


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Center for Service and Learning Overview

The Center for Service and Learning (CSL) engages students, faculty, and staff in educationally meaningful service to promote learning and development, advance best practice and research, achieve community goals through partnerships, and further the civic engagement mission of IUPUI. When CSL was created in 1993, it began with a focus on service learning course development. Since then, four offices (see below) have been established to further the campus mission of civic engagement.

CSL is comprised of four offices:

[The Office of Service Learning](#) assists faculty and staff in the effective use of service learning pedagogy at both the course and program levels. This office provides resources and consultations, conducts research, and promotes the scholarship of engagement.

[The Office of Community Service](#) coordinates programs to promote and recognize the involvement of students, faculty, and staff in the community. This office cultivates student leadership, organizes campus-wide community service events, and works with faculty, staff, student organizations and community agencies to promote service opportunities.

[The Office of Neighborhood Partnerships](#) collaborates with community organizations and other campus units to build long-term partnerships between IUPUI and its surrounding neighborhoods.

[The Office of Community Work Study](#) involves students in the community through Federal Work-Study employment. Through these placements, students have the opportunity to integrate career exploration and educational experiences with meaningful employment.

The center is home to 12 full-time staff members, 8 graduate assistants, and 4 work-study students. Julie Hatcher was appointed the Executive Director on July 1, 2012 as Dr. Bob Bringle, founding director of the center, retired from Indiana University after 38 years of service. CSL also welcomed a new Coordinator for the Office of Community Service this year, Jennifer Halford.

Executive Summary

Teaching and Learning

- Based upon a national volunteer rate of \$21.79 (www.independentsector.org), IUPUI students contributed approximately \$3.94 million in service hours in the community through service learning courses.
- In 2011-2012, an estimated 9,955 students enrolled in a course containing a service component, a student increase of 14% compared to the 2010-2011 academic year.
- Faculty teaching a service learning course reported a total of 278 community partners. This is a 50% increase compared to the 2010-2011 academic year.
- In 2011-2012, 14 schools reported offering service learning courses, contributing 181,262 hours of service in the community. This is a 14% increase in hours compared to the 2010-2011 academic year.
- The CSL conducted a total of 193 individual faculty consultations and hosted 34 workshops in areas ranging from service learning research, partnerships, assessment, community/civic engagement, ePortfolios, and visual reflection tools.
- The Service Learning Assistant (SLA) scholarship program awards students to support faculty and staff in their civically engaged teaching and scholarship (e.g., service learning courses, community-based research, professional service, partnerships). The SLA program and students are an essential component to sustaining faculty use of service learning pedagogy. During the 2011-2012 academic year, 38% of the service hours contributed by service learning courses were supported by SLA funding.

Civic Engagement

- In 2011-2012, IUPUI students who were civically engaged (through service learning courses, community service events, and service-based scholarship programs) contributed a combined total of 266,185 hours of service in the community, equivalent to \$5.8 million (using the national volunteer rate of \$21.79/hour).
- In 2011-2012, Sam H. Jones Community Service Scholarships were awarded to 209 students who contributed \$1.03 million in service hours to support the civic engagement mission of the campus (47,594 hours of service x national volunteer rate of \$21.79/hour).
- In the 2011-2012 academic year, students, faculty, and staff participating in community service events at IUPUI contributed \$397,013 in service in the community (more than 18,220 hours of service x national volunteer rate of \$21.79/hour).
- IUPUI's 11th annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service had a record number of 563 participants including faculty, staff, students, and community guest participants. IUPUI collaborated with 28 non-profit organizations and provided more than 1,650 hours of service in the community.
- Of federal work-study money earned by students at IUPUI, 36% was earned by students working in the community (as opposed to employment on campus). This figure exceeds the national guidelines of 7% for community-based placements.
- The CSL's Office of Community Work Study recruited and trained 85 federal work-study eligible students as America Reads*America Counts (AR*AC) coaches and leaders. The tutoring program is a federal initiative aimed at increasing reading and math competency among America's youth to ensure success in high school, college and beyond. A survey of teachers and coaches reported 93% of America Counts tutored students improved in math and 86% of America Reads tutored students improved in reading.

