INDIANA ACOG, SPRING MEETING

The Indiana Section Scientific Meeting & Huber Lecture will be held on April 21, 2010 at the Ritz Charles, Carmel, IN.

The topic for this spring meeting is "Obstetrics...New Approaches to Old Problems."

The 2010 Huber Lecture will be given by **Dr. Charles Lockwood, M.D.** Anita O'Keeffe Young Professor of Women's Health and Chair, of the Department

of Obstetrics, Gynecology & Reproductive Sciences - Yale University School of Medicine and the Chief, Obstetrics & Gynecology - Yale-New Haven Hospital.

Dr. Lockwood

is a leading expert in maternal-fetal medicine, specializing in pregnancy loss, preterm delivery and maternal thrombophilias, a blood-clotting disorder in pregnancy.

Dr. Lockwood's research interests include the pathophysiology of recurrent pregnancy loss, the prediction of preterm delivery, and the mechanisms of abnormal endometrial bleeding. He is the senior editor of the CD-ROM and Internet-based textbook "Obstetrics: UpToDate" (2001) and has authored more than 205 journal articles, 50 book chapters and hundreds of abstracts. His writing and research have earned him awards from the Society of Perinatal Obstetricians, the Society of Maternal Fetal Medicine and the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

Dr. Lockwood joined the Yale faculty in 2002 as chair of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the School of Medicine. He serves as chief of Ob/Gyn at Yale-New Haven Hospital and is the director of the Yale Women's Health Center. From 1998 to 2000, he was also acting director of the Kaplan Comprehensive Cancer Center at the

Dr. Lockwood received his undergraduate education at Brown University and his M.D. degree from the University of Pennsylvania. He also has a Masters in Health Care Management from Harvard School of Public Health. He completed his residency at the University of Pennsylvania Hospital and holds a postdoctoral fellowship in maternal-fetal medicine from Yale-New Haven Hospital in 1987. Before joining the NYU faculty, he was at Tufts University School of Medicine and Mount Sinai Medical Center in New York, where he was director of perinatal research. He is the

editor-in-chief of *Contemporary Ob/Gyn* and associate editor of the *Journal of Maternal-Fetal & Neonatal Medicine*. He has served on numerous national and state committees dealing with perinatal concerns. He completed his term as president of the Society for Gynecologic Investigation in March 2008.

Joint Commission

The Joint Commission (formerly the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations) is an independent, not-for-profit organization that accredits and certifies more than 17,000 health care organizations and programs in the United States. In 1951 The American College of Physicians (ACP), The American Hospital Association (AHA), The American Medical Association, and the Canadian Medical Association joined with the American College of Surgeons to create the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals, known as JCAH. It began to publish standards for hospitals as well as survey hospitals' compliance with these standards. When Congress passed the Social Security Amendments in 1965 it added a provision that deemed hospitals accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals to be worthy enough to participate in Medicare and Medicaid. The organization changed its name to Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations in 1987 to reflect an expanded scope of activities including the surveying of managed care organizations. The Joint Commission now certifies hospitals,

managed care organizations, outpatient surgery centers, mental health facilities as well as laboratories. Joint Commission accreditation and certification is recognized nationwide as a symbol of quality that reflects an organization's commitment to meeting certain performance standards.

The Joint Commission's Mission and Vision Statements reflect this commitment to quality and patient safety:

Mission: To continuously improve health care for the public, in collaboration with other stakeholders, by evaluating health care organizations and inspiring them to excel in providing safe and effective care of the highest quality and value.

Vision Statement: All people always experience the safest, highest quality, best-value health care across all settings.

Both Wishard Memorial Hospital and the Clarian Health System participate in Joint Commission Accreditation Surveys, hoping to achieve a full three year accreditation cycle. The on-site survey includes performance standards in such areas as environment of care, leadership, information services, and the medical staff. It is a rigorous review of processes and performance standards to ensure that patient care is provided in a safe manner and in a secure environment.

One of the key elements in the Joint Commission's evaluation is the reporting of performance measurements. Pregnancy and related conditions was one of the initial priority and focus areas for hospital core measurement development identified by the key Joint Commission stakeholders. In 2002, the Pregnancy and Related Conditions (PR) set was one of the initial sets of core measures implemented. In March of this year these measures were updated and renamed to the Perinatal Care Core Measure set.

The measures included in this group are:

- Elective Delivery Prior to 39 weeks - improvement is considered a decrease in the rate
- Cesarean Section Rate for Low Risk Nulliparous Patients
- Antenatal Steroid Use
- Health-Care Associated Bloodstream Infections in Newborns
- Exclusive Breast Milk Feeding at the time of discharge

These measures are similar and overlap with those required by other outside organizations such as Leapfrog Group and Anthem.

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TEXT 4 BABY

Each year in the U.S., more than 500,000 babies are born prematurely and an estimated 28,000 children die before their first birthday.

In response to this national public health crisis, the National Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies Coalition (HMHB) is launching text4baby, a free mobile information service that provides pregnant women and new moms with information to help them care for their health and give their babies the best possible start in life. The Office on Women's Health is a partner in this educational service.

Whether pregnant or a new mom, text4baby can help keep mom and baby healthy. Sign up for the service by texting BABY to 511411 (or BEBE in Spanish) to receive free text messages each week, timed to the due date or baby's date of birth. These messages focus on a variety of topics critical to maternal and child health, including birth defect prevention, immunization, nutrition, seasonal flu, mental health, oral health, and

safe sleep. Text4baby messages also connect women to prenatal and infant care services and other resources.
