committee of the status of Operating Objective 27 (Continue to build a mutually beneficial relationship with the Kiwanis International Foundation).

The Board of Trustees is requested to determine if Operating Objective 28 (Determine and constitutionalize the optimal governance structure for Kiwanis International) and Operating Objective 29 (Determine and constitutionalize the optimal form of Board structure) should be studied in depth. Specifically, does the current structure have problems? If so, are those problems significant enough to warrant a detailed study that would provide recommendations to the Board. If the Board concludes that a study is warranted, this Committee recommends an Ad Hoc Committee be established to study the governance structure for Kiwanis first and then the optimal form of Board structure second. A budget should be assigned accordingly.

An example of concern of this Committee is the lack of standardized structure for different areas of the Kiwanis World. With the growth and expansion of Kiwanis International, we will face increasing problems in this respect.

Operating Objective 30 (Determine and implement the best method of delivering services and programs to clubs throughout the world), Operating Objective 31 (Establish an organized research program to yield a greater understanding of the needs and expectations of Kiwanis clubs and members), and Operating Objective 32 (Develop and implement minimum standards program [membership and service] for clubs), and Operating Objective 33 (Improve communication throughout the Kiwanis World) are items that our new International Secretary is requested to review as he is oriented on the Kiwanis International Office. After he completes his review, a report on each Objective to this Committee would be welcomed.

Recommendation #1

This Committee recommends that the future direction and purpose of this Committee be:

- a) Operating Objectives yet to be completed or approved by Board Committees be pursued to completion.
- b) Action Strategies yet to be approved by Board Committees should be so considered.
- c) All financial implications of the Action Strategies should be considered by the appropriate Board Committees.
- d) All Action Strategies should be submitted to the Board for approval.
- e) The Long Range Planning Committee is to ensure Action Strategies are implemented, with continual monitoring and reassessment.
- f) The Long Range Planning Committee will consider further areas as requested by the International Secretary or the Board of Trustees.

CONVENTION

Selection of a Site for the 1992 Convention

The Committee reviewed the information submitted by staff regarding the three cities bidding to host the 1992 Convention. By a majority vote, the Committee selected Indianapolis, Indiana, as the first choice for a 1992 host city.

Recommendation #1:

The Committee recommends that Indianapolis be accepted as the site for the 1992 Kiwanis International Convention.

I move that Recommendation #1 be adopted

Establishing Quotas for the 1988 Seattle Convention

The Committee discussed at length the proposed Seattle quotas, which were based on the formula devised by last year's Committee. This formula divides North America into three equal sections and assigns a percentage value to each region. Districts nearest the convention city are charged with a quota equal to 5% of their active membership; districts in the mid-distance range are charged with a quota equal to 3.5% of their active membership; distant districts are charged with a quota equal to 2% of their active membership. The Committee determined that this system of establishing quotas has merit, but does not address two key factors: 1) A district's recent convention attendance history, and 2) the total number of active clubs (and potential delegates) in each district.

With these additional factors in mind, the Committee developed a revised method of establishing quotas. This method combines three key elements: 1) a formula consisting of membership times distance to the convention city, 2) the number of active clubs in a district multiplied by two, and 3) a district's three-year attendance average.

By adding these three figures and dividing by three, the Committee thinks that results establish more equitable quotas. (See Exhibit A).

Recommendation #2:

The Committee recommends that the proposed Seattle quotas as illustrated in Exhibit A be approved.

I move that Recommendation #2 be adopted.

Implementation of a Club Registration Incentive

The Committee discussed the value of the 100% club registration incentive. Although no clubs registered 100% in Houston or have for Washington, there were 25 such clubs in Phoenix and 11 in Toronto; therefore, the Committee feels that the 100% club registration incentive should continue.

The Committee recognizes, however, that it is not likely for large clubs to register 100% of their active membership and thinks that alternate incentives should be offered to these large clubs. With this in mind, the Committee studied staff's recommendation to implement a "register ten club members and get one free" incentive. This type of incentive will encourage clubs with six, seven, eight, or nine members registered to push for additional registrations and secure the "eleventh one free." Additionally, this incentive is attainable.

Recommendation #3:

The Committee recommends that we continue to promote 100% club registration and implement an additional incentive of "registering ten club members and getting the eleventh one free," for the Seattle Convention.

I move that Recommendation #3 be adopted.

Washington, D.C. Sessions Agenda

The Committee reviewed the D.C. Sessions Agenda and deems it acceptable.

Washington, D.C. Pre and Post Convention Meeting Schedule

The Committee reviewed the Pre and Post Convention Meeting Schedule and it was approved; however, the following changes to the D.C. schedule from last year's schedule should be noted:

- 1) Board Committee Meetings traditionally beginning on Wednesday prior to Convention will begin one day earlier in Washington.
- 2) The President's Reception for Past International Officers traditionally held on Friday evening will be combined with the President-elect's reception on Saturday evening.
- 3) The KIAR Luncheon and Lt. Governors' Luncheon, both traditionally held on Monday, will take place on Wednesday.

Proposed Bid Specifications (Criteria for Cities wishing to host a Kiwanis

International Convention)

The Committee reviewed staff's proposed bidding criteria and found the criteria acceptable. (See Exhibit B.)

Geographical Rotation for the Kiwanis International Convention

The Committee discussed the ramifications of establishing a rotational pattern for the site of the Kiwanis International Convention, and has requested staff to prepare an agenda point on this subject for the October Board Meeting.

Consideration of Cities for the 1993 Kiwanis International Convention

The Committee recommends that our 1993 Convention be held outside of North America. With this objective in mind, the Committee reviewed staff's preliminary report on four European cities: Zurich, Nice, Lausanne, and Berlin. A fifth city, Munich, also will be visited by staff and a preliminary report compiled.

Based on the information presented, the Committee feels that Zurich and Berlin are less desirable destinations than Nice and Lausanne. The Zurich Convention Bureau has not followed through with their initial indication of interest by sending a formal bid book (which was due on April 15). Berlin lacks convenient accessibility and does not offer the wide variety of family tours available in the other cities.

The Committee requested staff to provide further information on Nice, Lausanne, and Munich.

Seattle Tour Booth at the D.C. Convention

The Committee agrees with staff that advance promotion of the Seattle Convention is imperative. With that in mind, the Committee encouraged staff to proceed with their plans to have a Seattle Tour Booth at the D.C. Convention so that information on pre and post convention tours can be distributed.

Legion of Honor/Prayer Breakfast

A request was made to study the feasibility of delegating to staff all responsibilities for future Legion of Honor Luncheons and the Prayer Breakfasts at International Conventions.

This change in procedure would have a significant impact on staff, particularly the Convention Department, Management Information Services Department, and Finance Department. Also, the impact it would have on the host clubs must be examined; therefore, the Committee requested staff to study the ramifications of this change and present their viewpoints as an agenda point at the October Board Meeting.

Sunday Morning Council Meeting in Washington, D.C.

The Committee approved the International Council Meeting Program agenda for Sunday morning, July 5. It is attached as Exhibit C. Staff will work with all Council program participants on details of the agenda during the coming weeks.

October Council Meeting Agenda

The Committee approved the format and work done thus far on the October 8-11 International Council Meeting, to be held at the Radisson Hotel, Indianapolis. It was noted that invitations to attend the Council Meeting and appropriate transportation/housing forms will be sent to all potential attendees before the Washington, D.C. Convention. The Committee requested staff to work with the President-elect in finalizing all additional details. The agenda is attached as Exhibit D.

Advertising

The Committee heard an extensive report presented by the director of advertising and reviewed sales for the current fiscal year to date. Preliminary totals through the June/July issue are approximately \$363,000, an increase of 13% over the same period last year. Fiscal year 1986-87 will easily be the best revenue year in the magazine's history, although advertising income might fall slightly below fiscal year budgets. Also reviewed were revenue comparisons for the past seven years. Trends, peaks and valleys discussed and analyzed.

Contrasts and comparisons between <u>Kiwanis</u> magazine and <u>The Rotarian</u> and <u>Lion's</u> magazine were drawn, and a perspective was established in regard to advertising.

Current and past information concerning Advertising Noncollectible Receivables was examined. This expense item (09-117-01) has been halved each of the past three years by tightening acceptance and collection practices. The Finance Department's role was acknowledged in achieving this success.

Advertising quality was a topic considered in depth. This area continues to be of concern to the Committee. A staff Editorial Board has been established to study this, as well as other magazine operations. This board consists of the executive editor, associate editor, art director, advertising director, and publisher.

<u>Kiwanis</u> magazine's Speakers Bureau and Reader Service programs received the Committee's attention. Recent activity reports covering both programs were reviewed, with special attention paid to the club and member impact of the Speakers Bureau.

The magazine's latest Readership Study was analyzed. Only preliminary figures are available, but the Committee will be receiving final compilations and published reports within four to six weeks.

In summary, <u>Kiwanis</u> magazine advertising has returned to peak levels of volume following an extended downward spiral which affected not only <u>Kiwanis</u> magazine, but also publications in the field. Revenues continue to grow higher, although at a lesser rate than that achieved in fiscal year 1984-85. <u>Kiwanis</u> magazine has passed all similar service club magazines in becoming the largest advertising producer.

Public Relations

Staff reported that more than 4,000 items have been distributed to local clubs during the past four months hoping to obtain the maximum amount of exposure at the local club level. These items included localized news releases, radio jingles, television spots, and numerous promotional flyers offering various public relations materials.

Kiwanis public service spots (PSA) continue to be aired on all three U.S. commercial television networks, including the two new U.S. First Lady Nancy Reagan spots recently produced. Production of Los Angeles Dodgers Manager Tommy Lasorda for Special Olympics has been completed and will be added to the 1987-88 PSA inventory. A report received from NBC stated that in 1986, 49 Kiwanis spots aired on the network (including six in prime time) compared to 18 the previous year. This represents a 172 percent increase. The one spot on the Bill Cosby Show was seen by over 60 million viewers and was valued in excess of \$380,000 for 30 seconds. The six prime-time spots on NBC alone were worth an estimated two million dollars.

Magazine ads continue to appear in <u>Time</u>, <u>Newsweek</u>, and <u>U.S. News & World Report</u>. This year, over 81 pages of space have appeared in these publications with a total audience of over 10,291,075 with an advertising value in excess of \$96,430.

Since the January Board meeting, another localized program was the satellite feed of our 1/2-hour documentary "Volunteers in Action" to over 900 television stations. Forty-five of the stations reporting aired either the "Volunteers in Action" or the PSA spots that were also on the satellite feed.

New programs underway include the development of a postage meter slug for members' use to promote Kiwanis as well as a 75th anniversary postage meter slug. Staff is still working to secure a 75th commemorative anniversary stamp in the U.S. and other Kiwanis nations.

The Kiwanis multi-media public service program on school-age drug abuse with U.S. First Lady Nancy Reagan recently has received a fifth award. The American Society of Association Executives (ASAE) judged this program to be one of the top 30 out of 2,500 programs submitted to this distinguished organization. Previously, the program won awards from ASAE, Chicago Public Relations Society, and the East Central District of Public Relations Society of America.

KIWANIS MAGAZINE

Editorial

The Committee reviewed recent and upcoming highlights in the magazine, noting with interest the number of promotional articles on the upcoming International Convention as well as plans for post-convention editorial and photographic coverage in the August issue.

In addition, the Committee noted that the magazine staff is continuing to develop editorial content of an international nature, including the return to the magazine of "Kiwanis Nation" feature articles with May's cover story on The Netherlands. New Zealand, France, and Switzerland will be the nations spotlighted in future issues.

EXHIBIT B

PROPOSAL GUIDELINES

FOR CITIES SEEKING TO HOST A KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

The preparation of a formal bid book is a very time-consuming effort. Reviewing the detailed information in these books and assessing the logistics of the proposal also are time-consuming; therefore, we urge all Convention and Visitors Bureaus to be certain that they understand our requirements before submitting a proposal.

All bid information, including hotel and convention center facilities, is to be prepared through the bidding city's Convention and Visitors Bureau. During the initial bid process, <u>NO INDIVIDUAL HOTEL OR ATTRACTION</u> <u>IS TO SEND PROPOSALS DIRECTLY TO THE KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION</u> <u>DEPARTMENT!</u> Similarly, during the initial bidding process, no hotel or attraction should call the Kiwanis International Convention Department for information. The Convention and Visitors Bureau is to handle the coordination of the bid package.

The Convention and Visitors Bureau should prepare five (5) complete bid books with dividers to include the following sections:

BIDDING DATES:

- 1) Official proposal and letters of support
- 2) Convention center space/availability
- 3) Proposed hotel package
- 4) Potential VIP Headquarter Hotel suggestions
- 5) Transportation information
- 6) Suggested tours/attractions
- 7) Restaurant information
- 8) Convention and Visitors Bureau assistance

To facilitate the preparation of the bid books, we are providing you with our specific requirements in each of the above-mentioned areas.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Kiwanis International reserves the right to select any city, regardless of location, convention center facilities, or hotel accommodations. Special consideration will be given to non North American cities interested in hosting our convention, and to North American cities whose overall attractiveness outweighs any other shortcomings that may exist.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Founded in 1915, Kiwanis International is one of the world's largest non-profit services organizations, boasting 8,229 clubs and 309,788 members around the world. Our convention, held annually in the latter part of June, attracts some 15,000 delegates, spouses, and children for an average stay of four days.

The purpose of our International Convention is threefold: education, elections, and fellowship. Our meetings, forums, workshops, and exhibits are educational tools used to develop the skills and leadership abilities of new club and district officers, and offer members a chance to exchange ideas. Our delegate sessions and business meetings are conducted to elect new International Officers and to vote on the important issues facing our organization. Our general sessions bring all Kiwanians and their families together for fellowship and inspiration.

Our official opening ceremonies (general session) take place on Sunday, but many attendees arrive on Saturday to visit the exhibit hall and to obtain their registration materials. Similarly, because our closing session is held on Wednesday evening, most attendees remain in the convention city until Thursday morning.

Kiwanis International encourages any city planning to submit an official proposal to host our convention to contact other Convention and Visitors Bureaus that have hosted a Kiwanis International Convention. For your convenience, we are providing information on our past history (see Exhibit A), as well as a copy of our most recent convention program (enclosure).

For your general information, Kiwanis International has its own Housing Office and we do not utilize the housing services of the Convention and Visitors Bureau. Kiwanis International prepares a convention registration and housing form which is mailed to all Kiwanis clubs around the world (and is subsequently reproduced in our <u>Kiwanis</u> magazine). This form is completed by the Kiwanian and returned to our office for processing. It includes information on arrival/departure and room type, and the information is entered into our computer and reprinted onto our reservations cards. We mail our reservations to the hotels on a weekly basis.

Kiwanis International pre-assigns its districts (a district being one or more states) into hotels, and district assignments are listed on the back of the registration form; therefore, every Kiwanis International hotel in the convention city becomes a headquarter hotel to one or more since everyone registering from a given district districts, is automatically assigned into his district hotel. One major hotel is designated as the VIP headquarter hotel because it will house Kiwanis International's Board of Trustees, Past International Officers, and other VIP personnel. Additionally, the hotel designated to house our VIPs will be the site of several important meetings and meal functions prior to and during the International Convention.