Diversity

- In the Sam H. Jones Community Service Scholarship Program, 33% of the students self-identify as representing a racial or ethnic minority (13% Black/African American, 12% Hispanic/Latino, 4% Asian, 1% Middle Eastern, 3% other, and 67% white).
- 13% of the Sam H. Jones scholars self-identify as Black/African American compared to 8% of the campus population.

- 12% of the Sam H. Jones scholars self-identify as Hispanic/Latino compared to 3% of the campus population.
- Students in the America Reads*America Counts (AR*AC) Program identify how they have benefited from their participation in the AR*AC program. 71% reported gaining skills that improve their ability to work with diverse populations as a primary outcome.
- The CSL continues to use a rigorous selection process for the scholarship programs in which CSL coordinators are responsible for identifying students (which includes all programs except for the Service Learning Assistant program whereby faculty select the students). Of the students selected through CSLs application process, 42% represent racial or ethnic minorities; these scholarship programs are instrumental to the success of many minority students on campus.

Best Practices

- Nearly 35% of all study abroad courses offered at IUPUI have integrated a service component. To further support faculty interested in International Service Learning, CSL conducted a year-long faculty learning community around the use of best practices.
- The CSL has been collaborating with University College on the ePDP (electronic Personal Development Planner) to make civic learning more visible. In addition to using eportfolios within the Service Learning Assistant Program, CSL's Instructional Technology Specialist began using Digital Storytelling to facilitate reflection and provide authentic evidence of civic growth. The use of Digital Storytelling has expanded into all scholarship programs as well as several faculty teaching service learning courses.
- A Regional Advisory Council, comprised of universities, K-12 schools, businesses, and non-profit partners, was established to serve as advocates for the community schools movement and to advance IUPUI's Center for University-Assisted Community Schools.
- The CSL's Office of Neighborhood Partnerships conducted training for Indianapolis Public School principals and community school coordinators on the use of service learning and student engagement. In addition, a forum was hosted on policies, which was attended by community residents, school administrators and teachers, and representatives of community organizations.
- The staff of CSL consulted with 22 universities interested in service learning and civic engagement. Some of these universities include Sun-Yat-Sen University in China, University of Colorado-Boulder, Sacramento College, Cedarville College, and Southern Illinois University.

External Awards and Appointments

- The *U.S. News and World Report*, in their 2011 editions of America's Best Colleges, listed IUPUI as "one of the top universities in the nation with outstanding service learning programs". IUPUI has received this recognition annually since 2002.

- The CSL received \$73,500 in external grants to provide service within the community. This was a 79% increase in grants compared to the 2010-2011 academic year.
- The University of Pennsylvania Netter Center for Community Partnerships awarded funding to the IUPUI Center for Service and Learning to create a regional Center for University-Assisted Community Schools as part of their National Replication Project. The new IUPUI-based center will assist universities and community schools in Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, Kentucky and Illinois with implementation of university-assisted community schools strategies.
- The CSL was awarded Outstanding Community Partner Award from the Hawthorne Social Service Agency and Near West Collaborative.
- IUPUI was recognized on the 2012 President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll as an Honor Roll Finalist by the Corporation for National and Community Service. Selection to the Honor Roll constitutes recognition from the highest levels of the federal government for the campus commitment to service and civic engagement.

Sam H. Jones Community Service Scholarship Program

This marks the 19th year that IUPUI has funded a service-based scholarship program. The mission of the Sam H. Jones (SHJ) Community Service Scholarship program is (a) to recognize students for previous service to their high school, campus, or community, and (b) to support the continued community involvement of students in educationally meaningful service and leadership activities. Goals of the program are to retain students at IUPUI, support academic achievement and success, provide opportunities for involvement in community service, and promote leadership development. During the 2011-12 academic year, 397 scholarships (\$649,069) were awarded to 229 students who provided an estimated 39,738 hours of service to IUPUI and the Indianapolis community. These include:

Alternative Break Trip Leaders (9 @ \$250 to \$500 per semester = \$4,500)

Alternative Break Trip Leaders are students who have participated in at least one Alternative Break trip and who are interested in planning, implementing, and leading an Alternative Spring Break trip. Students are trained on best practices, reflection, planning, and group building to help them both grow as students and as active citizens. Each student plans one trip for 12 – 15 participants.

