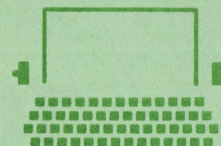


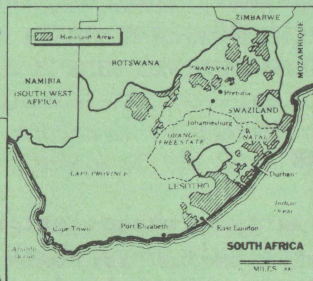
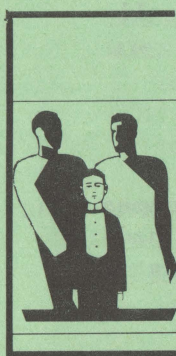

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THEATER/J SCHOOL APPROACH APARTHEID WITH PLAY AND SYMPOSIUM



The way in which society can bend an innocent boy into a bigot, even toward people he loves, is the thrust of the next University Theatre production, "Master Harold"...and the boys. Athol Fugard's play has a powerful ending to a story that takes place in the '50s in the apartheid state of Port Elizabeth, South Africa. Featured is white schoolboy Hallie, or Master Harold, and two black men who are his friends and who all his life have taken care of him and his alcoholic father. Performances are in the Mary Cable Building Theater on Feb. 20-21 and Feb. 27-28 at 8 p.m. Tickets are \$4 for faculty and staff, \$3 for students and older people, \$6 for others. APARTHEID AND DISINVESTMENT: MAKING AN INFORMED DECISION, is the title of a symposium on the play's opening day (Feb. 20), which is sponsored by University Theatre and the School of Journalism. Two experts on the subject of apartheid, Michael Massing, writer/editor, and Oliver F. Williams, CSC, professor of management ethics at the U. of Notre Dame and author of "The Apartheid Crisis," will speak. Also speaking will be Trevor Brown, dean of journalism. Issues to be addressed include apartheid and the role of the media, media influence of public opinion, the role of U.S. business in making changes in South Africa, and what concerned people can do to make changes there. A HIKE OF 515 STUDENTS this semester is the highest jump in enrollments at IUPUI since 1982. Figures for all campuses released at a recent meeting of the trustees show that we have a total enrollment of 22,356 for the spring semester, 2.4 percent higher than last year at this time. Fewer students enrolled in health-related areas because of a "planned decline," but Liberal Arts and Education are showing healthy gains, as are University Division and the adult non-degree programs. The upturn comes as a surprise. Vice President Gerald L. Bepko notes that we budgeted for a decline. Pleased with the increase, he said, "We hope that this is a sign that more and more people are discovering that IUPUI has a solid academic program." With the exception of the Bloomington and Northwest campuses, other IU campuses show enrollment increases. Total IU spring semester enrollment is 76,275, 1,318 more than last year at this time. Total credit hours being taken are 762,230, 2,799 more than last year for all IU campuses. IUB, IUPUI and some other campuses show slight declines in credit hour totals compared to the spring '86 figures.



RUSSIAN TOUR OPEN TO ALL

Thomas Fedor will lead another trip to the Soviet Union and Central Asia, May 29-June 13. Staff, faculty and students are welcome to join the 16-day educational tour that will include the cities of Leningrad, Moscow and Tashkent, as well as Helsinki in Finland. The cost of \$1,995 includes a Russian visa, round-trip air fare (from New York), most meals, all interior transportation fares and entrance fees to museums and points of interest. Also included are lodging costs, tips, flight insurance, and an English-speaking tour guide and interpreters. Tom, an associate professor in the Dept. of Geography, notes that participants do not need to speak Russian. They will need a valid passport. Application and a \$150 deposit are due by March 20. PROF. JEGEN'S TAX TIPS: DEDUCTIONS TAKE "FREE" OUT OF LUNCHES

Under the new "simplified" tax reform bill, deduction rules are changed. In the category covering meals, entertainment and travel expenses for business, only 80 percent of the otherwise deductible amount can be used. Other deduction allowances are either dropped or made tighter. For instance, in general there is no deduction allowed by the IRS for costs of attending non-business conventions or seminars or for educational travel expenses. There is no deduction allowed on travel expenses related to charitable work, or for the costs of business-related purchases of tickets for skyboxes for more than one event (other than the 80 percent of the regular ticket cost, which is deductible). Your deduction for home office expenses is limited to net income produced from the home business office activity, effective now. Your state and local taxes are still fully deductible, but sales taxes are not. Business and investors must capitalize sales taxes as part of the property acquired, effective now. For individuals only, unless you itemize on your individual tax form, you cannot deduct charitable contributions (this excludes corporations). Finally, medical expenses are deductible if the total is in excess of 7.5 percent of your adjusted gross income. Self-employed people and partners in business may deduct under business expense 25 percent of premiums paid for medical insurance for themselves, also effective now. (Lawrence A. Finally, Biomedical Research Support Grants (Other Academic) for 1986-87 have been awarded to **Martin Bard**, **Ellen Chernoff**, **William Stillwell** and **Frank Witzmann**, all in biology, and to **Asok Sen**, mathematical sciences. 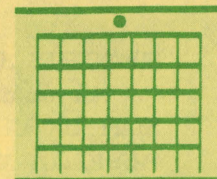
