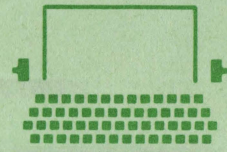

MASSEY, KUUMBA THEATRE, ANGELOU IN DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. CELEBRATION

In honor of the 61st birth anniversary of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., IUPUI has planned a day Jan. 15 that includes a prayer breakfast for community leaders, a special dramatic presentation for everyone on campus and an evening awards dinner. Following a presentation at Princeton University, Dr. James Earl Massey will speak during an IUPUI invitational prayer breakfast sponsored by Chancellor Gerald L. Bepko. The breakfast in the Madame Walker Urban Life Center begins a day dedicated to the memory and accomplishments of Martin Luther King Jr., U.S. civil rights leader who was slain in 1968. Massey is dean of the graduate school of theology, Anderson University and is a nationally recognized scholar, teacher and minister. Formerly dean of the chapel and university professor of religion and society at Tuskegee University, Massey is considered an authority on

interpretation of the philosophy and theology of Dr. King. All IUPUI faculty, staff and students, as well as Indianapolis-area residents and schoolchildren, are invited to attend the afternoon celebration, a performance of Chicago's famous Kumba Theatre at 1:30 p.m. in the spacious Walker Theatre. In a style called "ritual theatre," the group will present dramatic portrayals of episodes in the civil rights movement and in the life of Dr. King and other black leaders. Whenever possible, faculty, supervisors and directors are urged to permit students and staff to attend the performance. There is no charge. The celebration culminates with world famous poetess Maya Angelou speaking during the Black Student Union's 19th annual Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. dinner at the West End. An early sellout of more than 500 dinner tickets indicates the growing interest in the student group's yearly awards night and celebration. Entitled "This Dream...Will Not be Deferred," the event has been coordinated by William Walker, president of the BSU, with assistance from Robert Bedford, director of Minority Student Services.

IUPUI PARENTS WELCOME TO "PIT" PROGRAMS

PERFORMANCE APPRAISAL TRAINING FOR SUPERVISORS OPENS

The written and verbal issues in performance appraisal by supervisors will be covered in two workshops offered by Human Resources Administration. Conducting the Performance Appraisal, Jan. 17 or Jan. 31--Focuses on properly completing the appraisal form--what to include, documenting comments, writing brief and clear statements, and related supervisory activities.

Performance Review and Feedback Session, Jan. 24 or Feb. 7--Focuses on planning, preparing for and conducting the face-to-face meeting. Topics include guidelines for discussion, dealing with negative reactions, and getting the employee to participate productively.

HONORS AND ACCOLADES

For his teaching work in hands-on activities that focus on natural resources and the environment, Charles Barman, associate professor of education, was recently named outstanding Project Learning Tree facilitator by the Indiana Forestry and Woodland Owners Association.
