

## Lions Club purchases new radiation therapy machine

The newest and most versatile radiation therapy machine for the treating of cancer available in the world will be purchased by the Indiana Lions Club Cancer Control Fund, Inc., for the Indiana University School of Medicine. It will keep the radiation therapy facility at the I.U. Medical Center among the best anywhere, according to Ira Barker, Indianapolis, president of the Cancer Control Fund.

The new machine will cost \$1 million, and the Lions Club already are at work raising the money. A check for \$136,498.50 has been presented to the university by Barker, representing the down payment made when the machine was ordered from the maker in Sweden.

A new horizon in the area of cancer therapy opened at the I.U. School of Medicine in 1974 with the installation of one of the largest pieces of radiotherapy equipment in this hemisphere and the second of its type in the country.

The Sagittaire, a French-built 40-million electron volt linear accelerator that produces both high-energy X-rays and electron beams for the treatment of cancer, was provided then by Hoosier Lions Clubs, who spent three years sponsoring fund raising activities to raise the \$750,000 machine cost. (A similar machine would cost \$2.4 million today.) I.U. built a \$2 million underground radiation therapy facility to house the machine and other equipment that had been furnished by the Lions Clubs.

Today the Sagittaire is running at full capacity, treating approximately 40 patients in over an eight-hour day. (There now are six other machines like it in North America and 25 in Europe.) Another 50 to 60 patients a day are treated on older, less versatile machines purchased by the Lions in earlier years.

Known as the Scanditronix Medical Microtron, the new machine is not as powerful as the Sagittaire, but is extremely flexible and versatile. It has a 21 million volt X-ray beam approximately the same as the

Sagittaire, but it also has a 6 million volt X-ray beam which is preferable when cancer extends to near the surface of the patient.

It also provides 10 high energy electron beams from two to 22 million electron volts. Nearly 80 percent of all patients treated with high energy electron beams at the I.U. Medical Center require electron energies within this range. The machine is capable of operating up to three treatment rooms at one time. (Extra treatment units cost approximately \$350,000.)

"We at Indiana University Medical Center are very appreciative and grateful to Indiana Lions for providing the finest radiation therapy equipment available for the treatment of cancer," said Dr. Ned Hornback, chairman of the Department of Radiation Oncology at the I.U. School of Medicine. "We now can not only deliver the best patient care, but also can train young doctors in the use of the latest advances in radiation therapy for cancer patients, and do research to devise even better methods of treatment."

In 1947, Dr. John A. Campbell, then chairman of the

Department of Radiology at the I.U. Medical Center, met with Walter L. Shirley and trustees of the newly organized Lions Cancer Control Project of Indiana to propose a program of financial support for the development of a medical school-oriented center of education, patient service and research for the state of Indiana in the field of cancer control, using radiotherapy.

To date, Barker said, Lions Clubs have furnished nearly \$2 million for equipment, treatment machines and research studies which have benefited people of all ages everywhere. This included the acquisition of the first 1 million volt X-ray unit in the state, two cobalt-60 units, and a treatment simulator as well as the 40-million electron volt accelerator. The cobalt machines, plus most of the supporting equipment acquired through the years, are still used along with the Sagittaire.

Ten years ago Hoosier Lions raised three-quarters of a million dollars in three years. This time they hope to speed up the process through a variety of new approaches.

## Mel Garland hospitalized

Ed Schilling, former coach at Marian College and former director of athletics at Connersville High School, has taken over as IUPUI basketball coach due to an illness that has forced coach Mel Garland into the hospital.

Coach Garland was in his third year as IUPUI's basketball coach and it is hoped that he will be able to return as coach next season. Nick Kellum, dean of the School of Physical Education, has taken over as interim director of athletics.

Students wishing to apply may obtain an application at the Financial Aids Office. Applications deadline is March 31, 1982.



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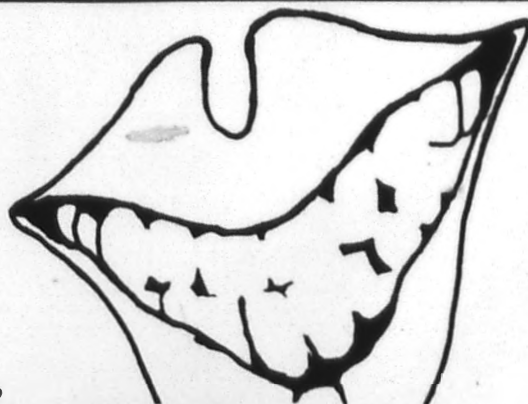

# Film series explores 'unthinkable' practices

"Whatever Happened to the Human Race?", a five episode motion picture — cited as a must for nursing and medical students — will be presented on the IUPUI campus January 22-29. The film series is sponsored by the Intervarsity Christian Student Fellowship, Catholic Student Center, Christian Medical Society, Nurses Christian Fellowship, Navigators, Baptist Student Union and the Dental School Bible Study.