America Reads and America Counts Scholars (9 @ \$1,875 per semester = \$30,000)

This program recognizes America Reads tutors as site leaders at tutoring sites where they serve as team leaders, schedule meetings with other site tutors, and attend monthly meetings with program coordinators. Students serve 6 hours per week for 30 weeks of the year.

Community Partner Scholars (12 @ \$408.44 to \$2,000 per semester = \$40,508.44)

Students in this program serve 10 hours per week as IUPUI campus liaisons to the Indianapolis community. The Community Partner Scholars engage in activities to assist community partners in meeting their missions while serving as student advocates for civic engagement on the IUPUI campus. Near West community partner sites are chosen based on their established relationship with IUPUI and their involvement in supporting the campus mission of civic engagement.

Community Service Leaders (11 @ \$2,000 per semester = \$44,000)

This program recognizes former Community Service Scholars for their academic achievement and exemplary service to the community and campus. Community Service Leaders staff the Office of Community Service and plan large scale service events. Community Service Leaders contribute 10 hours of service per week.

Community Service Scholars (15 @ \$1,750 per semester = \$50,750)

This program recognizes continuing IUPUI students who have demonstrated service to the campus or community. Students volunteer four hours each week at a community agency and enroll in a service learning class (PHST P330: Community Service Seminar).

Democracy Plaza (8 @ \$750 to \$2,500 per semester = \$21,250)

Students in this program serve a minimum of 10 hours per week organizing activities related to the Democracy Plaza at IUPUI. Activities include leading Pass-the-Mic discussion forums around political issues, working with faculty to develop class-led discussion forums, and posting discussion items on public chalkboards.

Freshman Service Scholars (15 @ \$1,500 per semester = \$45,000)

This program recognizes entering students who have successfully demonstrated a commitment to service while in high school and/or their community. Students enroll in a service learning class, contribute 3 hours of service a week at a community agency, attend monthly meetings, and participate in group service projects.

Fugate Scholars (11 @ \$250 to \$1,500 per semester = \$26,500.00)


This program recognizes students for community outreach and liaison positions between the university and neighborhood organizations. Students served 6 hours per week with the George Washington Community Schools, providing tutoring and information on college access.

Service Corps (10 @ \$750 per semester = \$15,000)

This program recognizes IUPUI students who have demonstrated leadership skills and a commitment to serving the community. Students serve 7 hours per month as site leaders for campus wide service events.

Service Learning Assistantships (112 @ \$750 to \$3,375.00 per semester = \$249,225.00)

This program recognizes students who have successfully completed a service learning class and are chosen by a service learning professor as an assistant to implement and involve others in a service learning class. Service hours vary, but average 10 hours per week per student.

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Service Learning Classes

IUPUI has received national awards and recognition for successfully integrating service learning courses across campus. CSL continues to be a leader in research on service learning and is committed to supporting faculty in the use of service learning.

Service learning is a course-based, credit-bearing educational experience in which students:

- a) participate in an organized service activity that meets identified community needs, and
- b) reflect on the service activity in such a way as to gain further understanding of course content, a broader appreciation of the discipline, and an enhanced sense of personal values and civic responsibility.






Enrollment

The number of students enrolled in a service learning course increased by 14% compared to the previous academic year.




The figure above highlights the upward trend of students enrolled in a service learning course.




The figure above depicts students' enrollment in a service learning course by school during the 2011-2012 academic year.

The figure above shows the number of undergraduate students enrolled, by school, in a service learning course for the 2011-2012 academic year.




The figure above shows the number of graduate students enrolled, by school, in a service learning course during the 2011-2012 academic year.

Service Learning Assistants

Service Learning Assistant (SLA) Scholarships are available to faculty or professional staff to support community engaged teaching, research, and service. SLAs may assist their faculty/staff mentor:

- in the design/implementation of a service learning class;
- conducting a community-engaged research project;
- supporting capacity building for the expansion of service learning within a campus department or unit;
- or implementing a professional service project in and with the community.

