## LEGISLATIVE NOTE

**L**egislators in this session of the General Assembly seem to have reached a strong and bipartisan consensus that there are strong connections between education and economics in Indiana. But the legislators have reached no consensus on what to make of the connections. . . .

The Democrats are the most generous advocates for education -- but they hold minority positions in both houses and there are no prospects that their education programs will be endorsed and enacted by the Republican majorities. But if they cannot persuade their Republican colleagues this year, the Democrats do hope to make a record that persuades voters in the general elections next year.

The Republicans have also become advocates for education -- but the strength of their advocacy is closely related to the costs of specific proposals. There is good prospect that the Republicans will enact higher requirements for high school diplomas and mandate longer academic years for elementary and secondary schools.

Republican legislators are looking for additional money for larger education appropriations . . . but the legislative preference in both parties is to give the greatest additional support to specific educational programs, particularly those that seem most directly related to economic development, rather than to make larger general appropriations to elementary, secondary and higher education.

## PINNELL NAMED FOUNDATION PRESIDENT

W. George Pinnell, executive vice president of Indiana University, has been elected president of the I.U. Foundation. On March 1 he will succeed William S. Armstrong who announced several months ago his decision to retire after 30 years of service with the Foundation.

I.U. President John W. Ryan, who also is chairman of the I.U.F. Board of Directors, said, "I am highly pleased with the selection of George Pinnell. His experience, training and disposition are ideally suited for the responsibilities that are involved. Furthermore, he is a friend and colleague whose love and devotion for Indiana University are exemplary.

The Foundation Transition Committee, formed for the purpose of recommending a new I.U.F. president, selected Pinnell following a six-month review of goals and objectives that included interviews with numerous faculty and staff members and alumni. The group unanimously concluded that Pinnell was the most qualified person to fill the position. University Chancellor Herman B Wells was chairman of the Transition Committee.

The I.U. Foundation is an independent and private corporation which collects, manages and disburses contributions for Indiana University.

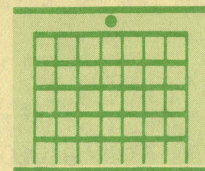