SECTION ONE

OFFICIAL PROPOSAL AND LETTERS OF SUPPORT

The Convention and Visitors Bureau of the bidding city should prepare a formal letter of invitation to Kiwanis International to hold its annual convention in said city. This letter of invitation should be supported by letters of invitation from city and state government officials. These letters should include, but not be limited to, invitations from the host city's mayor, the host state's governor, and other state and/or local officials. Letters of support from local corporations may be included in this section.

In addition to these letters of invitation from the Convention and Visitors Bureau and city/state government, the Bureau should gather and included, in this section of the proposal, letters of support from the involved:

- Kiwanis District Current District Governor and District Secretary (mandatory), as well as other past district officers (optional).
- 2) <u>Kiwanis Divisions</u> Current Lt. Governors in area divisions (mand@tory), as well as past Lt. Governors (optional).
- 3) <u>Kiwanis Clubs</u> Current club presidents of clubs in and around the bidding city, as well as club secretaries and supportive members of the clubs (optional).

IMPORTANT NOTE: No city will be considered as a potential site for a Kiwanis International Convention if the appropriate letters of support from area Kiwanians (as noted above) are not included in the official bid proposal.

SECTION TWO

CONVENTION CENTER SPACE AND FACILITIES

Although our preferred dates are the third or fourth week in June (Sunday to Wednesday pattern), we will consider alternate sets of dates if all other elements of the proposal are in order.

Exhibit Hall and Meeting Room/Forum Requirements

A minimum of 70,000 square feet (preferably 100,000 square feet) of column free exhibit space will be required for non-commercial exhibits.

MOVE IN DATES:Tuesday - FridaySHOW DATES:Saturday - WednesdayMOVE OUT DATES:Thursday

Space is required for a minimum of 18 individual meetings or forums per day from Sunday through Thursday. If this amount of exhibit hall/meeting room space does not exhist, Kiwanis International may consider altering its program to reduce overall usage of space or to utilize other proposed alternatives.

Arena or Proposed General Sessions Location Requirements

Seating capacity for our General Sessions should not be less than a total of 10,000 seats in front of a 40' X 60' stage. A maximum of 2,500 of these 10,000 seats should be on the floor level. The remaining seats should be either an arena format or telescopic seating. Location of the general sessions preferably should be column free. Cities unable to meet these requirements should offer alternate facilities for our consideration.

MOVE IN DATES:Wednesday - FridaySHOW DATES:Sunday - WednesdayMOVE OUT DATES:Thursday

NOTE: Saturday is a rehearsal date.

Auditorium/Music Hall Requirements

An auditorium or music hall with a minimum of 1,500 (preferably 3,000) individual auditorium seats is needed and will be used from Sunday to Thursday. If no auditorium exists, an alternate facility may be considered and/or changes to our traditional program may be made.

Office Space Requirements

Two meeting rooms, approximately 800 square feet each, are required beginning three weeks prior to the opening session. One of these rooms will house the convention department staff offices and the other will serve as an area for our registration packets (and personnel). One additional meeting room, a minimum of 1,200 square feet is required beginning eight to ten days prior to the opening session for the remainder of our staff personnel.

THE ABOVE-MENTIONED CONVENTION FACILITIES MUST BE AT NO CHARGE TO KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL. ALL FACILITIES MUST BE AIR-CONDITIONED, INCLUDING MOVE-IN AND MOVE-OUT DATES, AND NORMAL HEAT, LIGHT, POWER, AND CLEAN UP MUST BE PROVIDED. IT IS FURTHER REQUIRED AND UNDERSTOOD THAT THE FIRST ROOM SET-UP OF ALL FACILITIES (WITH THE EXCEPTION OF OUR MAIN STAGE AREA) WILL BE ON A COMPLIMENTARY BASIS. ADDITIONAL ROOM SET-UP CHANGES WOULD BE A COST ITEM, PROVIDED NO FOOD AND BEVERAGE FUNCTIONS ARE BEING PLACED IN THE RE-SET ROOM.

SECTION THREE

OVERALL HOTEL PACKAGE

The Convention and Visitors Bureau will recommend an overall hotel package to Kiwanis International in the bid book. Hotels should block tentative space for Kiwanis International based on the following sleeping room flow pattern:

The Bureau should prepare a list of not more than thirty-five (35) hotel properties offering us a minimum of 6500 hotel rooms. The size of this original block will be reassessed on a yearly basis, and will increase or decrease accordingly. Of the 6500 rooms, a minimum of 3,000 should be within three (3) miles of the proposed convention facilities. Special allowances to these requirements may be made if a city has other attractive elements in their proposal.

With the exception of overflow properties (less than 100 rooms), all hotels included in the listing must have in-house restaurant service (breakfast, lunch, and dinner), a ballroom to accommodate one or more district dinners, and meeting space for one or more district caucuses (e.g., a hotel committing 300 rooms should be able to accommodate 200-600 people in their ballroom).

Listed with each hotel name should be the following information about the hotel:

- 1) Total rooms in house
- 2) Number of rooms tentatively blocked for Kiwanis International
- 3) Distance of hotel from convention facilities
- 4) Banquet/ballroom capacity
- 5) Age of hotel
- 6) Recent renovation information
- 7) Rate that would be offered to Kiwanis International if our convention were held this year (in the bidding year)

(Attached as EXHIBIT B are our format guidelines for the above information.)

The Convention and Visitors Bureau should include in this section a city map which indicates the exact location of each hotel in relation to the convention facilities.

Only hotels that have accepted our housing agreement (attached EXHIBIT C) are to be included in the bid proposal.

SECTION FOUR

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF VIP HEADQUARTER HOTEL

Based on the following requirements, the Convention and Visitors Bureau will make suggestions to Kiwanis International for a VIP Headquarter Hotel.

1) Except under unusual circumstances, only hotels within walking distance of the convention facilities will be considered as potential VIP Headquarter Hotels.

2) Only properties with a minimum of 500 first-class sleeping rooms and suites, blocked exclusively for Kiwanis International, will be considered. The hotels suggested as VIP Headquarter Hotels should utilize the following sleeping room flow chart to tentatively block space:

3) The VIP Headquarter Hotel will agree to quote a special "staff" rate which will apply to 10 rooms utilized by Kiwanis International staff members beginning 8-10 days prior to the opening session. This special rate must be significantly lower than the convention rate quoted to Kiwanis International.

4) The VIP Headquarter Hotel will agree to provide on a complimentary basis for ten (10) nights, beginning before convention through Thursday night after the closing session, its largest two-bedroom suite for our International President, plus three (3) smaller one-bedroom suites to be assigned by Kiwanis International. The VIP Headquarter Hotel further agrees to compliment a minimum of 1 room night per 50 room nights occupied (said rooms to be assigned by Kiwanis International).

5) The VIP Headquarter Hotel will agree to hold all meeting/function space on a complimentary basis solely for the use of Kiwanis International until February 1 prior to the convention, at which time all unassigned space will be released back to the hotel.

6) The VIP Headquarter Hotel must be able to accommodate numerous food functions ranging in size from 40-1,000 persons, as well as various meetings and forums. Potential VIP Headquarter Hotels should use the enclosed agenda as a tentative schedule of our space requirements. (SEE EXHIBIT D)

7) The VIP Headquarter Hotel will agree to host a Kiwanis International Planning Conference in July or August of the year prior to convention. Approximately 16 people, many with spouses, will attend the conference, and the hotel will provide on a complimentary basis its largest two-bedroom suite (see #4 above) for our International President, plus 15 regular sleeping rooms for three (3) nights. The conference takes place over a weekend, so the housing nights would be Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. Any additional room nights would be at the expense of Kiwanis International. 8) Kiwanis International will host, at our expense, several meal functions during this conference, including dinners for up to 30 people plus at least one major luncheon for up to 70 people.

NOTE: Adjustments to these criteria will be made for non North-American cities. Additionally, program changes may affect overall space requirements.

SECTION FIVE

TRANSPORTATION INFORMATION

The Convention and Visitors Bureau will include a section on transportation. This section of the bid book will include information on the bidding city's airline service (number of airlines, flights per day), ground transportation and costs (including taxis, buses, airport and/or hotel shuttles, metro transit information), and overall information about the bidding city's accessibility to other cities around the country.

The Convention and Visitors Bureau should supply its current convention services directory which should include information on companies offering shuttle bus service (and equipment), and companies offering rental cars and/or vans.

SECTION SIX

SUGGESTED TOURS AND ATTRACTIONS

In this section of the proposal, the Bureau should list area attractions which may be of interest to Kiwanians, wives, and children. The Bureau should make specific recommendations for pre- and post-convention tours (of up to five days), and suggestions for specific ladies tours and youth tours/activities.

Ladies tours and youth tours may range from bus tours of the city to day-long tours of area attractions.

SECTION SEVEN

RESTAURANT INFORMATION

In this section of the proposal, the Bureau should list the names of all restaurant and fast food outlets within a FIVE BLOCK RADIUS of the proposed convention facilities. With each restaurant name should be its seating capacity and its exact distance from the convention facilities. Included in the listing may be fine dining locations, fast food chains, cafeteria style dining and, if applicable, convention center food service.

SECTION EIGHT

CONVENTION AND VISITORS BUREAU ASSISTANCE

1) The Convention and Visitors Bureau will assist the host club in sponsoring an exhibit booth at the Kiwanis International Convention preceeding the year that the convention will be held in your city.

2) In the event that, to provide complimentary facilities to Kiwanis International, the Bureau deems it necessary to request an assessment from the involved hotels, the Convention and Visitors Bureau will be responsible for requesting the assessment, contracting for the assessment with the hotels, insuring that the assessment is adequate, and collecting the assessment from the hotels.

3) The Convention and Visitors Bureau agrees to provide complimentary promotional brochures to Kiwanis International for advance promotion of the convention city.

4) The Convention and Visitors Bureau will work with us to develop a specialty or novelty item to present to the Board of Trustees and the newly elected officials of Kiwanis International at our International Council Meeting in October of the year prior to convention. The quantity to be provided, on a complimentary basis, will be approximately 300 items.

5) The Convention and Visitors Bureau will provide a complimentary promotional film or video tape that Kiwanians may use to promote the upcoming convention.

6) If requested, the Convention and Visitors Bureau will assist Kiwanis International and its members in selecting special locations for meal functions.

7) The Convention and Visitors Bureau will provide Kiwanis International with its current pay scale for convention workers, and will advise Kiwanis International of any Bureau policies or special procedures with regard to temporary Bureau personnel.

8) The Convention and Visitors Bureau will highlight for Kiwanis International any other special services they would provide should their city be selected.

9) The Convention and Visitors Bureau agrees that it will solicit the approval of the Kiwanis International Convention Manager or his designated representative <u>before</u> filing their final report to IACVB. This will insure that both Kiwanis International and the Convention and Visitors Bureau are in agreement with the facts that will be provided to other cities for future convention bids.

REPORT OF BOARD COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL EXTENSION

TO THE MEETING OF THE INTERNATIONAL BOARD OF TRUSTEES

May 12-17, 1987

Date of Committee Meeting: May 14, 1987

Status of Kiwanis in Guyana and India

Staff reported on attempts to ascertain the status of Kiwanis in Guyana and India. A recent report from a South American KIAR revealed two functioning clubs in Guyana, although we have heard nothing from either group in over two years. Recent efforts to obtain information regarding any clubs in India have been unsuccessful. Staff will continue its efforts in this area and present an update on these and several other Kiwanis nations at the October meeting.

Internationalization of Kiwanis Services and Programs

Staff reported that a comprehensive proposal regarding the internationalization of Kiwanis International services and programs is currently being developed. The proposal will encompass among other things, field services, literature and program materials, publications, leadership training and supplies. A progress report regarding internationalization will be presented at the October meeting.

Status of Clubs in Africa

Staff reported on the troubling lack of growth in Africa and the growing communication and administrative difficulties with clubs on that continent. With the exception of Tunisia, the Area Coordinator program is not working effectively. The Benelux-France-Luxembourg-Monaco District and current KI-E President de Meulemeester provide intermittent service to French speaking clubs, but the rest of the clubs suffer from inattention. KI Board or staff have not visited Africa in over two years, nor is any visit envisioned in the near future.

The Committee is concerned that Kiwanis runs the real risk of continued stagnation in Africa, or worse, that our existing club base will seriously erode in the months ahead. Yet, any proposal for intervention by KI, such as extended staff visits, hiring of field service representatives, etc., is highly cost inefficient, particularly when compared with our short term growth opportunities in Asia-Pacific and Central and South America. Staff will discuss Africa with KI-E leaders during the upcoming Bordeaux Convention and make a followup report at the July Board Meeting in Washington, D.C.

Training of Club Officers in Non-districted Areas

The Committee discussed the difficulties in training club officers in nondistricted, frequently geographically remote areas. It was noted that over time the Kiwanis leadership education program may be expanded to accommodate non-districted areas. In the interim the Committee noted with pleasure that the redesigned club officers kit, once translated, will provide a solid educational foundation to any club officer who will take the time to read it.

Promotion of the Associate Sponsorship Program

Recent efforts to rebuild a pool of North American clubs willing to serve as Associate Sponsors to newly formed non-North American clubs have been successful. Eight clubs are now waiting to sponsor new groups and that number is expected to grow by next fall. Additionally, Associate Sponsorship Program materials will be displayed at the 1987 International Convention. The Committee believes this important new club building and international relations program is well on its way to regaining its former vitality.

Extension Into Scotland

The Committee preliminarily reviewed a resolution of the Kiwanis Club of Waynesville, North Carolina supporting the organization of a Kiwanis Club in Scotland. It was noted that Scotland is a part of the United Kingdom, which is already a Kiwanis nation. It was also noted that, in light of Kiwanis' continued inability to establish even a foothold of quality clubs in England, an extension attempt in Scotland could be quite difficult. Staff will discuss Kiwanis in Great Britian with the KI-E leadership in Bordeaux and report again on the matter at the July meeting in Washington, D.C.

Payment of Registration Fees by Board and Staff at International Meetings

From time to time a question arises regarding whether Board members, particularly the International President and accompanying staff, should pay registration fees at international meetings, particularly the KI-E Convention and Asia-Pacific Conference. After discussion, the Committee concluded that a formal Board Procedure is not needed at this time, but that an informal understanding should exist as follows: the KI President and his wife will not pay registration fees to attend international meetings; staff should pay any registration fees as a necessary and reasonable expense.

Republic of China Update

The Committee was informed of the results of a recent visit to the Republic of China by International President Frank DiNoto. It was noted that the District has submitted an acceptable plan for redivisioning itself from four to eight divisions. The District has also agreed to hold the election of its 1987-88 Board of Trustees in accordance with the provisions of the Standard Form for District Bylaws. With regard to the means of selecting candidates for governor-elect, a nominating conference, based upon the Standard Form for District Bylaws, will replace the District's current practice of using a credentials screening committee.

The Committee noted that steady progress is being realized in the resolution of a variety of administrative problems which have plagued this District in the past. It is important that the Board Representative to the 1987 Republic of China District Convention ensure that various commitments made by the District's leadership the last year are honored.

Fiji Update

Staff reported that four clubs have now been organized in Fiji, with one chartered and that another two to three groups will be formed before September 30th. Staff will closely monitor events in Fiji, following word on May 13th of a military coup in this nation.