During the 2011-2012 academic year, 38% of the total number of service learning courses were supported by SLA funds.

❖ **Midwest Center for University-Assisted Community Schools**

CSL is a key collaborator in the creation and support of the Center for University-Assisted Community Schools at IUPUI, which offers training and resources for K-12 schools, community organizations, and institutions of higher education. The Midwest Center for University-Assisted Community Schools at IUPUI (Midwest Center) provides technical assistance and training for school communities and universities throughout the region in developing and enhancing collaborative engagement. The CSL was awarded \$50,000 for each of three years from the Netter Center for Community Partnerships at the University of Pennsylvania to be a regional center for community school work.

Our mission: The Midwest Center for University-Assisted Community Schools provides technical assistance and training for school communities interested in implementing and strengthening the community schools model and university collaboration.

Office of Community Work Study

The Office of Community Work Study provides the opportunity for eligible non-profit and government agencies to recruit and hire IUPUI work-study eligible students, utilizing federal dollars to subsidize the students' hourly wages. The federal government requires all institutions utilizing federal work study funding to use at least 7% for community service positions. IUPUI used 36.11% for community-based positions in the last academic year.



Activities/Programs

America Reads*America Counts

The America Reads*America Counts tutoring program (AR*AC) is a federal initiative aimed at increasing reading and math competency among America's youth to ensure success in high school, college, and beyond. Through the use of federal work-study funds, IUPUI is able to place eligible college students as reading and math tutors who work to boost the literacy and math confidence and academic performance of struggling students at no cost to the school or the students. AR*AC provides one-on-one and small group tutoring at ten community sites, including Indianapolis Public Schools and community centers.

*America Reads*America Counts Team Leaders*

America Reads*America Counts Team Leaders serve as liaisons between their tutoring site's site supervisor and the IUPUI America Reads*America Counts staff. Team Leaders work closely with site supervisors, site staff, and teachers to identify learners in need of reading and math tutoring. Additionally, Team Leaders build a team atmosphere at their site by planning and facilitating bi-weekly reflection meetings and managing effective communications among all constituents.

*America Reads*America Counts Coaches*

The America Reads* America Counts Coaches serve young people in Indianapolis by providing one-on-one coaching to struggling students. Each coach is responsible for providing weekly in-person tutoring assistance to students in underserved populations in the Indianapolis area. As an educational tutor and a role model to children, coaches strive to consistently demonstrate IUPUI's commitment to civic engagement.

Outcomes

- In the 2011- 2012 academic year, 76 IUPUI students participated in the America Reads*America Counts Program as coaches.
- America Reads*America Counts Coaches provided 9,029 hours of service.
- According to a survey of the teachers, 93% of America Counts students improved in math and 86% of America Reads students improved in reading.
- Coaches used \$86,200 of Federal Work-Study money, which is 5.29% of IUPUI total Federal Work-Study.

Awards

The Center for Service and Learning has a reputation for outstanding programs and research and last year was no exception. A next significant campus goal is to receive the Carnegie Classification for Community Engagement in 2015. The application process will require a collective focus on gathering information across campus that demonstrates how IUPUI has improved programs, processes, and policies since earning the award in 2006.

- IUPUI received the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll Finalist award from the [Corporation for National & Community Service](#) for IUPUI's ability to 'achieve meaningful, measureable outcomes in the communities we serve'.
- The 2011 editions of America's Best Colleges from *US News and World Report* listed IUPUI as one of the top universities in the nation with outstanding service-learning programs. IUPUI has received this recognition annually since 2002.
- The University of Pennsylvania Netter Center for Community Partnerships has awarded funding to the IUPUI Center for Service and Learning to create a regional Center for University-Assisted Community Schools as part of Penn's national replication project. The new IUPUI-based center will assist universities and community schools in Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, Kentucky and Illinois with implementation of university-assisted community schools strategies.

The Center for Service and Learning is dedicated to supporting civically engaged faculty in their teaching, research, and service.
