Dr. Fett Joins Department





Dr. Fett is presently on the faculty at the Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minnesota, where she co-directs their contact dermatitis subgroup. Dr. Wolverton Leads Successful 7th Annual Cutaneous Biology Course

The 7th Annual Midwest Dermatologic Residencies Cutaneous Biology Course was held at the University Place Conference Center on October 25-26th, 2002. Almost 150 residents from over 30 residency programs in North America participated in this course. The objective of this course, founded and directed by Dr. Stephen Wolverton, is to present basic science in the context of clinical dermatology. Faculty lecturers included some new faces, including Drs. John Ansel (*Innate Immunity*; Northwestern Uni-



versity), Cheryl Armstrong (Melanoma Vaccines; Northwestern University), Allison Vidimos (Laser Basic Science; Cleveland Clinic), Manga Prashiela (Melanocytes; University of Cincinnati), Ray Konger (Carcinogenesis; Indiana University), and Darron Brown (Papillomavirus; Indiana University). These lecturers joined the "regular cast" of Drs. Diva Mutasim (Dermal-epidermal Junction; University of Cinncinnati), Henry Lim (Photobiology; Henry Ford), Neil Shear (Drug Hypersensitivity; University of Toronto), Jeffrey Petersen (Wound Healing; Washington University), Kenneth Gordon (New Biologic Therapies for Psoriasis; Northwestern University), John Foley (Fibroblasts and Dermal Matrix, Indiana University), Jeffrey Travers (Immunology Overview, Indiana University), and Dan Spandau (Keratinocytes, Indiana University). In addition to organizing the conference, Dr. Wolverton did two lectures (Clinical Relevance of Drug Mechanisms and Drug-induced Liver Disease). One of the highlights of the conference was a lecture on Basic Science of Botulinium Toxin given by Dr. William Beeson. Congratulations to Dr. Wolverton and all for making this course successful!

Ginat W. Mirowski, DMD, MD

Every issue of the Hackney-Norins Newsletter highlights an individual faculty member. This issue's spotlight is on Ginat W. Mirowski, DMD, MD, Associate Professor of Oral Medicine and Dermatology.

Dr. Mirowski is a rare person, with education and training in Dentistry, Dermatology and Vulvar Disease -- a powerful but nearly unique combination. Her overall goal is to further develop the field of mucosal dermatology.

Dr. Mirowski was born in Tel Aviv, Israel, lived in Mexico and her mother was French. By the time

she immigrated to the United States in the fourth grade, she spoke four (English, Spanish, French, and Hebrew) languages. Her family lived in Baltimore, where her father, a cardiologist and scientist, was working on the first implantable cardiac defibrillator. Ginat received a Bachelor's of Arts degree from Johns Hopkins University, went on to Harvard School of Dental Medicine, where she received her D.M.D. She became interested in advancing the specialty of oral medicine when she was a third-year dental student. After graduating she completed an Oral Pathology/Oral Medicine fellowship at Harvard Dental School

and continued on at Harvard Medical School, graduating with both a Masters of Science in Medicine, as well as her Doctorate of Medicine. Following her internship in the Department of Medicine at the University of Massachusetts, she went on to do her residency in dermatology at the University of California at San Francisco. Upon finishing her residency, she stayed on the faculty at UCSF as an Instructor of Dermatology and Stomatology.

Dr. Mirowski was recruited to I.U. School of Dentistry in 1996. However, under the leadership of Dr. Evan Farmer she had a joint appointment in the Department of Dermatology as an Assistant Professor of Dermatology and Oral Medicine.

Soon after her arrival at IU, she was the recipient of a Women's Dermatological Society Mentorship Award, in which she spent time with Dr. Libby Edwards, an established vulvar dermatologist in North Carolina. Dr. Mirowski has achieved numerous honors that attest to her many contributions to dermatology, especially mucosal dermatology.

These include being on the Editorial Board of the Journal of the American Academy of Dermatology. She directs several courses in the School of Dentistry, and has received teaching awards from both the School of Medicine as well as Dentistry. She is currently the Director of the Oral Medicine Symposium at the AAD. However, I believe that her most important contribution to medicine lay in the fact that she is the person to which our entire state (and surrounding ones, too!) sends complex mucosal dermatology patients -- many letters to her from grateful patients and referring physicians and dentists have crossed my desk. She was promoted to Associate Professor on July 1,

2002, and will achieve tenure on July 1, 2003.

What makes Dr. Mirowski so special is the level of passion she has -- passion for the field of mucosal dermatology, passion for teaching, and, passion for life. She is also passionate about her family; husband Dr. Stephen Wintermeyer (I.U. Department of Medicine), and sons Michael and David (ages 11 and 8).

Dr. Mirowski continues to build bridges spanning dentistry and dermatology as well as gynecology and dermatology, and all of us have benefited from the efforts of this talented colleague.