<u>Creation of New Divisions in Districts as a Result of Kiwanis International</u> Extension

Staff reported on a growing concern in New Zealand regarding the new costs of absorbing the Fiji Islands, which lie 1,000 miles north of Auckland, as a new division. The District has previously absorbed New Caledonia (1,000 miles northwest of Auckland) and Vanuatu (another 400 miles beyond New Caledonia.) The Committee noted that a Fiji Island division could easily cost the New Zealand District \$5,000 per annum in travel and administrative services.

It is possible that the Board will be presented in some future time with a request that the New Zealand District be provided with a subsidy from Kiwanis similiar to that provided to the Eastern Canada and the Caribbean District are previously provided to the Benelux-France-Luxembourg-Monaco District in support of African clubs. The Committee requests the International Secretary to study the implications of such an arrangement.

Board Procedure Regarding a Standardized Approach to International Extension

The Committee continued its work on the Amendment to Board procedure 400 -International Extension and received further input from several Board members. The Committee intends to present proposed amendments to the Board at its Washington meeting.

Proposed Strategic Plan for International Extension

The Committee continued its work on the development of the strategic plan for international extension and intends to present its proposed Action Strategies at the Board's Washington meeting.

Review of ASPAC Amendments and Resolutions

The Committee preliminarily reviewed amendments and resolutions adopted by the 1987 Asia-Pacific Conference and will present a recommendation at the Board's Washington meeting.

Appointment of Board Counselors to Non-districted Areas

The Committee considered the many potential benefits of appointing Board Counselors to non-districted clubs. Counselors would not visit their clubs, unless in immediate conjunction with otherwise required travel, but would establish and maintain lines of open communication, advice, and support. The Committee urged the President-elect to make such Board Counselor assignments beginning in 1987-88.

Travel to the 1987 International Convention by the Asia-Pacific Specified Trustee-designate

The Committee concluded that Asia-Pacific Trustee-designate Ian Perdriau should be brought to Washington, D.C. at Kiwanis International's expense in order to participate in the Thursday morning Board meeting and subsequent new trustee training and orientation.

Field Service Representative in Korea

The Committee reviewed a request from the Governor of the Provisional District of Korea, Dr. Kim, that Kiwanis International appoint a full-time field service representative within the District. The Committee reviewed the Republic of Korea situation at length and noted Dr. Kim's plans to build an additional four to six clubs between now and October 1, 1987. The Committee concluded that the placement of the FSR in the Republic of Korea represents the best prospect for the eventual realization of full district status within that country and therefore recommended to the Finance Committee that \$18,000 in salary and expenses for an FSR in Korea beginning October 1, 1987 be placed in the 1987-88 budget.

Republic of China Field Service Representative

The Committee reviewed a staff proposal that a part-time field service representative be appointed in the Republic of China beginning October 1, 1987 with a goal of building 15 clubs during the administrative year. The total cost of this program would be \$10,000 per annum. The Committee noted that the Republic of China District, despite a number of administrative problems, represents a geniunely successful story for Kiwanis. After deliberation, the Committee determined that an FSR could make a geniune contribution to the growth of the Asia-Pacific District and has therefore recommended to the Finance Committee that necessary funding be provided in the 1987-88 budget.

The Committee reviewed a list of 90 clubs recommended for charter revocation by various districts. (Exhibit A)

Recommendation #1:

The Committee recommends that the charters of the 90 clubs listed in Exhibit A of this report be revoked and that the amounts of the accounts receivable be charged against the reserve for bad debts in the amount of \$21,387.04.

I move that Recommendation #1 be adopted.

Report of the 1986-87 International Committee on Achievement

The minutes of the meeting of the 1986-87 International Committee on Achievement, held on March 6 & 7, 1987, are attached to this report as Exhibit B. This Committee commends the International Committee on Achievement for its excellent report and its deliberation of the distinguished awards program with regard to club officers.

The Committee discussed the criteria for the 1987-88 Distinguished Club Officers Award as recommended by the Achievement Committee which is based on a point system similar to the Distinguished Governor and Distinguished Lieutenant Governor awards.

Recommendation #2:

The Committee recommends acceptance of the criteria for the 1987-88 Distinguished Club Officers Award attached as Exhibit B-3.

I move that Recommendation #2 be adopted.

Deletion Questionnaire

Staff had been asked to develop a questionnaire for distribution to individuals who have dropped their membership in Kiwanis International, in an attempt ascertain, in greater detail, why the organization is losing members. Subsequent to this request, staff has been exploring the possibility of conducting a membership survey. SRI Research Center, parent company of Gallup, and Aaron Cohen Marketing Services which does the Kiwanis Magazine Audience Study have discussed proposals with staff. The focus of this study would be broadened to include the total growth related area. A report and possible recommendation will be available at the July Board meeting.

Toastmasters

Staff was asked to explore the possibility of a relationship with Toastmasters International. Two members of staff attended two meetings of a local Indianapolis club to determine what programs might be advantageous, if any, to assist Kiwanians or Kiwanis clubs. Additionally, a wide variety of materials were received from Toastmasters International.

The committee asked staff to explore additional avenues besides Toastmasters, including the leadership programs presently being developed by John Johnson, Director of Education, as a means to provide a Toastmaster-type "concept" to Kiwanis.

Growth Award - Lieutenant Governors

Staff reported on an award to be presented to lieutenant governors at this year's convention in Washington, D.C. for new club building. After considerable discussion it was decided to present awards to the five lieutenant governors with the best growth statistics as of May 31. The award was selected from the supplies catalog at cost. The criteria would basically include new club building and growth, as determined by certified figures.

Retiree Membership

Staff reported on progress in the area of attracting corporate or military retirees into the ranks of Kiwanis. A slide presentation is being explored and may be a spin-off from the newly developed new club building and development slide presentation. Additionally, the United States Army has been contacted about Kiwanis International producing a possible generic audio-visual recruitment presentation.

The Committee asked staff to continue to research this area and report back at a later date.

New Member Processing Fee

Considerable discussion ensued regarding an increase in the current \$10 new member processing fee which has not been increased since 1981. The Committee felt that insufficient information was available and recommended that a staff committee be set up at the discretion of the International Secretary to study the new member add fee and other dues related information, including but not limited to, the collection procedure related to the charter revocation process and a possible revision of the pro-rata dues schedule for new clubs.

New Club Building and Development Manual/Slide Presentation

Staff presented the newly developed manual on new club building and previewed the slide program outlining the step by step process which has also recently been completed. Both of these items were available at the just concluded governor's-elect conference and were well received.

Handbook for New Members

Staff is working on a proposal to develop a new member handbook. This handbook would be mailed to all new Kiwanians outlining what is expected of the member in relation to International, district and, in particular, club activities. It would be accompanied by a letter from the International President and would replace the "Warm Welcome" brochure. The Committee is strongly in favor of the concept and has requested that staff bring back a detailed proposal, including cost, to the Board Committee.

The Committee suggested that staff further look into other related areas including pre-induction orientation programs.

Growth Programs Regarding Women In Kiwanis

Staff is working on several programs to recruit women as members should this become a reality. One, "A Very Special Guest Program," could be ready for the last three months of the present year. Others could be easily incorporated into presently existing programs which are already, for the most part, gender neutral.

Flagship Clubs

A plan has been outlined whereby, initially, 10 large city clubs will be targeted for significant improvement.

Because of limited funds, staff members, and staff time it was deemed advisable to consider a pilot program involving no fewer than $\underline{3}$ and no more than $\underline{10}$ such clubs.

Because of shifting demographics these clubs may have lost their reason for being. Perhaps their service projects are no longer relative to the areas they seek to assist. The first problem would be one of identity, necessitating a tried and true administrative procedure, namely community analysis.

The meeting place, the programs, the costs in terms of members' time and money, the type of food service, and all other matters related to these clubs' existence must be reviewed. Evaluation may indicate a need to consider changes, such as a buffet meal to save time and money. Kiwanis should even dare to consider bimonthly rather than weekly meetings if there is sufficient evidence that such a change would save the existence of the club.

The club must be realistic in its membership recruitment programs and solicit those who reside or work in the club's area.

Recently, Jay Adams (FSR) solicited <u>60</u> businesses for prospective members in the downtown Los Angeles club. Twenty-five of percent responded favorably.

Every tool in the Kiwanis membership recruitment armamentarium should be utilized in the growth program, including the team approach, Special Guest Programs, one get-one, prospect lists developed with the aid of area suburban clubs, and professional help from FSRs, KIARS and divisional district retention chairmen, should be brought into play. Frequent inter-clubs and outstanding program utilization should also prove beneficial. Joint meetings with Lions, Rotary, and other Kiwanis clubs for special observances such as Thanksgiving, Easter, and Passover. Past President's Day, presided over by the dean of the Past Presidents, if such a person exists, "may bring some old bones out of the woodwork.

The key is involvement, both as to programs and service activities. There is always more talent than places to utilize it; until this concept can be conveyed to club presidents there will always be deletions, dropouts, and bored members.

Staff was asked to continue to pursue avenues to improve our flagship clubs and report back to the Committee with a progress report.

Translation - New Club Building Manual

Recommendation #3:

The Committee recommends that the New Club Building Manual be translated into French as soon as possible for the use of the Kiwanians in North America who need it in French. Staff or an outside agency will do the translation.

I move that Recommendation #3 be adopted.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE

1986-87 INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE ON ACHIEVEMENT

Indianapolis, Indiana March 6 & 7, 1987

The 1986-87 International Committee on Achievement convened its meeting at 6:00 P.M. on Friday evening, March 6, 1987, at the Holiday Inn North, Indianapolis, for introductions and general discussion. Those present were Chairman W. Leonard Fant (Kentucky-Tennessee), Alan R. Anderson (Wisconsin-Upper Michigan), John H. Miller (Indiana), John A. (Jack) Sundberg (Illinois-Eastern Iowa), Robert J. Tollefson (Nebraska-Iowa), William A. Brown and Myra Kinnaman (International Office). John Miller was introduced as chairman-designate of the 1987-88 International Committee on Achievement.

The meeting was recessed at 7:00 P.M. to accommodate dinner.

The meeting reconvened at 8:30 A.M. on March 7 in the International Office. Chairman Leonard Fant reviewed the procedure for grading the Annual Club Reports whereby six winners would be selected in each of the four sections of both the Single and Multiple Service categories for a total of 48 winners. Reports attributed with the three highest scores in each section would be listed alphabetically as Honor Clubs; reports with the next three highest scores in each section would be listed alphabetically as Honorable Mention Clubs. This format would be used in all releases and at the time of the award presentations in Washington, D.C.

In deference to nepotism, each committee member agreed to accept the average of the other four committee members' scores as his grade for any report from his home district. The committee concurred in declaring a club ineligible for an award in two consecutive years if it were determined by the committee that the club had reported on the same project(s) both years.

It was the consensus of the committee that in the future it would be advantageous to the individual committee members to grade the Coral Section of each category first in consideration of the number of reports to be graded and the time-frame in which to do so.

As determined by the committee, the Honor Clubs and Honorable Mention Clubs of the Annual Club Report competition in which 35 districts participated for the 1985-86 administrative year is attached as Exhibit A-1.

The committee reaffirmed the recommendation of the previous International Committee on Achievement that the Annual Club Report awards should be presented on stage during the International Convention.

The winning and honorable mention districts in the 1985-86 District Administrative Excellence Award program, as determined by the computation of points as delineated in the grading plan, were adopted by the committee. (Exhibit A-2) As requested by President Frank DiNoto and President-elect Tony Kaiser, Chairman Fant presented the criteria for the 1987-88 Distinguished Club Officers Award with allocated points as proposed by Glenn Muggelberg, Chairman of the 1985-86 International Committee on Achievement. Each criteria was thoroughly discussed and the committee as a whole adopted the criteria as revised and attached as Exhibit A-3.

The proposed Distinguished Club Officers criteria provides for a possible 1360 points (including bonus points). The committee felt it would be equitable to establish floors of 1050 through 1124 to qualify for the Merit Award and 1125 and above to qualify for the Distinguished Award for the 1987-88 Administrative Year, subject to adjustment after at least a year's experience with the program.

Recommendation #1:

The International Committee on Achievement recommends the extension of the Distinguished Award point score system to the club level and the adoption of the Distinguished Club Officers Award criteria, as specified in Exhibit A-4, for a two-tier program to be implemented in the 1987-88 Administrative Year.

It was the consensus of the committee that the joining of the club president and club secretary in one award should be looked at critically after a 3-year period.

In the area of other business, the committee considered concerns related to the Annual Club Report program as received by mail and referred by staff:

 The committee considered the recommendation from the District Secretaries Committee, as submitted by Ellis Stroup, to change the filing date for the Annual Club Report from October 15 to September 15 for club presidents.

It was the consensus of the committee to make no recommendation for a change to an earlier filing date which would require the report to be due before the president's year was over. Further, it was pointed out that the districts are already given the option of individually setting an earlier filing date.

2) The committee considered the suggestion of Immediate Past Lieutenant Governor Wally Hamrick (Division 18, Florida) that copies of the Annual Club Reports should be shared with the outgoing lieutenant governors to assist them in evaluating their clubs for awards purposes.

The committee has directed staff to recommend to the districts that they ask each club to send a copy of their report to the outgoing lieutenant governor as a courtesy. 3) The committee considered the suggestion of Lieutenant Governor Robert L. Gibbons (Division 13, California-Nevada-Hawaii) to change the routing of the Annual Club Reports as submitted by club presidents to come first to the Lieutenant Governor and then to the District Achievement Chairman.

It is the opinion of the committee that this would not be feasible considering the time-frame allotted for the filing of Annual Club Reports. The committee feels it is the responsibility of the district to keep the current lieutenant governors periodically apprised of the clubs which have not yet filed a report.

Bill Brown familiarized the committee with the procedure for notification and follow-up with the winners of the District Administrative Excellence Award and the Annual Club Report Award, leading up to the presentation of these awards at the luncheon scheduled for Monday during the International Convention in Washington. He described the convention Achievement Booth and solicited cooperation in manning the booth from this year's and next year's committees. It was agreed that a schedule would be sent to members of both committees prior to the convention.

The committee was wholly in favor of the practice of selecting the in-coming Achievement Committee chairman from the existing committee for the sake of continuity and asks that each in-coming International President give consideration to continuing this practice.

In closing, Chairman Leonard Fant received the thanks of the committee members and staff for having devoted personal time and effort to the Annual Club Report grading procedure and for having provided dedicated leadership to the committee throughout the year. The committee members also expressed their thanks to Bill Brown and Myra Kinnaman for their assistance and organization of the meeting.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 4:00 P.M. on Saturday, March 7.

DISTINGUISHED CLUB OFFICERS AWARD

(Kiwanis International will provide a club banner patch and Distinguished President and Secretary lapel buttons or certificates of Merit.)

Total possible points is 1360. The President and Secretary of a club which earns 1125 or more points will qualify for the Distinguished award. The President and Secretary of a club which earns 1050 through 1124 points will qualify for the Merit award.