The film series examines practices once labeled "unthinkable" but now considered acceptable. The first episode, "Abortion of the Human Race", closely scrutinizes human life in its embryonic form and development and leads into an examination of abortion as practiced in our society.

The second film, "Slaughter of the Innocents," looks at

infanticide and why key medical professionals advocate its further practice and legalization.

"Death by Someone's Choice" carefully looks at the proponents of euthanasia and the implied consequences for the future.

The fourth episode, "The Basis for Human Dignity", is an original critique of humanistic thinking which fosters apathy towards the rights of individuals. The film series concludes with "Truth and History", a statement of the Gospel and the hope it brings is examined and developed.

Dr. William Adams, former Dental School faculty member, will be hosting some of the seminars and will lead group discussion. There is no admission charge for the films.

All five episodes will be shown on Friday, Jan. 22 at 7 p.m. and again at 7 p.m.

Saturday, Jan. 23 and Sunday, Jan. 24 in the Lecture Hall Room 104.

Beginning Monday, Jan. 25, episode I will be shown at 11:05 a.m., 12:05 p.m., and at 5:15 p.m. in the Riley and Lilly Rooms, Student Union Building Mezzanine floor. Episodes II, III, IV, and V will be shown respectively on Jan. 26, 27, 28, and 29 at 11:05 a.m., 12:05 p.m., and 5:15 p.m. in the Student Union Building.

Episodes I, II, and III will be shown Jan. 25, 26, and 27 in Lecture Hall Room 101 followed by discussion at 7:15 p.m. Episode IV and V will be presented in the Medical Science Building B26 at 7:15 p.m. followed by discussion.

The films are narrated by Francis A. Schaeffer, theologian, philosopher, author, and United States Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, M.D.

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## Metros play at home after tiring week on road

If the Indiana Pacers feel they're road-weary, they should take a look at IUPUI's women's basketball team.

The Metros opened the road trip with a 67-60 victory at St. Joseph without Judy Cummings. Kim Galyan and Karen Secor. Cummings had injured her back in the Metro opening game of the season while Galyan and Secor suffered injuries after the IU-Southeast game.

Freshman Sheila Smith started her third game of the season against the Pumas and scored 21 points and pulled

down 21 rebounds to lead the Metros. Sue Baas took game scoring honors for the Metros with 22 points.

IUPUI continued their road trip with losses at Oakland City and Evansville.

Cummings returned to the Metro line up and scored 19 points and pulled down 18 rebounds in each game despite not being in top shape.

The Metros split two games last week, defeating Oakland City 61-56 while falling to ISU-Evansville 65-62. Cummings led the Metros in scoring in each game with 15 and 18 points respectively.

Barb Spears scored 10 points in each game while Baas scored 8 and 16 points respectively. Freshman Chris Nichols added six points in each game.

The Metros will play their first home game in over a month, their last being Dec. 8 against IU-Southeast, tomorrow night against Taylor. Tomorrow night's game is scheduled for 7 p.m. at Pike High School. Coach Kathy Tucker will take her squad back on the road this weekend to play in a tournament at Anderson and Monday will travel to Fort Wayne to play IUPUI-Fort Wayne.


## Two fellowships given in children's nursing

The Indiana University School of Nursing has just been awarded \$25,000 by the American Thoracic Society and American Lung Association. The award was announced by Dr. Rosanne Perez, chairman of the Department of Pediatrics and Women's Health and adjunct professor of pediatrics at the IU School of Nursing.

The two-year fellowship grant is to establish two fellowships in the specialty of pediatric pulmonary nursing. The fellows will study with

specialists at the IU nursing school and will train in the Pulmonary Disease Section at the James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children. Here they will have the opportunity to learn the most advanced nursing techniques for the care of children with respiratory disease.

Jean Hominghausen, a nurse who specializes in pediatric pulmonary nursing at Riley Hospital, will be responsible for a large part of the training of the new fellows.



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# Metros lose, 81-80, in coach's debut

Coach Ed Schilling's home debut was spoiled Friday night as the IUPUI Metros narrowly lost a tightly-contested battle to 12-2 Purdue-Calumet, 81-80.

It was the team's second loss to the Lakers this year, both of them by one-point deficits. The Metros held a 34-33 halftime lead, and scraped to a 3-pt margin with 5:15 left in the

game. But PU-C caught up, and Bernard Millard's toss-in with 33 seconds to go gave the visitors their winning edge. The Metros had one last chance, but Darron Thompson's shot at 6 seconds bounced off the rim and into the hands of Laker Mike Moore.