CRITERIA

- LEADERSHIP TRAINING: Both the club president and secretary are required to attend the training conference provided by the lieutenant governor. (100 points - Deduct 50 points if special arrangements are necessary to train either the club president or secretary)
- 2. <u>CLUB OFFICER TRAINING</u>: By October 15, 1987, the club president must have provided the prescribed training of his club officers and committee chairmen and have verified this by submitting the appropriate form to the lieutenant governor. (100 points)
- 3. <u>PREPARATION AND PLANNING</u>: Prior to November 1, 1987, the club must complete its community analysis and membership survey, adopt written budgets for club administration and service projects, and have verified this by submitting the appropriate form to the lieutenant governor. (100 points Deduct 25 points for each item not completed)

4. SERVICES RENDERED BY THE CLUB:*

- a. Complete at least one new service project during the administrative year and indicate this on the Official Monthly Report. (50 points)
- b. Annually complete and report on its monthly reports at least ten (10) different service projects within the community or area where the club is located, at least one of which should be in each of the following standing committees: Community Services; Spiritual Aims; Youth Services. (10 points for each completed project maximum 100 points)
- 5. <u>MAJOR EMPHASIS</u>: The club must participate in the current Major Emphasis Program and report such participation on an Official Monthly Report and the Annual Club Report. (50 points)
- 6. <u>MEMBERSHIP GROWTH</u>: From October 1, 1987 through September 30, 1988, the club must attain a net growth in membership based on the paid club membership of September 30, 1987. (20 points for each one (1) member net growth maximum 100 points)

- 7. SPONSORED YOUTH: Any club sponsoring a Circle K Club, Key Club, Builders Club, or similar K-family organization, must properly fulfill its annual responsibilities and submit all required reports. Clubs with no locally sponsored youth organization may contribute at least \$75 per year directly to a sponsored youth organization within the district or to a special district sponsored youth organization fund. (50 points)
- 8. INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION ATTENDANCE: The club must have at least one (1) member as a delegate to the International Convention if the club is located on the continent on which the convention is being held. (50 points)
- 9. DISTRICT CONVENTION: The club must have at least three (3) members (two must be club officers) as delegates to the District Convention. (75 points Deduct 25 points for each delegate the club is short; 25 bonus points for an inter-club may be earned if four or more people attend.)
- 10. OFFICIAL VISIT: At least two (2) club officers must be present at the Governor's official visit to the division. (50 points - Deduct 25 points for each club officer short; 50 bonus points may be earned if an inter-club is made)
- 11. LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR'S COUNCIL MEETINGS: The club president and secretary or their designees must attend council meetings held by the lieutenant governor. (25 points for each meeting at which there are two (2) representatives - maximum 100 points)
- 12. **REPORTS:** All reports must be filed with the District and Kiwanis International on time:

Monthly Report - 10th of following month (5 points each) Election Report - June 1, 1988 (50 points) Annual Club Report - October 15, 1988 (50 points)

13. **DUES:** All dues must be paid to the District and Kiwanis International promptly:

lst half semi-annual dues - October 10, 1987 (50 points)
2nd half semi-annual dues - April 10, 1988 (50 points)

- 14. **PERSONAL SPONSORSHIP:** The club president and secretary must have jointly sponsored two (2) new members in their home club and this is to be verified in writing to the lieutenant governor by September 30, 1988. (100 points)
 - * "A service project is an activity consistent with the Objects, Objectives and Policies of Kiwanis International, devised or planned by a Kiwanis club or a club committee and performed by members of the club for the benefit of others." As here defined, it does not include service to others which consists solely of financial support.

KEY CLUB

Key Club Department Restructure and Funding

Committee and staff reviewed the proposal for the Key Club department's restructuring and funding. It was the Committee's opinion that this should be considered as an administrative function under the supervision of the International Secretary and any recommendation for changes that would involve the Kiwanis International Board Policies or Procedures should be submitted to the Committee by the International Secretary.

1987 Key Club Convention Budget

The Committee reviewed the proposed 1987 Key Club Convention Budget and found it to be in order.(See Exhibit A). It was noted that \$14,160.00 had been budgeted from the Unallocated Surplus of the Key Club General Budget to maintain the cost of convention registration at the same fee as in 1986. This fund transfer is in keeping with Kiwanis International Board Procedure 886.2, <u>Permitted Fund Balan</u>ces.

Recommendation #1

The Committee recommends approval of the 1987 Key Club Convention Budget, as shown in Exhibit A.

I move that recommendation 1 be adopted.

Finance: No impact Procedure: In compliance (ADOPTED)

1987-88 Key Club Budget

The 1987-88 Key Club Budget was briefly explained to the Committee. The Committee was informed that the budget had been approved by the Key Club International Board and had gone through the internal review by Senior Management and the Finance Department. The Committee refers the budget to the Kiwanis International Finance Committee for their review and recommendations.

Proposed Changes/Additions to Key Club International Board Policies.

The Committee reviewed the proposed changes to the Key Club International Board Policies which were passed by the Key Club International Board at its February Board Meeting (See Exhibit B). The Committee considers the proposed changes to be acceptable, and therefore makes the following recommendation.

Recommendation #2

The Committee recommends approval of the proposed changes to the Key Club International Board Policies, as shown in Exhibit B.

Proposed Amendments to Key Club International Constitution and Bylaws

The Committee reviewed two proposed amendments to the Key Club International Bylaws which will go before the Key Club International House of Delegates in Toronto this summer. The Committee shared staff's concern over a proposed change to the Bylaws (submitted by the Key Club of Lincoln-Sudbury High School, Sudbury, Massachusetts) dealing with eligibility for membership. The Committee's concern deals specifically with the underlined portion of the following proposal:

> Article 2 Section 1. Any student possessing the qualifications prescribed in Article 6 of the Constitution of Key Club International may become an active member in the Key Club of the high school, <u>regardless of race, sex</u>, <u>creed</u>, <u>national origin</u>, <u>color</u>, handicap, or sexual preference.

Staff was informed of the Committee's concerns with this proposed amendment and was instructed to convey those concerns to the Key Club International Board.

Key Club International Board Travel

The Committee reviewed the travel report submitted by the Key Club Department. The report reflected that the Key Club International Board members are adhering to the travel procedures.

Key Club Statistical Report

The Committee reviewed the statistical report of Key Club International and was

pleased with the progress shown in membership growth and new club building. The Committee submits the report as Exhibit C to the Kiwanis International Board for their review.

CIRCLE K INTERNATIONAL

Circle K International Election Policy

The Committee reviewed the Election Policy as submitted by the Circle K International Board of Trustees. The policy was developed from a mandate given by the 1986 House of Delegates at the 31st Annual International Convention in Boston, Massachusetts. Input from the thirty Circle K International District Governors, as well as the District Administrators, had been considered in the formulation of this policy (attached as Exhibit D).

Recommendation #3:

The Committee recommends that the Circle K International Election Policy be approved.

I move that Recommendation 3 be adopted.

The Committee reviewed the proposed policy for Club Status for Circle K International. The Committee requested staff to refer the policy back to the Circle K International Board of Trustees for further definition of the standings and statuses stated in the policy.

International Board Travel

The Committee reviewed the travel report of the Circle K International Board of Trustees and found it to be in order.

Circle K International Membership Statistics

The Committee reviewed the current membership statistics and found the organization to be approximately one hundred members behind last year at this time, with twenty fewer clubs submitting dues. It was noted that the number of clubs at charter strength increased by 90 since the previous Board Meeting. This may be due to the special mailing sent to sponsoring Kiwanis clubs drawing attention to weaker clubs.

PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

Young Astronaut Program

The Young Astronaut Program has been watched by the Committee with great interest during the last six months. The Committee is happy to see that the program appears in the 1987-88 project guide and requests staff to work closely with the Young Astronaut Council to establish a relationship in which Kiwanis receives appropriate recognition for the support clubs give to the program. Staff is requested to give a progress report and recommendation at the July Board meeting.

Youth Exchange Program

Materials for the Kiwanis International Friendship program were sent in March to all district chairmen for International Relations and to all clubs that had requested materials. Nomination forms have begun to arrive, and the matching of partners will begin in late May and continue through June. Copies of the materials are available for examination.

Several European Kiwanians have also sent inquiries about arranging yearlong exchanges for their children. At present, such exchanges do not fit the parameters of the Kiwanis International Friendship Program. The Committee urges the Board to give strong support to the International Friendship Program over the next several years so that interest in exchanges is directed toward the one organized program we have developed and away from the more casual arrangements used over the years.

Annual Club Report Summary

For the first time, part one of the annual club report form was set up as a computer scan form. As a result, a computer tabulated statistics on the 6186 clubs that submitted 1985-86 club reports. Impressive totals for service by clubs include \$54.8 million expended and 5.9 million manhours devoted to local projects. Figures for the Major Emphasis Program are also impressive: more than one million dollars and one million manhours devoted to Walk with a Child.

In a preliminary review of the data, a number of interesting facts were discovered. The per capita manhours in clubs devoted to service decreases as club size increases. However, the emerald clubs (26 to 45 members) spent the most money per club member on service, and the largest clubs (diamond section) spent the least. Of the 6186 reporting clubs, only 212 did not conduct a service project in cooperation with another organization. On the other hand, 2148 clubs did not participate in a single Kiwanis annual observance.

Further study of the data will allow staff to investigate the effect of club size on service activity, the correlation of interest in different service activities, the relative performance of clubs in different districts, and the effect of district size on club performance.

1987-88 Major Emphasis Programs

The 1987-88 project guide, fact brochure for the Major Emphasis Program--Our Quest: Their Best, and the 1987-88 Theme folder are printed and ready for distribution.

The project guide is in the same format as last year, with four featured projects and a number of other projects described in brief. However, it is 32 pages long, 12 pages longer than last year's guide. There are three reasons for this. First, more information is presented in the project guide than last year. Second, more examples of handouts and letters for projects are presented. Some are presented in a reduced size so that they can be imitated. A few are full-size and ready for reproduction. Third, the materials that previously accompanied the booklet have been put inside the booklet so that they are not as easily lost.

The fact brochure and Theme folder follow the same format as in recent years. These will be distributed widely. The Theme folder will be sold by the Supply Department, and the fact brochure will be distributed by the Program Development Department.

Children's Miracle Network Telethon

Preliminary reports from only four districts indicate that Kiwanis clubs have raised approximately half a million dollars for children's hospitals. With the Telethon several weeks away and many clubs still involved in fund raising, this is a very impressive figure. At the time of the Telethon last year, the fund-raising total was approximately \$300,000. By the time of the Telethon this year (May 30-31), the total will be more than twice this amount. It may go as high as three times last year's total. Kiwanis International will probably be the second largest fund raiser for the Telethon. Results will be reported at the next Board meeting.

Representing Kiwanis on the Telethon will be Treasurer Gene Overholt, International Telethon Chairman Bob Calabrese, International MEP Chairman Jack Harten, and Indiana District Governor Chuck Kaufman (whose district raised the most funds per hospital).

Kid Pix Mailing

The Kid Pix program, sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Elmhurst, has reserved a booth at the International Convention in Washington. A representative of the program has asked to send information about the program and the booth to all clubs. The Committee has asked staff to politely refuse this request because of the dangerous precedent it would set, allowing convention exhibitors to mail information to clubs.

KIWANIANNE CLUB PROGRAM'

There are currently 194 active Kiwanianne clubs with a total membership of

1.

4,850. Fifteen Kiwanis clubs are delinquent in payment of the \$100 annual sponsorship fee, and efforts are being made to collect these fees through appropriate district leadership.

In accordance with January Board action, staff has nearly completed the various forms and instructions for U.S. Kiwanianne clubs to file for incorporation. In addition, 130 U.S. Kiwanianne clubs have been requested to supply vital information in order for us to request the Internal Revenue Service to include Kiwanianne clubs under Kiwanis International's 501 (c) (4) group exemption. One hundred (100) clubs have responded with the necessary information, and Staff is following up with the other 30 clubs.

Staff reported on a recent visit with the administrator of the Lioness Program at Lions International. Lions provides full service to its program, which includes nearly 6,000 Lioness clubs with an estimated membership of 155,000. At its inception in 1977, an administrator was named for the program. Currently, five full-time staff members are assigned to the Lioness Program. The Committee received preliminary estimates of projected costs for full service of the Kiwanianne program and retains this information for further study.

It is recognized that in the future there may well be requests for a Kiwanianne structure beyond the local level. Staff prepared materials which could be utilized if the Board should approve such a step, and the Committee has attached these as Exhibit D. We encourage study by all Board Members and request input before the July Board Meeting.

The Committee agrees that the one-time fee of 100 which is charged to certify (charter) a new Kiwanianne club (Procedure 318 (c)(2)) is acceptable because of the materials the club receives for that fee; however, Procedure 318 (c)(3) specifies that a 100 annual sponsorship fee shall be charged to a Kiwanis club and further specifies a pro-rata sponsorship fee for the first year of a Kiwanianne club's organization. The Committee believes that a fee of 30 would more fairly reflect the current and scheduled services that the International Office will provide.

Recommendation #4:

The Committee recommends that Procedure 318 (c)(2) and (3) be reworded to include a change of the annual sponsorship fee from \$100.00 to \$30.00, with no pro rata provisions.

I move that recommendation 4 be adopted.

Membership Statistics

The most current membership statistics states that Builders Club membership is now over 9,800 members in 357 active clubs.

Revocation List of Builders Clubs

Several requests for information have been made directly to the sponsoring Kiwanis clubs and District Builders Club Chairmen and Secretaries. Staff has received a twenty-five percent return on all surveys or requests. The Committee requests staff to send a letter of revocation, effective July 1, 1987, to sponsoring Kiwanis clubs as listed. This will allow one final chance for clubs to inform the International Office of the active status of their Builders Club.

Recommendation #5:

The Committee recommends deletion from the Active Builders Club listing of 271 inactive Builders Clubs (Exhibit E).

I move that recommendation 5 be adopted.

Finance: No impact Procedure: In compliance

Sponsorship Fee for Builders Clubs

Currently there is no way in which Kiwanis clubs who sponsor Builders Clubs are required to submit membership, project and status information to the International Office for review and for statistics. It was felt that in order to obtain this information, and in order for the program to be financially sound, that an Annual Sponsorship Renewal Fee of \$10.00 (U.S.) should be implemented, effective October 1, 1987.

Recommendation #6:

The Committee recommends approval of the implementation of a \$10.00 (U.S.) Annual Charter Sponsorship Fee for Builders Clubs.

I move that recommendation 6 be adopted.

KIWANIANNES --- DISTRICT STRUCTURE

At the October Board Meeting, it was noted that several Kiwanis districts were looking to the day when it would be possible to petition the International Board to form Kiwanianne districts.

No specific action was taken by the Board Committee either "pro or con" the issue of district structure; however, it was agreed that at the current time no thought has been given to a specific procedure which could be utilized if and when the Board might be approached with such requests.

Staff was asked to study the matter and present a possible procedure for the Board Committee's consideration.

Staff's proposed procedure is attached as Exhibit ${\it I}_{{\it A}}$.

In addition, Exhibit Z contains additional possible prerequisites for Kiwanis districts contemplating such a district structure.

It is recognized that some additional, specific guidance may be necessitated in the areas of establishing divisional boundaries, conducting a district organizational meeting, formulating a district Kiwanianne budget, and training of Kiwanianne district officers. It is contemplated that these, and perhaps other areas, would be addressed in a "mini-manual."

No attempt as yet has been made to formulate a Standard Form for District Kiwanianne Bylaws. This, as well as those areas outlined in the preceding paragraph, could be the "next step" in our <u>purely in-house</u> development process <u>if</u> the Board Committee agrees that the attached is acceptable (with whatever changes are deemed necessary) and wishes staff to proceed.

Finally, it might be wise to point out the genesis of 30 clubs and 450 members as a minimum to form a Kiwanianne district. The number of clubs is taken from the Key Club Constitution. Key Club's experience has shown that those districts below 30 clubs are "struggling," but those with 30 or more clubs experience better success. The 450 members represents minimum charter strength of 15 members per club in Key Club. We also recommend a minimum of 15 members to organize a Kiwanianne club. There is no provision in the Circle K Constitution or other Circle K materials for formation of new Circle K districts. In Kiwanis, to form a district, a minimum of 25 clubs and 1,000 members is mandated.

STEPS TO CREATING A KIWANIANNE DISTRICT

- 1. Resolution by Kiwanis district board to pursue organization of Kiwanianne district if sufficient interest to do so exists among Kiwanianne clubs.
- 2. Survey of Kiwanianne clubs in proposed area to determine desire to form Kiwanianne district.
- 3. Request from Kiwanis district to Kiwanis International Board to create a Kiwanianne district.
- 4. Approval granted by Kiwanis International Board of Trustees to proceed with the formation of new Kiwanianne district.
- 5. Appointment of Kiwanianne district chairman and committee by Kiwanis District Governor (if this has not been done previously).
- 6. Notice sent to all Kiwanianne clubs within the proposed area of upcoming organizational meeting.
- 7. Development of proposed Kiwanianne district budget.
- 8. Organizational meeting is conducted with at least two-thirds of the total clubs in attendance. This meeting should complete the following:
 - election of Kiwanianne district officers
 - adoption of proposed district bylaws (based on the Standard Form for District Bylaws)
- 9. Review of proposed district budget with newly elected Kiwanianne district officers.
- 10. Submission of proposed district bylaws and proposed district budget to sponsoring Kiwanis district.
- 11. Approval of proposed district bylaws and proposed district budget by sponsoring Kiwanis district.
- 12. Submission of proposed district bylaws to Kiwanis International for <u>final approval</u>. At the same time, the proposed district budget must be submitted for review.
- 13. Approval of proposed Kiwanianne district bylaws by Kiwanis International.
- 14. Election of Kiwanianne Lt. Governors to complete Kiwanianne district board.
- 15. Official training of Kiwanianne district officers by Kiwanis district.

- In order to form a Kiwanianne district, the proposed area must include no less than thirty (30) active Kiwanianne clubs, and no less than 450 active Kiwanianne members.***
 - a. an "active" club shall be defined as a Kiwanianne club whose sponsoring Kiwanis club has paid the current annual sponsorship fee.
 - b. "active" members shall be defined as the number reflected on the sponsorship form accompanying the annual sponsorship fee.
- 2. A minimum of 2/3 of the active Kiwanianne clubs and their sponsoring Kiwanis clubs within the Kiwanis district boundaries shall have indicated their desire, in writing, to form a Kiwanianne district; further, the Kiwanis governor shall certify that the Kiwanis district board of trustees has acted favorably upon that request.
- 3. The Kiwanis International Board of Trustees, or its designated representative, shall then act upon the request. If permission is granted to pursue the organization of a district, it shall be contingent upon the adoption of a Standard Form for Kiwanianne District Bylaws and any other requirements of Kiwanis International.
- 4. The Kiwanianne district shall have the same geographical boundaries as the Kiwanis district.
- 5. The Kiwanis governor shall appoint a Kiwanianne district chairman, who shall be the basic liaison between the Kiwanianne district board and the Kiwanis district board. He shall be responsible to the Kiwanis governor and, through him, to the Kiwanis district board.
- 6. The chairman shall have a Kiwanianne district committee to assist in actively promoting the formation of new Kiwanianne clubs, strengthening existing clubs, and promoting effective Kiwanis-Kiwanianne relationships on a local level.
- 7. Expenses of the Kiwanianne district chairman shall not be borne by the Kiwanianne district since the chairman is appointed by the Kiwanis district governor, with the approval of the Kiwanis district board of trustees.
- The term of office of the chairman shall be from October 1 to September 30. He may be reappointed.
- 9. The chairman shall present a report to the district board of Trustees at each of their regular meetings.
- 10. Activities of the Kiwanianne district are subject to the approval of the Kiwanis district board, which has primary jurisdiction over the Kiwanianne district.
 - -- <u>Ultimate</u> responsibility for the entire Kiwanianne program, including the district organization, is vested in the Kiwanis International Board of Trustees which has control of the Kiwanianne trademark.

- 11. At an organization meeting of the Kiwanianne district, which shall be the responsibility of the sponsoring Kiwanis district through its liaison, the Kiwanianne district shall adopt the Standard Form of Kiwanianne District Bylaws. These bylaws, and any amendments thereto, must have the approval of the Kiwanis district board of trustees and, subsequently, the Kiwanis International Board of Trustees, before they are operable.
- 12. Each Kiwanianne district shall hold an annual convention in accordance with its bylaws, elect such officers, and adopt such a structure, as specified in those bylaws.
- The administrative year of the Kiwanianne district shall be October 1 -September 30.
- 14. Permanent records relating to the Kiwanianne district shall be maintained at the Kiwanis District Office in order to assure a proper historical record.
- 15. The Kiwanianne district board shall study ways and means for strengthening and building Kiwanianne clubs in the district and work with the Kiwanis district committee on Kiwanianne clubs to effectuate these plans.
- 16. The Kiwanianne district shall have a lieutenant governor for each of the Kiwanianne divisions. Kiwanianne divisions should, where possible, coincide with Kiwanis divisions. If another plan is utilized, it should take into account travel distances between clubs, opportunities to work with Kiwanis lieutenant governors in the areas, and future growth potential.
- 17. Prior to the Kiwanianne district organization meeting, the Kiwanianne district committee shall formulate a district budget, which shall subsequently be reviewed (immediately following the organizational conference) with the newly elected Kiwanianne district officers. It shall then be submitted to the Kiwanis district board of trustees for approval and then sent to Kiwanis International for review. Approval of Kiwanis International is not necessary in connection with the budget, though it shall not violate nor contravene any aspect of the Kiwanianne Constitution, Kiwanis International Board Policies for Kiwaniannes, or Kiwanianne Standard Form for District Bylaws.
- 18. Following the organizational meeting and adoption of the budget, there shall be elections of Kiwanianne lieutenant governors for each of the Kiwanianne divisions.*** Kiwanianne divisions should, where possible, coincide with Kiwanis divisions. Where this is not possible, factors such as travel distances between clubs, opportunities to work with Kiwanis lieutenant governors in the areas, and future growth potential shall be considered.
- 19. There shall be no division bylaws or division treasury.
 - *** Note: Since the district budget will very likely provide some compensation for district officers -- including lieutenant governors -the budget should be adopted before election of lieutenant governors so that the matter of compensation may be reviewed by potential candidates before declaring their willingness to serve.

Proposed Additions to Key Club International Board Policies

Passed by the Key Club International Board February 8, 1987

- 4.5 District Caucus Procedures at the Key Club International Convention
 - A. Each candidate for International Office will be given five minutes to visit each district and five minutes of travel time in between visits. In order to allow the candidates to remain on schedule, each district is responsible for adhering to the assigned schedule.
 - B. The schedules will be selected randomly to assure that prior to the nominating conference, each candidate has had the opportunity to visit every district.
 - C. Candidates should be given the opportunity to present their platforms and to share their ideas for the future of the organization.
 - D. Trick or amusing questions should be limited to one minute of the candidates presentation.
 - E. Physical contact, hazing, questions pertaining to race, sex, or religion, or any other questions unbecoming a Key Clubber are prohibited.
 - F. Questioning should be conducted in an orderly fashion. The governor shall be responsible for the method of recognizing the questioner from the floor.
 - G. All members of a district must be in attendance at their district caucus. Attendance must be taken at each session and the names of those not attending should be submitted to the district administrator.
 - H. At the conclusion of your assigned caucus be certain that the room is neat and free of trash and other materials, so that it is ready for the group that follows.
 - I. Adults are not permitted to question or comment on candidates.
- 6.1 The Key of Honor is the highest award given by the organization for contributions to the Key Club program or for youth in general. It should go to someone who, rather than simply does a good job, has gone beyond the scope of what is normally expected. The International President shall be ineligible to receive this award unless he/she continues to serve youth after the completion of his/her term. Nomination procedures and criteria will be sent to all Key Clubs seeking nominations for the award. No more than two persons may be recognized as Key of Honor recipients in any given year.
- 8.5 The month and year of adoption of Key Club International Board Policies shall be included at the end of each policy. Those policies enacted prior to the passage of this policy shall be dated 10-86 to indicate their existence at the time of enactment. (2-87)

I. Eligibility for International Elections

- a. A candidate must fulfill the requirements for membership as stated in the Circle K International Constitution, Article VI--Clubs, Section 2.
- b. A candidate must fulfill any minimum member requirements that may be approved by Circle K International.

II. Campaigning

- a. The candidate may announce his/her candidacy only at his/her District Convention.
- b. The candidate may not campaign until two months (60 days) prior to the International Convention. This includes mass mailings, telephone calls, and visits to other districts.
- c. The only people allowed to actively campaign for a candidate shall be current Circle K members.
- d. No International Board member past or present may actively campaign for any other International Candidate.
- e. An International Candidate must submit a list of primary campaign staff members to the convention office prior to their participation in caucuses.
- f. An International Candidate may only be officially endorsed by his or her home District Board and/or House of Delegates. District Houses of Delegates and Boards may only endorse an International Candidate from that home district. An official endorsement is an acknowledgement by the House of Delegates and/or District Board stating that they feel the candidate is qualified to hold the position he or she is seeking and that they wish him or her the best of luck. The delegates from said district are not bound by this endorsement to vote for that International Candidate.
- g. Time Limits--No campaigning at the International Convention will be allowed between the hours of 1 a.m. and 8 a.m.

III. Caucuses

- a. Formal Caucuses are a time to determine future policies for Circle K International through the hearing of the candidates for International Office. Caucus is a very important part of the International Convention and should be approached in a very serious and dignified manner. Governors are responsible for maintaining order in the caucus. Three districts will caucus at a time. Turns should be taken by the Governors in presenting the questions and ensuring the proceedings. A smoothly run caucus permits correct analysis of information sought and obtained. With these objectives in mind, the following recommendations have been made.
 - Candidates for International Office will be scheduled by the Board. The district will have ten (10) minutes at the beginning of the scheduled caucus time to organize and inform as to procedures, strategies, etc.
 - 2. Each candidate will be allowed a designated amount of time with two minutes reserved for travel between caucuses.

3. Only candidates that have met the filing deadlines for consent and assurance forms, may go through caucuses.

-2-

- 4. Each caucus will be assigned at least two Sergeant-at-Arms. One will stand inside the door and one will stand outside the door while a candidate is speaking. The door is to remain closed and no one is to enter or leave while a candidate is speaking unless it is a case of extreme emergency. The Sergeant-at-Arms will be responsible for keeping time in caucus, and in ensuring that candidates do not exceed the allotted time.
- 5. A candidate not involved in speaking to caucuses may attend his/her home district caucus.
- 6. All Circle K members must attend the caucus of their district except the International President and those Circle K'ers traveling with a specific candidate as his/her campaign staff.
- 7. District Administrators should be in attendance at his district caucus but not participating in candidate caucusing.
- Non-Circle K'ers are not allowed to participate in caucusing of candidates.
- b. Information caucuses are defined as any discussion between a candidate and two or more Circle K'ers, except members of the campaign staff or the candidate's home district.
- c. Time Limits--No caucuses will be allowed between the hours of 1 a.m. and 8 a.m.

IV. Violations

<u>Pre-Convention</u>--Notification of a possible violation must be in the form of a signed letter postmarked no later than one week following the incident. It is to be sent to the International President and International Administrator. Materials which support the belief that an alleged infraction occurred must be included with the letter (i.e., witness names, letters, phone transcripts, etc.). The candidate shall be sent a copy of this letter and its supporting materials by the International President, in conjunction with the International Administrator through certified mail.

<u>Convention</u>--Notification of a possible violation must be made in writing and signed by a witness within six (6) hours of the alleged violation. The notification will be given to the International President and/or the International Administrator whose responsibility it will be to notify the other. Once this notification has been received, the International President and/or International Administrator shall inform the candidate.

V. Enforcement

Districts -- Any district in violation of this election policy may be subject to censure by the House of Delegates upon suggestion of the International Board. <u>Candidates</u>--Any candidate found in violation of this election policy may be subject to disqualification upon suggestion of the International Board.

IV. Grievances

All grievances shall come to the attention of the Circle K International Board of Officers. Any candidate or district has the right to petition the International Board in response to any allegation of misconduct. BUILDER: JUB SUMMARY MAY 14, 1987

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS AMENDMENTS FOR WASHINGTON, D.C.

Proposed Amendment No. 4 submitted by the Kiwanis Club of Sage of Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. The purpose is to adjust the annual membership fees for Senior members.

Proposed Amendment No. 5 submitted by the Kiwanis Club of West Hartford, Connecticut. The purpose is to allow for two meetings per month of all Kiwanis clubs.

Proposed Amendment No. 6 submitted by the Board of Trustees of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District of Kiwanis International. The purpose is to adjust the term of office for the Board of Trustees of Kiwanis International.

Proposed Amendment No. 7 submitted by the Kiwanis Club of North DeKalb, Georgia. The purpose is to minimize the number of litigations. Recommendation #1:

Due to the substantial number of changes in Board Policies and Procedures the Committee believes it would be desirable to contract with a knowledgeable person to update same. A request to approve a 1987/88 budget amount of \$3,500 has been made to the Finance Committee.

New Board Counselor Forms

At the request of the Committee, Staff prepared a new form to be implemented immediately. The proposed form was reviewed and accepted for use as presented. (New Form Exhibit B)

Procedure 318.4 Incorporation of Kiwanianne Clubs

After considerable discussion of this previously approved amended procedure, the Committee decided to study possible modifications before recommending insertion.

Staff is requested to prepare a proposed amendment for consideration at the July Board meeting.

Article VIII, Section 9 - Delegates to Conventions - Past Lt. Governors

After considerable discussion, the Committee recommends that the Amendment to the Bylaws regarding past Lt. Governors representing a division other than the one they originally represented should be included as an agenda item at the International Council in October.

Short-Term Disability

Staff presented a recommendation to provide a short-term disability benefit to employees. The Committee felt that more information would be needed to adequately consider this request and asked staff to research further and report their findings as-soon-as practical.

Deletion of Procedure 193(b) Membership in Other Organizations

As a result of recommendations from several sources, the Committee felt that this procedure was not practical in that we have relationships with some organizations such as Compor or the American Management Association and that same should be deleted.

Recommendation #11:

The Committee recommends deletion of the following procedure since it no longer is applicable.

Procedure 193 (b) Membership in Other Organizations

Kiwanis International should not consider any membership relation to any organization whose work is not wholly related to some recognized objective or policy of Kiwanis International.

Comprehensive Report on Supply Department Operations

The Committee discussed the report provided to all Board members on the Supply Department operations. Staff was complimented on the quality of this report. In depth discussion was held on three items.