Tony Hawkin's superb efforts produced 25 points and 19 rebounds, both game highs, and a Metro season high for individual rebounding. Ron Angevine and Kim King each had 16 while Eric McKay chipped in 14. Edward Blackman's 21 lead Purdue-Calumet, followed by Moore's 20.

On the previous Tuesday, Jan. 12, Marian College bested the now Schilling-coached

Metros 68-66. Hawkins' 20 topped IUPUI's scoring, while Durand Walker, whose pair of free throws with two seconds left won it for the Titans, had a game high of 22 points.

The last Metro victory came at the expense of 4-12, injury ridden Indiana Tech, Jan. 5. The IUPUI team coasted to a 79-69 victory, with Hawkins again leading the way with 21 points and 12 rebounds. Angevine scored 19 and King added 16.

The squad's 4-2 pre-Christmas-break record has skidded to 7-8, with last Saturday's game with NCAA Division II leader, Wright State, postponed due to the bone-chilling weather. The Metros started their holiday break slate by bruising Tri-State, 84-79. It was the most physical game, and opponent, this writer has seen in her five years of Metro coverage, culminating in the most uncalled-for, viciously flagrant foul (to Scott Boles) she has seen in 31 years of attendance at basketball games. High point man for the Metros was Hawkins with 24, and Angevine and King both netted 20. After an 81-59 drubbing by Northern Kentucky, the squad slipped past Heidelberg, 72-71 Dec. 19. Then the Metros went into a tailspin, dropping three in a row to IU-Southeast (77-70 at MSA) Dec. 22nd, Nicholls State (72-64), and Xavier of Louisiana (97-84) before bouncing back against Indiana Tech.

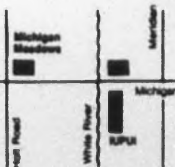

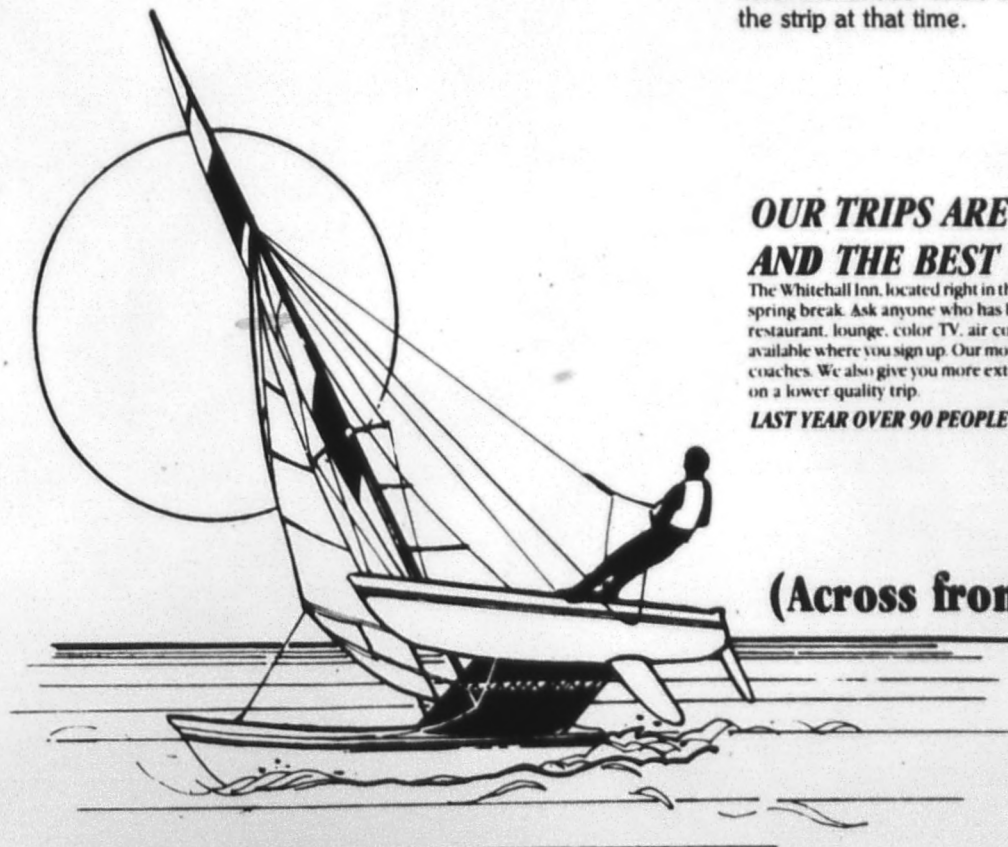