New Discount Plan for Supply Sales

Staff reported on the possibility of offering clubs a new discount opportunity. In return for taking \$50 minimum orders from members for personal or gift items, clubs can earn a 10% discount on essential club items. This would be achieved through the use of a dated coupon. Staff was urged to proceed as quickly as possible.

Proposal to Negotiate Modifications to the 1958 Harry McLean Contract

The above contract provides for supplies required by Kiwanis Clubs in Canada. Due to numerous changes since the 1958 contract was negotiated, it is now desirable to find solutions to several problems involved in this relationship. The Committee felt that staff should proceed to work with Harry McLean in formulating a proposed official agreement and present same to the Committee for consideration at a subsequent meeting. The subject of License Agreements should be included in the report.

Proposal to Charge Shipping Costs on Supply Orders

As a result of a staff recommendation, the Committee discussed the desirability of adding shipping charges to supply orders. Such charges have traditionally been absorbed by the International Office. The Committee felt that the charges should be based upon order size, ranging from 5% on small orders, to 2% on large orders (\$100 up). It was also requested that such charges be implemented October 1, 1987 instead of October 1, 1988.

Employees' Credit Union

Staff presented a report on the various services that would benefit employees if a credit union were available. (See Exhibit C)

Recommendation #12:

The Committee recommends that the services of the Indiana University-Indianapolis Federal Credit Union (IUI) be provided to Kiwanis International employees.

I move that Recommendation #12 be adopted.

Providing Employer 1/2 Percent Contribution To All Eligible Employees In The Salary Savings Plan 401(k)

In order to increase participation and encourage employees to save toward their retirement, staff recommended that the above benefit plan be amended to include the 1/2% employer contribution for all eligible employees, and that the minimum employee contribution be reduced from 2% to 1% effective October 1, 1986. These amendments may increase employee participation and encourage further savings. It may also increase the percentage of allowable contributions for higher paid employees.

Recommendation #13:

The Committee recommends that the Salary Savings Plan (401(k)) be amended to (1) provide for a 1/2% employer contribution to all eligible employees and (2) reduce the minimum employee contribution from 2% to 1% effective January 1, 1987.

WHEREAS, Kiwanis International Salary Savings Plan (hereinafter referred to as "Plan") was established by Kiwanis International, Indianapolis, Indiana (hereinafter referred to as "Employer"), effective as of April 30, 1983; and as last amended by an entireties amendment, effective as of April 30, 1984; and

WHEREAS, by Section 8.01 of the Plan, the Employer reserved the right to amend the Plan by action of its Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, the Employer desires to amend the Plan in certain respects heretofore considered and discussed;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Plan is hereby amended by this First Amendment effective as of April 30, 1986; and

RESOLVED FURTHER, that the Board of Trustees of Kiwanis International hereby authorizes the International Secretary of this Employer to execute all instruments and to do all things necessary or appropriate in their judgment or discretion to consummate and make legally effective the First Amendment to the Kiwanis International Salary Savings Plan, as amended and restated as of April 30, 1984, the proposed draft of which has been presented at this meeting, and to execute any changes in this Amendment as may be required for technical clarity and consistency within the general intent and purpose thereof, and to execute such curative amendments to the Plan and Trust Agreement as may be required by the Internal Revenue Service in order that the Plan as amended by this First Amendment and its attendant Trust shall continue to qualify under the appropriate provision of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Committee felt for such a modest amount we should attempt to include the names and addresses of the club Adminstrative Secretaries. This requst has also been referred to the Finance Committee for inclusion in the 1987/88 budget.

New Procedure 195.1 (c) Governors-elect Conference

For many reasons, it is not desirable to allow for alternates to the Governorselect Conference. The experience is designed to be a personal one, building a team and team spirit, giving the President-elect a chance to interact with his Governors. Education at the Conference is becoming very one-on-one oriented, and motivation and inspiration cannot be transferred easily from an attendee to the governor-elect (if the latter is not present). Recommendation #15:

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO THE INTERNATIONAL CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

Submitted by the Board of Trustees of Kiwanis International.

pose: This amendment to the Constitution and Bylaws of Navanis International provides for an electoral regional plan for representation on the Board of Trustees, which will become effective October 1, 1988, and includes the nomination and election procedures at the 1988 Annual Convention.

Part 1. Amend Article VIII, Section 1, of the Constitution of Kiwanis International by deleting the present Section 1 and substituting a new Section 1, as follows:

VIII. Board of Trustees

Section 1.

a. The Board of Trustees shall consist of the President, Presidentelect, Immediate Past President, two (2) Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and twelve (12) Trustees.

b. (1) For the purpose of providing representation on the Board of Trustees, Kiwanis International shall be divided into five (5) electoral regions as follows:

Region I — All districts which include one or more of the 50 states of the United States.

Region II — Eastern Canada and the Caribbean District and Western Canada District.

'on III — Europe, including all European Districts.

on IV — Asia-Pacific Area which includes the Districts of Australia, Japan, New Zealand, Philippine Luzon, Philippine South, and Republic of China.

Region V — All other areas of the Kiwanis world.

(2) All non-districted clubs and provisional districts shall be attached to a region designated by the Board of Trustees.

(3) Districts formed after the adoption of this amendment shall be assigned to a region by action of the Board of Trustees.

c. The members of the Board of Trustees shall be elected so as to provide that:

(1) Region I is guaranteed twelve (12) members and shall be elected at-large by the House of Delegates at the annual convention.

(2) Except as provided in Section 1 (g), all other regions together are guaranteed four (4) members. Regions II, III, and IV are each guaranteed one member selected by the region through a procedure recommended by each region. The recommended procedure must be approved by the Board of Trustees. The remaining guaranteed seat or seats would be elected from Regions II, III, IV, or V on an at-large basis as herein provided in 1 (g).

(3) Any remaining members of the Board of Trustees shall be elected by the House of Delegates at the annual convention and may emanate from any region.

d. No district may have more than one (1) member on the Board of Trustees.

e. A district shall not have a member on the Board of Trustees for one administrative year after another person from that district has completed his membership on the Board of Trustees, except where necessary to fill a guaranteed seat as provided in Section 1(c) (2). PRESENT PROVISIONS CONSTITUTION

VIII. Board of Trustees

Section 1. The Board of Trustees shall consist of the President, President-elect, Immediate Past President, two (2) Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and twelve (12) Trustees.

The members of the Board of Trustees shall be elected as follows:

a. One (1) member from the European Federation, except that, in a year when the European Federation presents a candidate for office above the level of Trustee, it shall not offer a candidate for the office of Trustee.

b. A minimum of twelve (12) members from the United States. Representation from the Pacific Northwest District shall be a part of the specified representation from the United States irrespective of residence.

c. One (1) member from each of the two (2) Canadian districts as presently constituted, including all areas attached thereto, except that in a year when a Canadian district presents a candidate for office above the level of Trustee, that district shall not offer a candidate for the office of Trustee.

d. One (1) member from the Asia-Pacific Area, except that in a year when the Asia-Pacific Area presents a candidate for office above the level of Trustee, that area shall not offer a candidate for the office of Trustee. The Asia-Pacific Area shall include the Districts of Australia, Japan, New Zealand, Philippine Luzon, Philippine South. Republic of China, and non-districted clubs in the Asia-Pacific Area.

e. The remaining members of the Board of Trustees not specified in paragraphs a, b, c, and d above may emanate from any district of Kiwanis International, subject to the provisions of paragraph f, following: f. When the certified paid membership within Region V reaches 2.5% of the overall certified paid membership of Kiwanis International for the first half of any administrative year, and that minimum figure is maintained for two (2) consecutive years, the Board of Trustees of Kiwanis International shall certify that Region V is qualified for a guaranteed seat as a region from the at-large seat allocated in Section 1(c) (2) of this article. The member shall be selected by the procedure recommended by that region and which procedure has been approved by the Board of Trustees. Region V shall be guaranteed a seat on the Board for so long as it maintains at least 2.5% of the overall certified paid membership dues of Kiwanis International.

g. Future apportionment of the eighteen (18) elected members of the Board of Trustees will be based on growth as follows:

Percent of Region I	Guaranteed Number of	
Certified Paid Membership	Non-United States Seats	
Greater than 80%	4	
80% and greater than 75%	5	
75% and greater than 70%	6	

If the paid membership in Region I becomes 70% or less, the Board of Trustees shall formulate a new plan of representation to be presented for adoption to the House of Delegates at an Annual Convention.

Part 2. Amend Article X, Section 5, of the Constitution of Kiwanis International by deleting the present Section 5 and substituting a new Section 5, as follows:

X. Conventions

Section 5. Each accredited delegate and delegate-at-large present shall be entitled to vote on each question submitted in any convention, except as prescribed in the Bylaws and related to the election of guaranteed representatives as delineated in Article VIII, Section 1 c(2) of the Constitution. There shall be no voting by proxy.

Part 3. Amend Article XI, Section 3(a) of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International by deleting the present Section 3(a) and substituting a new Section 3(a), as follows:

XI. Nomination and Election of Officers

Section 3.

a. The conference shall consist of three (3) registered delegate representatives from each of the several districts selected by the majority vote of the duly registered delegates thereof at a meeting called by the Governor of such district, or in his absence by the most recent Past Governor present at the convention, or in the absence of the Governor or any Past Governor, by the President of Kiwanis International. At said meeting the Governor or, in his absence, the most recent Past Governor present at the convention, shall preside. If none of these officers be present, the delegates at said meeting shall select a chairman from among those in attendance. The chairman shall forthwith certify to the Secretary of Kiwanis International the names of the three (3) representatives selected.

Part 4. Amend Article XI, Section 3(b) of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International by deleting the present Section 3(b) and substituting a new Section 3(b), as follows:

Section 3.

b. A majority of the registered delegates, including delegates-atlarge, as shown by the report of the Committee on Credentials, shall constitute a quorum in the district delegation. f. No district or federation may have more than one (1) member on the Board of Trustees at any one time.

g. The effective date of specified representation from the European Federation shall be October 1, 1976. The effective date of specified representation from the two Canadian Districts shall be October 1, 1977. The effective date of specified representation from the Asia-Pacific Area shall be October 1, 1983.

PRESENT PROVISIONS CONSTITUTION

X. Conventions

Section 5. Each accredited delegate and delegate-at-large present shall be entitled to vote on each question submitted in any convention. except as prescribed in the Bylaws and related to the election of specified representatives as delineated in Article VIII of the Constion. There shall be no voting by proxy.

PRESENT PROVISIONS BYLAWS

XI. Nomination and Election of Officers

Section 3.

a. The conference shall consist of three (3) registered delegate representatives from each of the several districts and the European Federation selected by the majority vote of the duly registered delegates thereof at a meeting called by the Governor of such district or the Federation President, or in his absence by the most recent Past Governor or Federation President present at the convention, or in the absence of the Governor or Federation President any Past Governor or Past Federation President, by the President of Kiwanis International. At said meeting the Governor or Federation President, or in his absence the most recent Past Governor or Past Federation President present at the convention, shall preside. If none of these officers be present, the delegates at said meeting shall select a chairman from among those in attendance. The chairman shall forthwith certify to the Secretary of Kiwanis International the names of the three (3) representatives selected.

Section 3.

b. A majority of the registered delegates, including delegates-at-large, as shown by the report of the Committee on Credentials, shall constitute a quorum in the district or federation delegation.

Part 5. Amend Article XI, Section 3(g)(2) of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International by deleting the present Section 3(g)(2) and substituting a new Section 3(g)(2), as follows:

Section 3 (g).

(2) The conference shall next proceed to consideration of candies for the office of Trustee.

the Secretary of Kiwanis International shall have submitted to the conference upon its convening his certification of the number of Trustees to be elected by the current annual convention for two-year terms and one-year terms, if any.

(a) The Secretary shall certify the number of Trustee positions potentially available for candidates from Region I and those nonguaranteed Trustee positions potentially available for candidates from Regions II, III, IV, and V. The conference shall submit to the Annual Convention all candidates for the office of Trustee from Region I suggested to it up to such number so certified by the Secretary plus three (3). The conference shall submit to the Annual Convention all candidates for the office of Trustee from Regions II, III, IV, and V suggested to it up to such number so certified by the Secretary plus three (3). In the event a lesser number is suggested to the conference, such number shall be submitted. If more candidates than such number plus three (3) are suggested to the conference from Region I, then the conference shall ballot, each delegate voting for the number of Trustees to be elected and those candidates equaling the number of Trustees to be elected from Region I by the Annual Convention plus three (3) who receive the greater number of votes shall be submitted by the conference to the Annual Convention. If more candidates than such number plus three (3) are suggested to the conference from Regions II, III, IV, and V, then the conference shall ballot, each delegate voting for the number of Trustees to be elected and those candidates equaling the number of Trustees to be elected from Regions II, III, IV, and V by the Annual Convention plus three (3) "ho receive the greater number of votes shall be submitted by the

ference to the Annual Convention.

(b) In the event of the necessity for election of a Trustee for a one-year term (as provided in Article XI, Section 11 of the Bylaws) the conference must submit at least one (1) candidate for each such one-year term but not more than two (2) candidates for each such one-year term.

(c) For the Region II guaranteed representative, the conference shall submit to the Annual Convention for election the candidate for the office of Trustee who has been certified to the Secretary of Kiwanis International pursuant to the procedure approved by the Board of Trustees. In the event of the necessity for election of a Trustee for a one-year term (as in Article XI, Section 11 of the Bylaws), the conference shall submit the candidate who has been certified to the Secretary of Kiwanis International pursuant to the procedure approved by the Board of Trustees.

(d) For the Region III guaranteed representative, the conference shall submit to the Annual Convention for election the candidate for the office of Trustee who has been certified to the Secretary of Kiwanis International pursuant to the procedure approved by the Board of Trustees. In the event of the necessity for election of a Trustee for a one-year term (as provided in Article XI, Section 11 of the Bylaws) the conference shall submit the candidate who has hown certified to the Secretary of Kiwanis International pursuant

e procedure approved by the Board of Trustees.

Section 3 (g).

(2) The conference shall next proceed to consideration of candidates for the office of Trustee.

The Secretary of Kiwanis International shall have submitted to the conference upon its convening his certification of the number of Trustees to be elected by the current Annual Convention.

(a) For representation from the United States Districts, the conference shall submit to the Annual Convention all candidates for the office of Trustee suggested to it up to such number so certified by the Secretary plus three (3). In the event a lesser number is suggested to it, such number shall be submitted. If more candidates than such number plus three (3) are suggested to the conference, then the conference shall ballot, each delegate casting one (1) vote for one (1) candidate for each such office separately, and those candidates equaling the number of Trustees to be elected by the Annual Convention plus three (3) who receive the highest number of votes shall be submitted by the conference to the Annual Convention. In the event of the necessity for election of a Trustee for a one-year term (as in Section 11, following) the conference must submit at least one (1) candidate for each such one-year term but not more than two (2) candidates for each such one-year term.

(b) For the European Federation representation, the conference shall submit to the Annual Convention for election the candidate for the office of Trustee who has been certified to the Secretary of Kiwanis International by the President of the European Federation in accordance with the action taken by the Federation Board. In the event of the necessity for election of a Trustee for a one-year term (as in Section 11, following) the conference shall submit the candidate who has been certified to the Secretary of Kiwanis International by the President of the European Federation in accordance with the action taken by the Federation Board.

(c) For representation from a Canadian district, the conference shall submit to the Annual Convention for election the candidate for the office of Trustee who has been certified to the Secretary of Kiwanis International by the Board of Trustees of that district. In the event of the necessity for election of a Trustee for a one-year term (as in Section 11, following), the conference shall submit the candidate who has been certified to the Secretary of Kiwanis International by the Board of Trustees of the appropriate Canadian district.

(d) For representation from the Asia-Pacific Area, the conference shall submit to the Annual Convention for election the candidate for the office of Trustee who has been certified to the Secretary of Kiwanis International by action of the Asia-Pacific Conference. In the event of the necessity for election of a Trustee for a one-year term (as in Section 11, following) the conference shall submit the candidate who has been certified to the Secretary of Kiwanis International in accordance with action taken by the Asia-Pacific Conference. (e) For the Region IV guaranteed representative, the conference shall submit to the Annual Convention for election the candidate for the office of Trustee who has been certified to the Secretary of Kiwanis International pursuant to the procedure approved by the Board of Trustees. In the event of the necessity for election of a Trustee for a one-year term (as in Article XI, Section 11 of the Bylaws) the conference shall submit the candidate who has been certified to the Secretary of Kiwanis International pursuant to the procedure approved by the Board of Trustees.

Part 6. Amend Article XI, Section 3(h) of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International by deleting the present Section 3(h) and substituting a new Section 3(h), as follows:

Section 3.

h. Prior to the convening of the next regular session of the Annual Convention succeeding the adjournment of the conference, the presiding officer of the conference shall certify to the Secretary of Kiwanis International the result of the conference as to all recommendations for nomination for each office. The recommendations shall be verified by the tellers and secretary of the conference, and preserved by the Secretary of Kiwanis International until the adjournment of the convention.

Part 7. Amend Article XI, Section 3(i) of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International by deleting the present Section 3(i) and substituting a new Section 3(i), as follows:

Section 3.

i. When the nomination of candidates for the offices of Kiwanis International shall become the order of business of the Annual Convention, the report of the conference shall be presented by the Secretary of Kiwanis International. The candidates shall be nominated and voted upon in the following order: President, President-elect, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Trustees.

Part 8. Amend Article XI, Section 8 of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International by deleting the present Section 8 and substituting a new Section 8, as follows:

Section 8. The nominee for a guaranteed office of Trustee from one or more of Regions II, III, or IV shall be presented to the delegate body in the report of the Conference on Nominations and shall be declared by the President elected to the Board of Trustees, as of the following October 1.

Section 3.

h. Prior to the convening of the next regular session of the Annual Convention succeeding the adjournment of the conference, the presiding officer of the conference shall certify to the Secretary of Kiwanis International the result of the conference as to all recommendations for nomination for each office, same to be verified by the tellers and secretary of the conference, said record to be preserved by the Secretary of Kiwanis International until the adjournment of the convention.

Section 3.

i. When the nomination of candidates for the offices of Kiwanis International shall become the order of business of the Annual Convention, the report of the conference shall be presented by the Secretary of Kiwanis International and such report shall constitute the nominations for the offices of President, President-elect, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Trustees. They shall be nominated and v upon in the following order: President, President-elect, Vice-Predents, Treasurer, and Trustees.

Section 8.

a. The nominee for the office of Trustee from the European Federation shall be presented to the delegate body in the report of the Conference on Nominations and shall be declared by the President elected to the Board of Trustees, as of the following October first. Delegates from the clubs in the European Federation shall not be eligible to vote for Trustee candidates from other areas.

b. The nominee for the office of Trustee from each of the two (2) Canadian Districts as presently constituted, including all areas attached thereto, shall be presented to the delegate body in the report of the Conference on Nominations and shall be declared by the President elected to the Board of Trustees, as of the following October first. Delegates from the clubs in said Canadian Districts shall not be eligible to vote for Trustee candidates from other areas.

c. The nominee for the office of Trustee from the Asia-Pacific Area shall be presented to the delegate body in the report of the Conference on Nominations and shall be declared by the President elected to the Board of Trustees, as of the following October first. Delegates from clubs in the Asia-Pacific Area shall not be eligible to vote for Trustee candidates from other areas. Part 9. Amend Article XI, Section 9 of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International by deleting the present Section 9 and substituting a new Section 9, as follows:

Section 9. The nominees for Trustees for regular two-year terms,

"cept those whose election has been provided for in Section 8 ive, receiving the greater number of votes shall be declared elected. When necessary to fulfill the requirements of guaranteed representation for the at-large position of Trustee from Regions II, III, IV, or V as provided in Article VIII, Section 1 c(2) of the Constitution, the nominee from Region II, III, IV, or V receiving the greater number of votes shall be declared elected. No ballot for Trustee shall be counted whereon it appears that the elector has voted for a greater or lesser number of nominees than there are possible vacancies to be filled.

Part 10. Amend Article XI, Section 11 of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International by deleting the present Section 11 and substituting a new Section 11, as follows:

Section 11. In case of any vacancy or vacancies occurring in the Board of Trustees during the first year of a two-year term, thus necessitating the election of a Trustee at the next Annual Convention for a one-year term, the Secretary of Kiwanis International shall inform all district governors, the President of Kiwanis International-Europe and the Asia-Pacific Conference Chairman that an election for the said one-year term will be held at the next International Convention after the vacancy has been created, and that nominations may be submitted in accordance with procedures outlined in Section 3 g(2) in this Article, such nominations to be presented to the Annual Convention by the Conference on Nominations.

Part 11. Amend Article XII, Section 4 of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International by deleting the present Section 4 and substituting a new Section 4, as follows:

"I. Vacancies in Office

ction 4. In the event of a vacancy in the office of Trustee during the administrative year, subject to the provisions for guaranteed representation in Article VIII of the Constitution, the Board of Trustees shall elect a qualified member of a chartered club to fill such office, who shall serve only until the end of the administrative year.

Part 12. Amend Article XII, Section 5 of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International by deleting the present Section 5 and substituting a new Section 5, as follows:

Section 5. When, due to election results, any Region is not represented by its minimum number of guaranteed representatives on the Board of Trustees, as defined in Article VIII of the Constitution, the said Region shall certify to the Secretary of Kiwanis International, at the Annual Convention and pursuant to the procedure approved by the Board of Trustees, the name of its nominee who shall be seated by the Board of Trustees as a Trustee to serve for a term of two (2) years.

t 13. The nomination and election of the Board of Trustees as prescribed in this amendment shall be effective for elections at the 1988 Annual Convention. The amendment shall otherwise be effective October 1, 1988. Sections deleted by this amendment shall be omitted from the Constitution and Bylaws after the effective date of this amendment. Section 9. The nominees for Trustees for regular two-year terms, except those whose election has been provided for in Section 8 above, receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected, provided no ballot for Trustee shall be counted whereon it appears that the elector has voted for a greater or lesser number of nominees than there are possible vacancies to be filled. All following Sections in this Article involve only the nominees designated in this section.

Section 11. In case of any vacancy or vacancies occurring in the Board of Trustees during the first year of a two-year term, thus necessitating the election of a Trustee at the next International Convention for a one-year term, the Secretary of Kiwanis International shall inform all district governors and the European Federation President, that an election for the said one-year term will be held at the first International Convention after the vacancy has been created, and that nominations may be submitted in accordance with procedures outlined in Section 3 g(2) in this Article, such nominations to be presented to the Annual Convention by the Conference on Nominations. The delegates shall then vote for the number of Trustees to be elected for the one-year term.

XII. Vacancies in Office

Section 4. In the event of a vacancy in the office of Trustee during the administrative year, the Board of Trustees shall elect a qualified member of a chartered club to fill such office, who shall serve only until the end of the administrative year.

Section 5. When, due to election results, the European Federation is not represented on the Board of Trustees, as defined in Article VIII, Section 1, of the Constitution, the said Federation shall certify to the Secretary of Kiwanis International the name of its nominee who shall be seated by the Board of Trustees as a Trustee to serve for a term of two (2) years.

When, due to election results, a Canadian district does not have the specified representation on the Board of Trustees, as defined in Article VIII, Section 1, of the Constitution, the Board of Trustees of that Canadian district shall certify to the Secretary of Kiwanis International the name of the nominee who shall be seated by the Board of Trustees as a Trustee to serve for a term of two (2) years.

When, due to election results, the Asia-Pacific Area does not have the specified representative on the Board of Trustees, as defined in Article VII, Section 1, of the Constitution, the Asia-Pacific Conference shall certify to the Secretary of Kiwanis International the name of the nominee who shall be seated by the Board of Trustees as a Trustee to serve for a term of two (2) years.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 2 TO THE INTERNATIONAL CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

This amendment is co-sponsored by the Kiwanis Clubs of Alta, Norway, St. Eustache, Quebec, Canada, Salem, Massachusetts, San Francisco, California, Greenwich, Connecticut, Santa Rosa, California, San Mateo, California, Marion, Alabama, Florence, Omaha, Nebraska, East Liberty, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Cedar Creek Lake, Texas, Olympia, Washington, and Mankato, Minnesota.

Purpose: To permit women to become members of Kiwanis.

CONSTITUTION

Amend Article V, Section 4, of the Constitution of Kiwanis International as follows:

V. Clubs

Section 4. Active Membership

a. <u>United States</u>. The active membership of <u>any</u> club shall consist of <u>persons</u> of good character and community standing residing or having other community interests within the area of this club.

b. Areas Other Than United States. At the option of each district, or any nation within such district, or any club within a non-districted area, the active membership of any club shall consist of either (1) men or (2) persons of good character and community standing residing or having other community interests within the area of this club.

c. The active membership of <u>clubs</u> shall be composed of a cross section of those who are engaged in recognized lines of business, vocation, agriculture, institutional or professional life; or who having been so engaged, shall have retired. The number of members in any one given classification shall not exceed twenty percent (20%) of the total active membership.

d. No <u>person</u> shall be eligible to membership in <u>clubs</u> who <u>hold</u> membership (other than honorary) in any other Kiwanis club or service club of like character.

e. An active member shall pay a membership fee and annual membership dues, and shall be entitled to all privileges of the club.

BYLAWS

Amend Article II, Section 2 a(1) and 2 d(1), and Section 3b of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International as follows:

II. Membership in Clubs

Section 2. Membership in a chartered club is limited to men or persons, as permitted by the Constitution, over eighteen years of age who satisfy the qualifications for either active membership, privileged membership, senior membership, or honorary membership as follows:

a. Qualifications for Active Membership.

(1) An active member must be of good character and community standing and reside or have other community interests within the area of the chartered club.

(2) An active member must be engaged in an occupation in a recognized line of business, vocation, agriculture, or institutional or professional life or who, having been so engaged, has retired.

d. Qualifications for Honorary Membership

PRESENT PROVISIONS CONSTITUTION Article V, Section 4

V. Clubs

Section 4. Active Membership

a. The active membership of this club shall consist of men of good character and community standing residing or having other community interests within the area of this club.

b. The active membership of this club shall be composed of a cross section of those who are engaged in recognized lines of business, vocation, agriculture, institutional or professional life; or who having been so engaged, shall have retired. The number of members in any one given classification shall not exceed twenty percent (20%) of the total active membership.

c. No man shall be eligible to membership in this club who holds membership (other than honorary) in any other Kiwanis club or service club of like character.

d. An active member shall pay a membership fee and annual membership dues, and shall be entitled to all privileges of this club.

PRESENT PROVISIONS BYLAWS Article II, Section 2 a (1) and 2 d(1), and Section 3 b

II. Membership in Clubs

Section 2. Membership in a chartered club is limited to males over eighteen years of age who satisfy the qualifications for either active membership, privileged membership, senior membership, or honorary membership as follows:

a. Qualifications for Active Membership

(1) An active member must be a male of good character and community standing who resides or has other community interests within the area of the chartered club.

(2) An active member must be a male who is engaged in an occupation in a recognized line of business, vocation, agriculture, or institutional or professional life or who, having been so engaged, has retired.

d. Qualifications for Honorary Membership

(1) Any <u>person</u> who has performed some distinguished public service may be elected an honorary member of a chartered club (of which he or she is not an active, privileged, or senior member) for a period of one (1) year and thereafter may be re-elected annually.

Section 3.

b. Upon a Kiwanian's attaining the status of life member, his or her club is thereby relieved of any further dues obligation to Kiwanis International for that member. The member's financial obligations to his or her local club and district, including subscription to the *Kiwanis* magazine and the premium payable to defray the cost of insurance, shall remain intact.

THIS AMENDMENT IS ENDORSED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL.

(1) Any male who has performed some distinguished public service may be elected an honorary member of a chartered club (of which he is not an active, privileged, or senior member) for a period of one (1) year and thereafter may be re-elected annually.

Section 3.

b. Upon a Kiwanian's attaining the status of life member, his club is thereby relieved of any further dues obligation to Kiwanis International for that member. The member's financial obligations to his local club and district, including his subscription to the *Kiwanis* magazine and the premium payable to defray the cost of the general Comprehensive Liability Insurance, shall remain intact.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 3 TO THE INTERNATIONAL CONSTITUTION

Submitted by the Kiwanis Club of North Fresno, California.

Purpose: To adjust the maximum amount of district dues.

Amend, effective October 1, 1987, Article XII, Section 3, of the Kiwanis International Constitution as follows:

XII. Revenue

Section 3. Each member club shall pay to the district with which it is affiliated, for each and every member, with the exception of honorary members, a sum of at least one dollar (\$1.00) and not exceeding twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) per annum, such amount to include all district charges other than registration fees paid by those in attendance at district conventions or conferences; and which shall be payable annually or semi-annually as fixed by the district bylaws. If these dues are payable annually, they shall be due on the first day of the first month of each administrative year and payable not later than sixty (60) days thereafter and shall be based upon the membership of the respective clubs as shown on their semi-annual reports to Kiwanis International as of the last day of the twelfth month of the administrative year; if payable semi-annually, they shall be due on the first day of the first and seventh months of each administrative year and payable not later than sixty (60) days thereafter and shall be based upon the membership of the respective clubs as shown by the semi-annual reports to Kiwanis International as of the last day of the twelfth and the sixth months of the administrative year respectively.

PRESENT PROVISIONS CONSTITUTION Article XII, Section 3

XII. Revenue

Section 3. Each member club shall pay to the district with which it is affiliated, for each and every member, with the exception of honorary members, a sum of at least one dollar (\$1.00) and not exceeding twenty dollars (\$20.00) per annum, such amount to include all district charges other than registration fees paid by those in attendance at district conventions or conferences; and which shall be payable annually or semi-annually as fixed by the district bylaws. If these dues are payable annually, they shall be due the first day of the first month of each administrative year and payable not later than sixty (60) days thereafter and shall be based upon the membership of their respective clubs as shown on their semi-annual reports to Kiwanis International as of the last day of the twelfth month of the administrative year; if payable semi-annually, they shall be due on the first day of the first and seventh months of each administrative year and payable not later than sixty (60) days thereafter and shall be based upon the membership of the respective clubs as shown by the semi-annual reports to Kiwanis International as of the last day of the twelfth and the sixth months of the administrative year respectively.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 4 TO THE INTERNATIONAL CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

Submitted by the Kiwanis Club of Sage of Ottawa, Ontario, Canada.

Purpose: To adjust the annual membership fees for Senior members.

CONSTITUTION

Amend Article XII, Section 2, of the Kiwanis International Constitution, as follows:

XII. Revenue

Section 2. Each member club shall pay to Kiwanis International for each and every member, with the exception of those holding life member status and honorary members, the sum of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per annum for active and privileged members and seven dollars and fifty cents (\$7.50) per annum for senior members and Golden K clubs, in semi-annual installments, due on the first and seventh months of the administrative year, and payable not later than sixty (60) days thereafter. These dues shall be based upon the membership of the respective clubs as shown by the semi-annual reports to Kiwanis International as of the last day of the twelfth and sixth months of the administrative year. One dollar (\$1.00) of these dues shall be allocated for international extension.

BYLAWS

Amend Article XVI, Section 3, of the Kiwanis International Bylaws, as follows:

XVI. Official Publication

Section 3. The subscription price of the official publication of Kiwanis International in the United States and Canada shall be six dollars and fifty cents (\$6.50) per annum for active and privileged members and three dollars and twenty five cents (\$3.25) per annum for senior members and Golden K clubs, to be paid in semi-annual installments, due on the first day of the first and seventh months of each administrative year, and payable not later than sixty (60) days thereafter. All subscription funds shall be earmarked for the official publication of Kiwanis International and shall not revert to the Kiwanis general fund. Billing shall be based upon the membership of the respective clubs as shown in their semi-annual reports to Kiwanis International as of the last day of the twelfth and sixth months of each administrative year. The official publication of Kiwanis International may be made available to Kiwanis clubs in bulk orders of ten (10) or more copies at a cost to be determined by the Board of Trustees of Kiwanis International for distribution to Key Club and Circle K members only.

THIS AMENDMENT IS OPPOSED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL.

PRESENT PROVISIONS CONSTITUTION Article XII, Section 2

XII. Revenue

Section 2. Each member club shall pay to Kiwanis International for each and every member, with the exception of those holding life member status and honorary members, the sum of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per annum in semi-annual installments, due on the first day of the first and seventh months of the administrative year, and payable not later than sixty (60) days thereafter. These dues shall be based upon the membership of the respective clubs as shown by the semiannual reports to Kiwanis International as of the last of the twelfth and sixth months of the administrative year. XVI. Official Publication

Section 3. The subscription price of the official publication of Kiwanis International in the United States and Canada shall be six dollars and fifty cents (\$6.50) per annum, to be paid in semi-annual installments, due on the first day of the first and seventh months of each administrative year, and payable not later than sixty (60) days thereafter. All subscription funds shall be earmarked for the official publication of Kiwanis International and shall not revert to the Kiwanis general fund. Billing shall be based upon the membership of the respective clubs as shown in their semi-annual reports to Kiwanis International as of the last day of the twelfth and sixth months of each administrative year. The official publication of Kiwanis International may be made available to Kiwanis clubs in bulk orders of ten (10) or more copies at a cost to be determined by the Board of Trustees of Kiwanis International for distribution to Key Club and Circle K members only.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 5 TO THE INTERNATIONAL BYLAWS

Submitted by the Kiwanis Club of West Hartford, Connecticut.

Purpose: To allow for two meetings per month of all Kiwanis clubs.

Amend, effective October 1, 1987, Article I, Section 4, of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International as follows:

I. Clubs

Section 4. A chartered club shall hold <u>at least two meetings per</u> <u>month</u> on such day and at such place as shall be determined by the board of directors. A club may hold such other meetings as the board of directors or the membership shall desire.

THIS AMENDMENT IS NOT ENDORSED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL.

Section 4. A chartered club shall hold one weekly meeting on such day and at such place as shall be determined by the board of directors, except (a) any club organized prior to 1924 whose approved organizational bylaws permitted the club to meet bi-weekly and such club has continuously followed such practice without having been specifically disapproved by the Board of Trustees of Kiwanis International; or (b) clubs not in Canada and the United States, which shall meet at least bi-weekly. A club may hold such other meetings as the board of directors or membership may desire.

BYLAWS

Article I, Section 4

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 6 TO THE INTERNATIONAL CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

Submitted by the Board of Trustees of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District of Kiwanis International.

Purpose: To adjust the term of office for the International Board of Trustees.

CONSTITUTION

Amend Article VII, Section 7, of the Constitution of Kiwanis International as follows:

VII. Officers

Section 7. The term of office of Trustees elected at each annual convention shall be <u>three (3)</u> years effective October 2, 1987. No Trustee shall serve more than a single three-year term except that those elected to fill vacancies as specified in Article XI, Section 10 and 11 of the Bylaws may be reelected for a single three (3) year term.

BYLAWS

Amend Article XI, Sections 10 a, b, and c and Section 11, of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International, as follows:

XI. Nomination and Election of Officers

Section 10. In the event that a vacancy occurs in the Board of Trustees by reason of the election of a Trustee to some other office, such vacancy or vacancies shall be filled as follows:

a. The presiding officer shall announce to the convention the total number of Trustees to be elected for the <u>three-year</u> term. He shall also announce the vacancy or vacancies to be filled, if any.

b. The delegates shall then vote for the number of Trustees to be elected for the three-year term, no more and no less.

c. Trustees shall be elected by the vote of the delegates present and voting, and the nominees receiving the largest number of votes so cast shall be declared elected Trustees for the announced number of <u>three-year</u> terms, and those nominees receiving the next largest number of votes respectively shall be declared elected Trustees to fill, in that order, any two-year or one-year vacancy or vacancies occurring:

PRESENT PROVISIONS CONSTITUTION Article VII, Section 7

VII. Officers

Section 7. The term of office of Trustees elected at each annual convention shall be two (2) years, except for those Trustees elected to fill vacancies as specified in Article XI. Section 10 and 11. of the Bylaws. No Trustee shall serve for more than two (2) consecutive two-year terms as a Trustee.

BYLAWS Article XI, Sections 10 and 11

XI. Nomination and Election of Officers

Section 10. In the event that a vacancy occurs in the Board of Trustees by reason of the election of a Trustee to some other office, such vacancy or vacancies shall be filled as follows:

a. The presiding officer shall announce to the convention the total number of Trustees to be elected for the two-year term. He shall also announce the vacancy, or vacancies, to be filled, if any.

b. The delegates shall then vote for the number of Trustees to be elected for the two-year term, no more and no less.

c. Trustees shall be elected by the vote of the delegates present and voting, and the nominees receiving the largest number of votes so cast shall be declared elected Trustees for the announced number of twoyear terms, and those nominees receiving the next largest number of votes respectively shall be declared elected Trustees to fill the remaining vacancy or vacancies, if any, occurring during the election. (1) During the election or,

(2) During the year immediately preceding the International Convention and announced in accordance with Section 11 of this Article.

Section 11. In the event a vacancy or vacancies <u>occur</u> in the Board of Trustees during the first or second year of a three-year term:

a. The Secretary of Kiwanis International shall inform all district governors and the European Federation President that an election for the said terms will be held at the first International Convention after the vacancy or vacancies have been created, and that nominations may be submitted in accordance with the procedures outlined in Section 3 g (2) in this Article, such nominations to be presented to the annual convention by the Conference on Nominations.

b. Trustees shall be elected by the vote of the delegates present and voting as prescribed in Section 10 supra.

Section 11. In case of any vacancy or vacancies occurring in the Board of Trustees during the first year of a two-year term, thus necessitating the election of a Trustee at the next International Convention for a one-year term, the Secretary of Kiwanis International shall inform all district governors and the European Federation President, that an election for the said one-year term will be held at the first International Convention after the vacancy has been created, and that nominations may be submitted in accordance with procedures outlined in Section 3 g(2) in this Article, such nominations to be presented to the Annual Convention by the Conference on Nominations. The delegates shall then vote for the number of Trustees to be elected for the one-year term.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 7 TO THE INTERNATIONAL CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

Purpose: To minimize the number of litigations.

Submitted by the Kiwanis Club of North DeKalb, Georgia.

CONSTITUTION

Amend Article VIII of the Constitution of Kiwanis International by adding a new Section 4 as follows:

Section 4. Kiwanis International, its officers, its Board of Trustees, and its employees are not authorized to initiate litigation under Article IV, Section 2 of the Bylaws against a member club without specific authorization from the House of Delegates prior to initiating the action.

BYLAWS

Amend Article IV, Section 2(c) of the Bylaws of Kiwanis International by deleting the current paragraph c and adding a new paragraph c as follows:

IV. Membership of Clubs in Kiwanis International

Section 2.

c. In the event the license granted to a chartered club to use the Kiwanis Marks is revoked or terminated, the chartered club and its members shall immediately cease the use of the Kiwanis Marks and any marks confusingly similar thereto.

THIS AMENDMENT IS NOT ENDORSED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL.

PRESENT PROVISIONS CONSTITUTION

Article VIII, Section 4

PRESENT PROVISIONS BYLAWS

Article IV, Section 2(c)

IV. Membership of Clubs in Kiwanis International

Section 2.

c. In the event the license granted to a chartered club to use the Kiwanis Marks is revoked or terminated, the chartered club and its members shall immediately cease the use of the Kiwanis Marks and any marks confusingly similar thereto. Failure to cease use immediately of the Kiwanis Marks or any mark confusingly similar thereto will result in immediate and irreparable harm to Kiwanis International for which there is no adequate remedy at law. Therefore, Kiwanis International shall be entitled to obtain temporary restraining orders and preliminary and permanent injunctions against such use.

1987/88 Proposed Budget

Discussion was given to review of the 1987/88 preliminary budget and accompanying schedules presented by Staff. The Committee is reviewing the departmental operating budgets and will require a special committee meeting prior to the Washington, D.C. International Convention in order to complete its review.

As part of the budget review, the financial relationship between Kiwanis International - European Operations (Zurich office) and KI-E was discussed. The Committee feels that this issue will have to be resolved at a later date; however, for this year and the next fiscal year, we will be unable to provide any funding for European Operations.

The Finance Committee will meet in the International Office beginning late Thursday afternoon, June 11, 1987 through Saturday morning June 13, 1987, to finish review of the 1987/88 proposed operating and capital budgets.

Guidelines for Board Travel Expenses

The Committee reviewed a list of Board travel expense accounts prepared by Staff indicating the account numbers to be used and the kinds of expenses which are reimbursed. The Committee felt that this listing should be a guideline for internal use only for staff to use as a reference for budgeting and accounting purposes.

Internal Auditor

The Committee discussed the feasibility of adding a new staff position for an internal auditor. The Committee felt that current policies and procedures needed to be updated and in place before consideration could be given to assessing the need for an internal auditor. The Committee feels there is a need to pursue this matter further.

Capital Expenditure Request Modifying MIS Needs

After discussion of the reassessment of the efficiency and operational security of the Nixdorf mainframe by staff and Nixdorf technicians, it was determined that rather than adding one megabyte of memory which had previously been approved for \$6,000 that a more urgent current need exists for one used tape drive (\$4,000) and one communications channel (\$4,400). It was also noted that the sale of some of the previously installed IBM computer equipment had netted \$1,500.

Recommendation #1:

The Committee recommends approval for immediate purchase of one used tape drive and communications channel at a net additional approved cost of \$2,400.

I move that Recommendation #1 be adopted.

(Adopted)

Effect on budget: \$900 decrease in Capital Improvement Fund Surplus Procedure: None

Umbrella Policy for Comprehensive General Liability Insurance

Staff presented information concerning the cost and feasibility of obtaining an umbrella policy for comprehensive general liability insurance which we currently do not have. Trustee Robert Wagner briefly discussed the changing insurance market and suggested that our insurance broker closely monitor the cost and availability of liability insurance. He concurred that it would be important, if affordable, to have an umbrella policy.

More accurate premium estimates will not be available from Edward Hecht, Donchin-Hecht & Company, until the July Board meeting.

The Committee will review the umbrella liability costs and costs of the general liability insurance program at the July meeting.

Circle K Annual Audit

The Circle K Administrator reviewed the 1985/86 annual audit of Circle K International with the Committee. It was noted that the loss for Circle K (after subsidies) was \$5,617 for 1985/86 as compared to a loss of \$24,233 for 1984/85.

Recommendation #2:

The Committee recommends that the 1985/86 annual audit for Circle K International prepared by Wolf & Company be accepted.

I move that Recommendation #2 be adopted.

Finance: None Procedure: In Compliance

(Adopted)

Key Club Annual Audit

The Key Club Administrator reviewed the 1985/86 annual audit of Key Club International with the Committee. It was noted that dues increased because of a 10,000 membership increase for Key Club. Key Club surplus for 1985/86 (after subsidies) was \$129,000.

Recommendation #3:

The Committee recommends that the 1985/86 annual audit for Key Club International prepared by Wolf & Company be accepted.

I move that Recommendation #3 be adopted.

Finance: None Procedure: In Compliance

(Adopted)

Club Status for Bad Debt Determination

The Committee reviewed materials presented by staff concerning the current procedures for non-meeting clubs, charter revocations, reactivated clubs, club mergers, and disbanded clubs. It was noted that a staff committee was appointed by the International Secretary to study these subjects, and report back to the Committee October, 1987.

Update on Semi-Annual Billing Change

Staff reported that the District Secretaries are indicating a higher degree of accuracy with respect to what the clubs are paying for dues and the monthly reports. The change in the semi-annual billing is achieving the results intended; however, administrative costs are considerably higher.

Historical Report on Fees and Membership Data

Staff presented a report showing a list of fees and dues for the last eight years. Staff also presented several graphs showing various income and expense comparisons from 1979/80 to 1985/86. (See Exhibit A)

Audit Fee Allocation for Circle K, Key Club and Kiwanis International Foundation

Circle K and Key Club have been charged \$1,000 each per year, and the Foundation has been charged \$1,500 per year, for their portions of the annual audit performed by Wolf & Company. Based on information received from Wolf and Company on April 27, 1987, the actual cost breakdown for the audit completed for 1985/86 is as follows:

Since actual costs will be provided in the future, staff indicated that beginning with 1986/87, the actual costs for the audit will be passed on to Circle K, Key Club, and the Foundation.

Circle K and Key Club Investments

Staff presented a report showing the investment balances for Circle K and Key Club since September 30, 1984. The investment funds for Circle K and Key Club are kept in a money market fund. This fund is currently receiving an average yield of 5.7%.

The Committee is considering the practicality and advisibility of investing these funds with those of Kiwanis International and moving the invested funds for Circle K and Key Club into the investment portfolio with Bank One.

Life Member Actuarial Report

A Life Member actuarial report was presented by staff. This report was prepared at the request of the Board following the January Board meeting.

The report recommended an increase in the life memberhsip fee and a lengthened amortization schedule. This report has been referred to the Administration Committee for consideration as an amendment to the Bylaws.

Investment Report

Representatives from Bank One (formerly American Fletcher National Bank) presented a report on the status of invested funds to the Committee. The representatives commented that current interest rates are trending higher and yields are expected to increase in short to moderate term securities. Current funds are invested in compliance with Board guidelines.

Procedure for Obtaining Competitive Bids on Goods and Services

The Committee discussed a previous procedure for the above subject which had been inadvertently dropped. After considering the matter at length, it was decided to request staff to research and bring a proposal to our July meeting.
